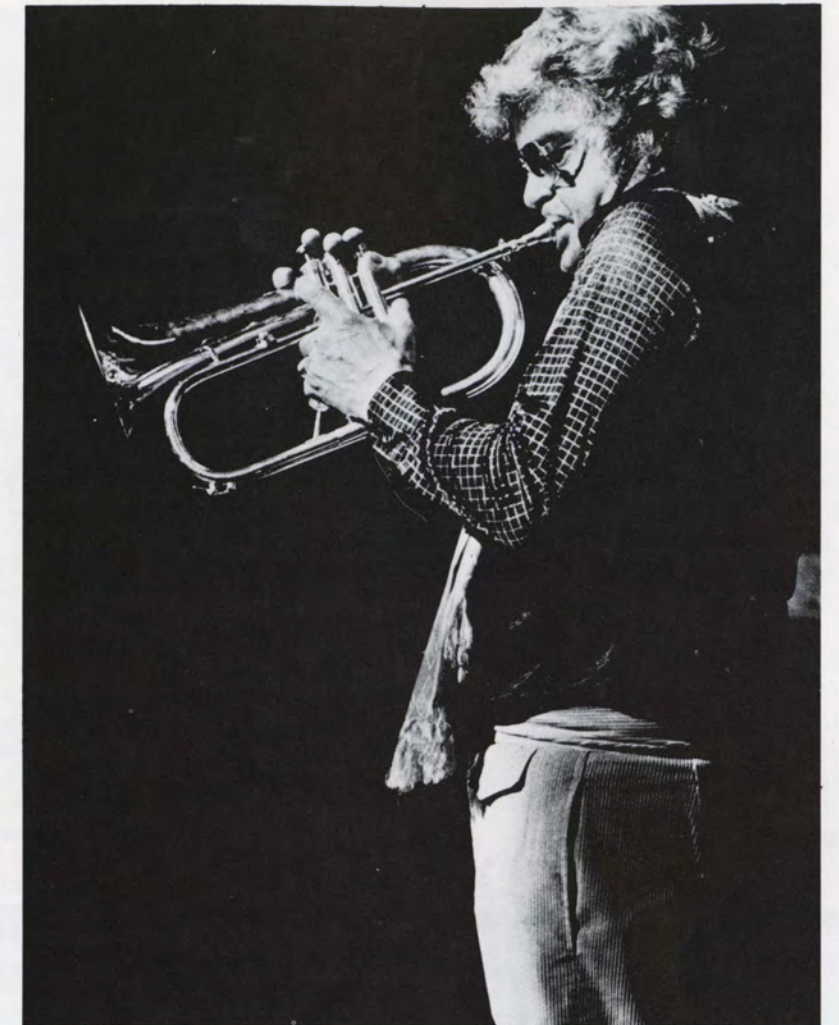


TRI-STATE JAZZ FESTIVAL

The eighth annual Jazz Festival featured three evening concerts and three full days of competition between high school and junior high school jazz bands.

Trumpeter Maynard Ferguson and his band launched the three-day music extravaganza. Ferguson, who last appeared at Morningside to headline its 1978 festival, is best known for his theme of the academy award winning motion picture "rocky."

Friday evening's performance featured vibraphonist Gary Burton and his quartet. Freddie Hubbard and his quintet followed Saturday, joining the Morningside College Jazz Band in concert.



Since it began in 1973, the jazz festival has grown steadily, attracting between 1,000 and 1,500 young musicians for competition each year. This year's festival was the largest held on campus. Competition was expanded to run three full days, in contrast to a single day two years ago, due to the increasing number of bands who plan to attend the festival.

"We're proud that we are able to provide an annual jazz competition which is recognized throughout Iowa and in the tristate area," said Gary Slechta, Morningside music professor, and festival coordinator. "We're really excited about the jazz musicians we're bringing to Sioux City this year. Our festival is not only an important opportunity for the student musicians who compete; it's a tremendous cultural event for jazz enthusiasts in the Siouxland area who normally don't have the chance to hear good jazz in person."



"TROJAN WOMEN"

The production of Trojan Women was done in-the-round at Klinger-Neal Theatre. Directed by Chuck Whetzel, Assistant Professor of Communicative arts. The Trojan Women is based on the legend of the Trojan War recounted in Homer's Illid.

"We have not used Klinger-Neal as an arena theatre in several years," Whetzel said. "Originally designed as a completely convertible facility, the theatre can be used proscenium, "tennis court," three-quarter thrust, or arena," he said.

Written 2,500 years ago, The Trojan Women is one of history's most respected anti-war plays. Euripides was a theatrical rebel in both form and content. This play has been given dozens of major productions in recent years including a motion picture version featuring Katherine Hepburn and Vanessa Redgrave.

