















COMMONS

Dr. Robert Jewett joined the staff of the Morningside Religious Studies Department in 1966 after receiving his doctorate from the University of Tuebringen in Germany, and serving the ministry in three midwestern cities. In the spring of 1973, while on sabbatical, he was theologian in residence at the American Church in Paris.

Dr. B. G. Knepper joined the English department at Morningside in 1959. He received his doctorate from the University of Nebraska in 1967 and was named head of Morningside's English department