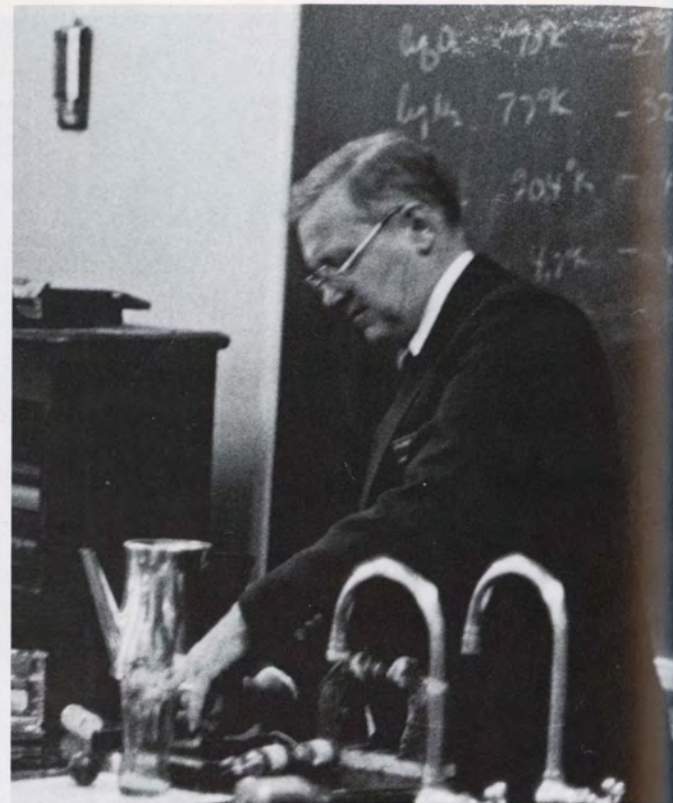


"THE LOVE OF FOUR COLONELS"

The story - "The Love of Four Colonels," concerned a Frenchman, an Englishman, an American, and a Russian, in a four power zone in Germany just after WWII, and is described by critics as constantly amusing and rewarding and as an intellectual charade full of style and penetrating wit, the play is a satire on love.

Assistant Professor of Communicative arts Chuck Whetzel designed and directed the production. James Moreton, Assistant Professor of Communicative arts designed the costumes.



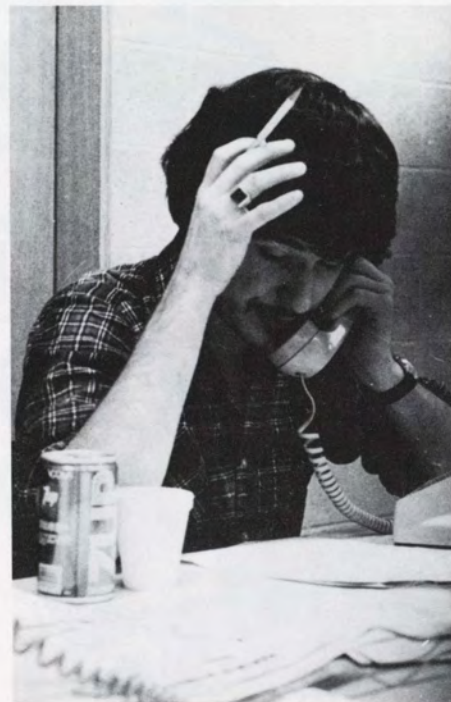

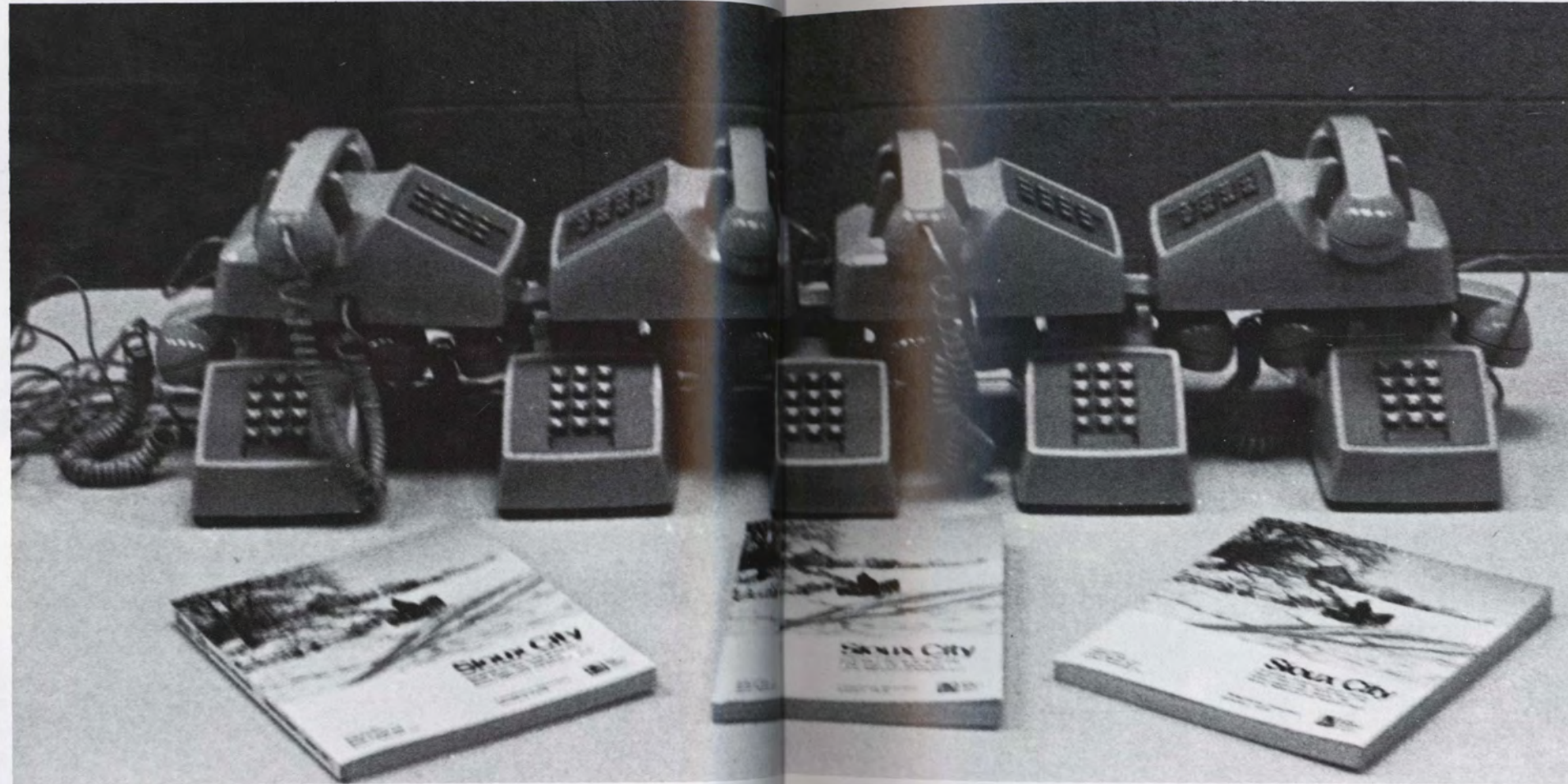


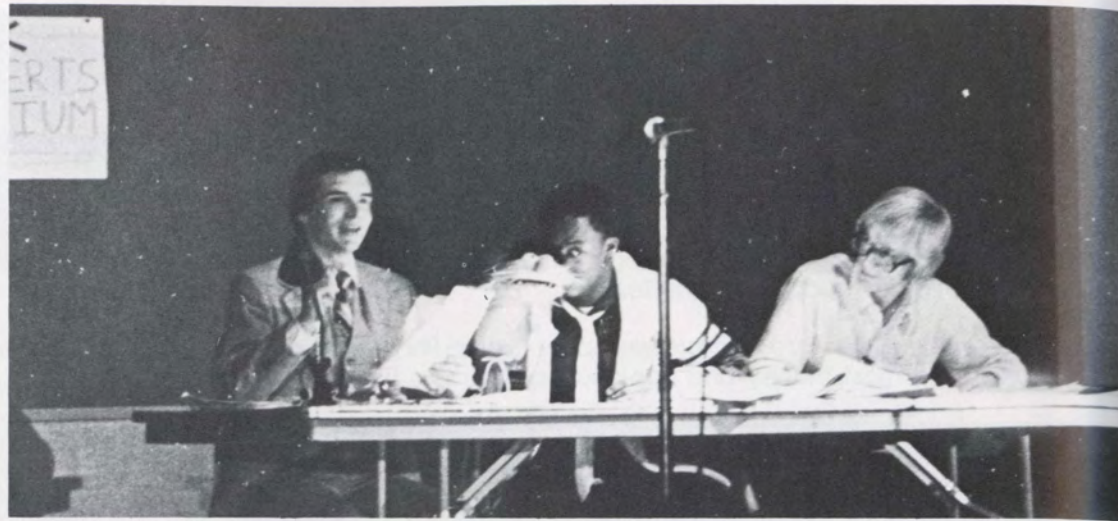
PHONE-A-RAMA

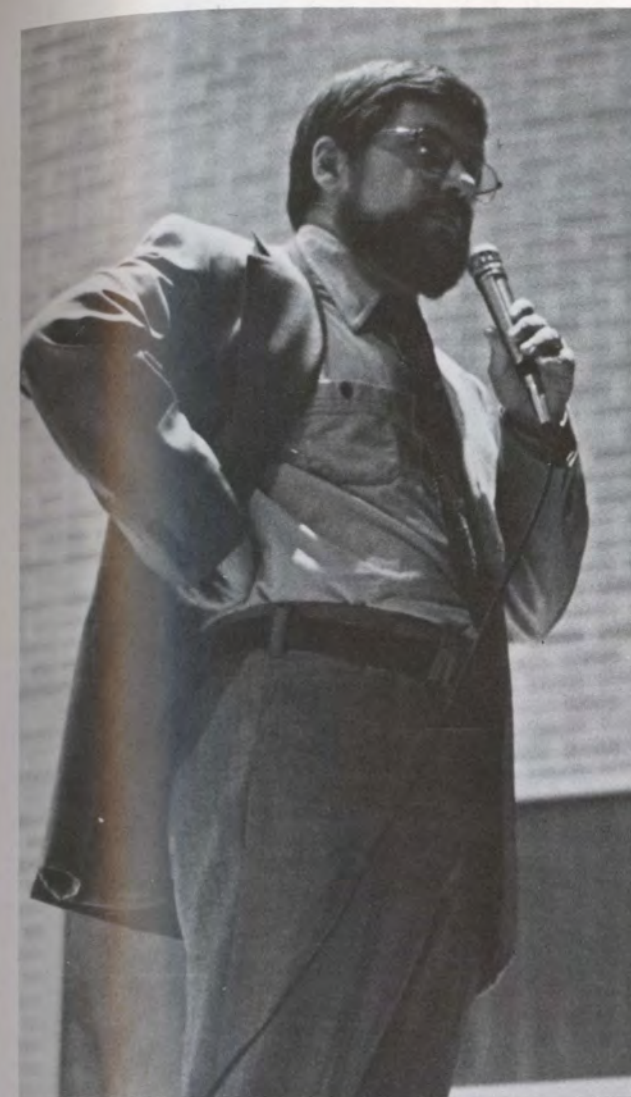

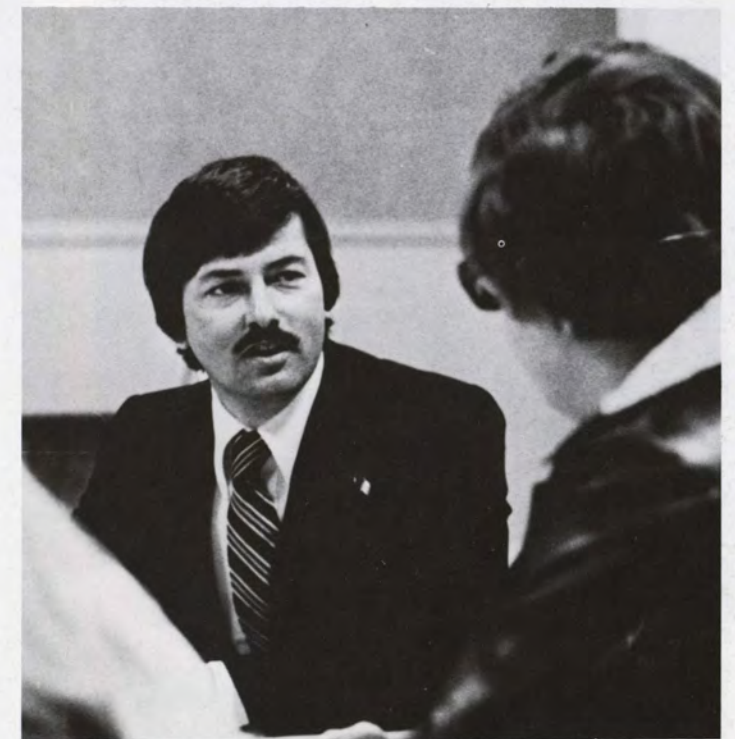


Ronald Beck, Principal Training Specialist from the Applications Branch of the EROS Data Center was at Convocation this fall.

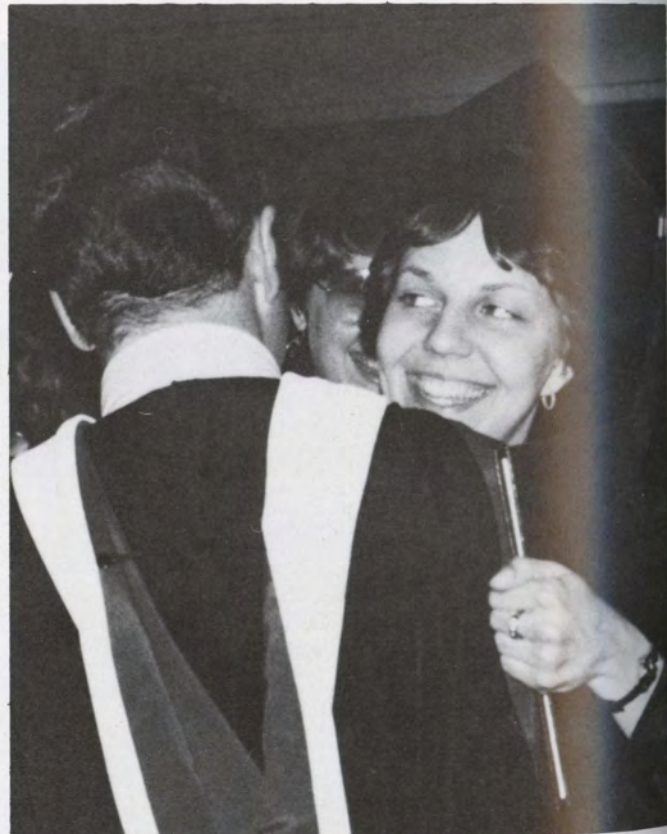
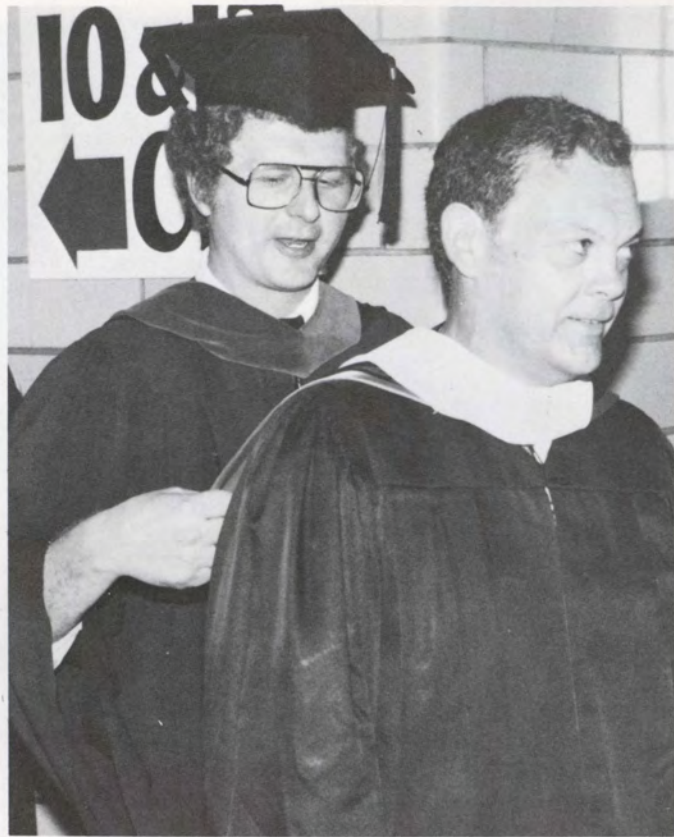


PARENTS WEEKEND

The Maroon Chiefs football fortunes failed to rise in 1979 despite improvements in several key areas in the program. A squad of 78 players entered the season with expectations for a winning season and an improved NCC record.

Inexperience in the skilled positions was a factor as the Chiefs regularly saw 16 freshman and sophomores in the starting line-up. The defensive unit played well enough to win most games, but the Chiefs were unable to generate enough offensive punch to put the needed points on the board.

Individual standouts included senior captains Craig Eberhart, defensive tackle from Charlotte, Iowa, Bob Mesner, Linebacker from Lake City, running back Brian Ludwigs, from Hinton, Iowa, and guard Randy Hinkel from Mondamin. Ludwigs' name should remain in the NCC record books forever as a result of his 99 yard run for a TD against Augustana. Mesner, and defensive standout Jay Depner, DHB, and Tim Larson, DE, all earned second team All-NCC recognition. Seniors Dan Frazier, OG, Bill Pearson, DHB, John Carver, C, Jeff Reinders, OT, Kelly Anderson, DHB, and Ernest Riley, MG, will all be missed next fall.

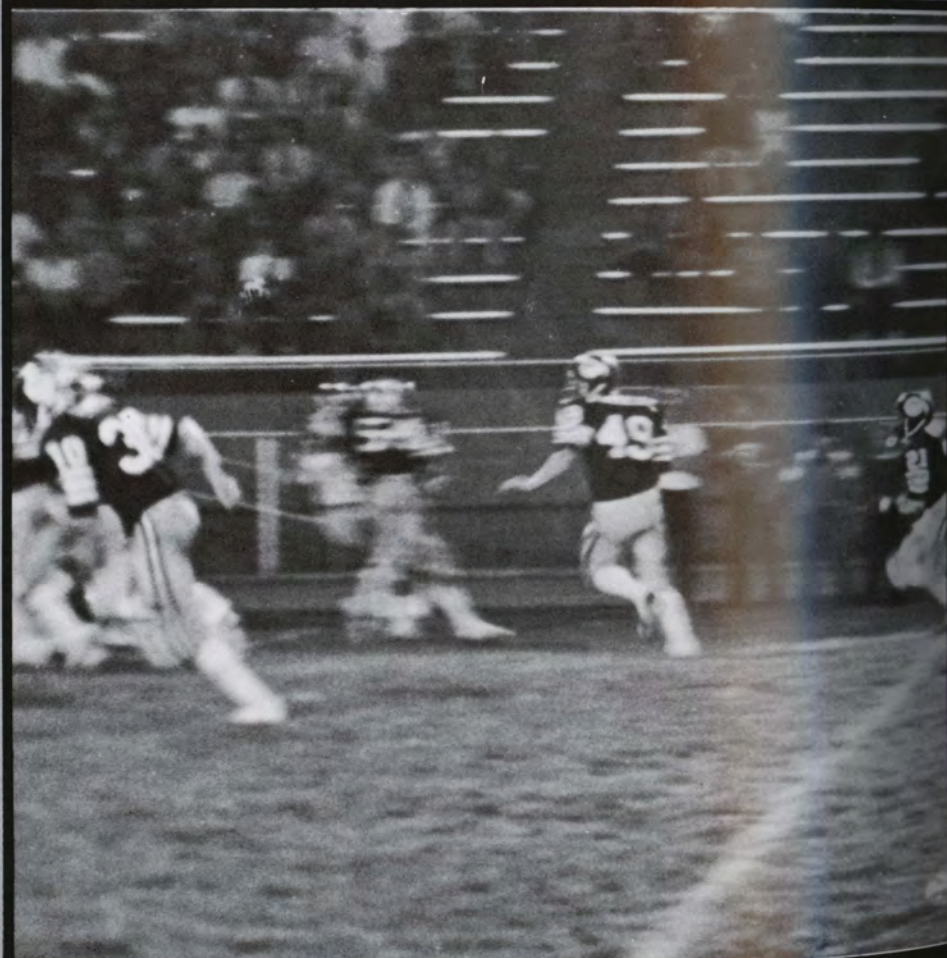

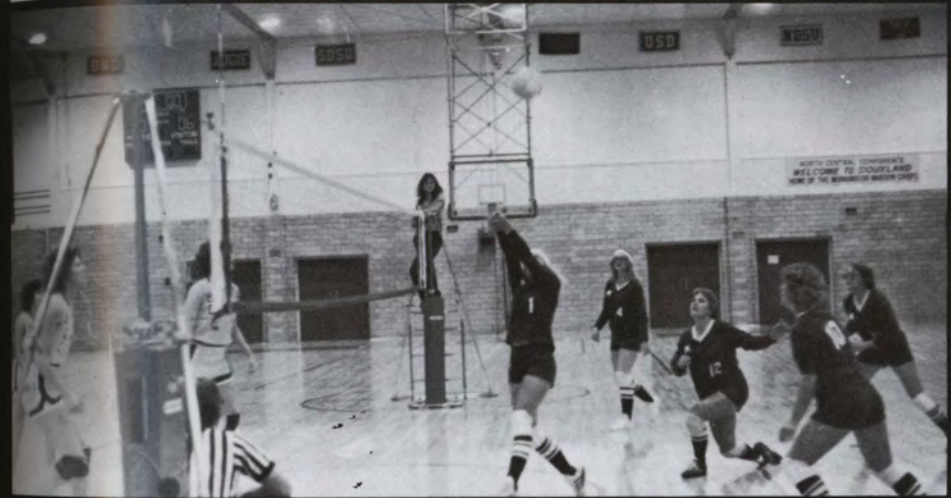

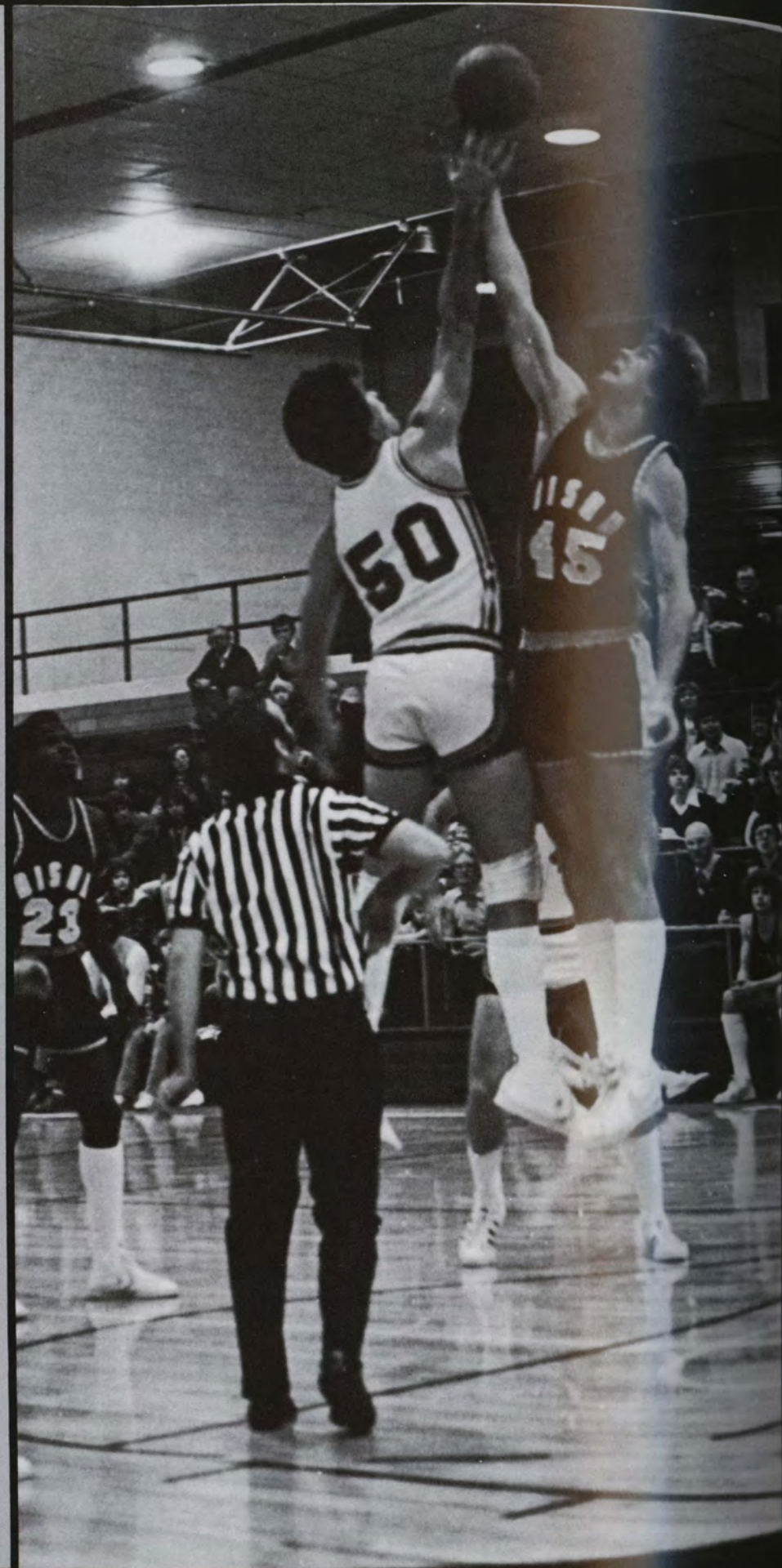

THE SEASON:

The Morningside College basketball team in the 1978-79 season came off a 13-12 season with a lot of optimism. All-Conference guard Cleo Franklin was expected to lead the way with veteran forward Mark Faber and center Kris Jacobsen.

The season started in Rolla, Missouri, with the Chiefs taking on host team, University of Missouri-Rolla. When the smoke cleared and after three overtimes the battle went to the host 72-75. The third place game with the University of Missouri-St. Louis, was won by a narrow margin 74-72, led by Mark Faber's 21 points and 14 rebounds, his outstanding play in the tournament earning him All-Tournament honors. It was costly for the Chiefs guard Cleo Franklin as he was unable to play the second contest because of pain in his left foot.

The men of the M returned home with the Third Place Trophy but the X-ray of Cleo's foot showed a break and he was sidelined for an indefinite period.

The hot shooting Northwestern Red Raiders came to town and the game was decided on Baron Hannah's last second rebound shot for a 78-77 win. Hillary Thomas was high with 24 points and 8 rebounds.

Down to the auditorium for the battle was arch rival Briar Cliff. The Chargers got the Chiefs by 10.

With the experience gone in the back court the long trip to Macomb and Cedar Falls proved disastrous for this young team, losing both by wide margins. The Chiefs came home with new life getting their star guard back in the line up. He promptly hit his first shot, first four out of five, along with Mozer's 24 big ones and the Chiefs looked like they were beginning to roll.

After four more games and a lot of travel the Chiefs played their last game with Cleo Franklin. He took the red-shirt year because he couldn't play with the pain in his foot.



The battling Chiefs returned home to find the baskets to their liking. Kris Jacobson moved from his center spot to the wing and went 11 for 19 for his high game of the season, 24 points, and talk about shooting! Hillary Thomas was perfect from the field going 10 for 10, beating Briar Cliff 82-78.

MORE ON THE CHIEFS

After a number of more wins and losses, and trips on the road the season ended at Omaha. The struggle was over. The record doesn't indicate the results of a bunch of quality guys that gave it their best shot. Their accomplishments were not recorded as a winning season. A winning effort by all, a team that faced adversity and won by doing the best that they were capable of doing. That spirit will climb the mountain.

CALLAHAN COMMENTS:

When we lost some key players this year I thought the rest of the players dug down a little deeper and came up with a tremendous effort. They stood toe to toe and slugged it out with everyone in the North Central. They made continual adjustments, never gave up the faith and battled. I admire this team's attitude and courage. We have some individual accomplishments that allowed that character of the team to grow. With the return of some of our players I look for the positive factors to motivate those returning to reach greater heights.

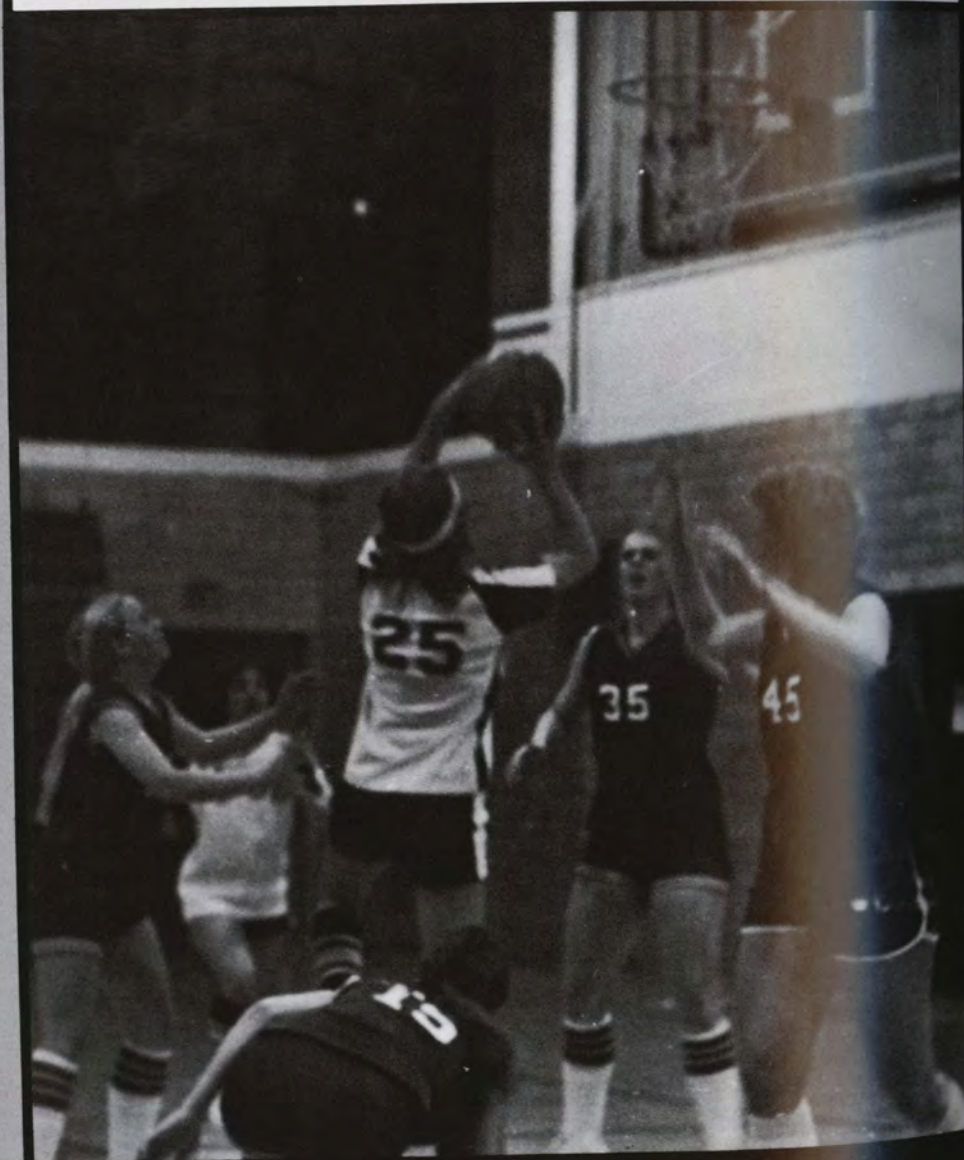
HONORS:

Kris Jacobson and Bob Bouvia - Honorable Mention All-Academic Team.

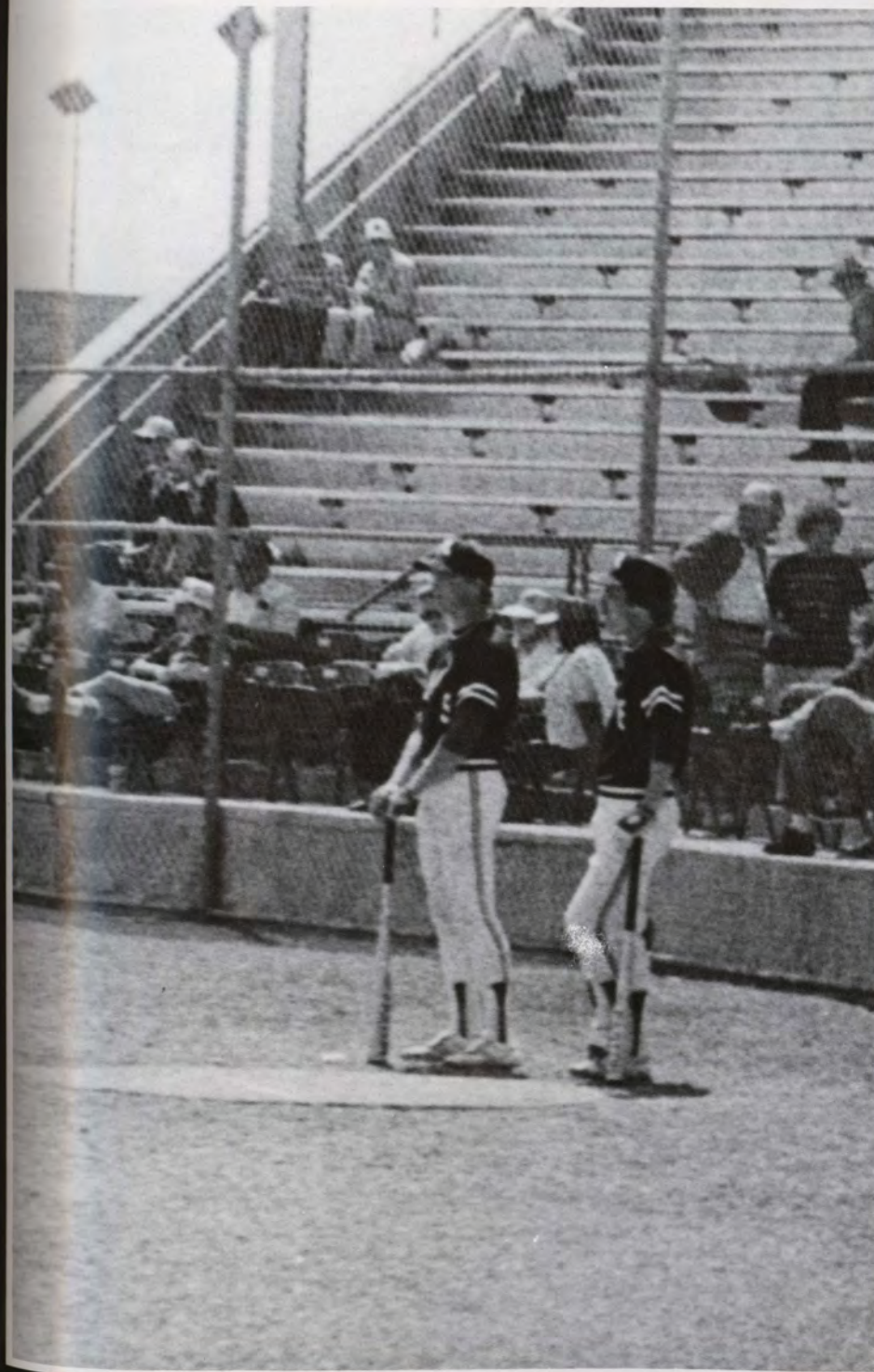
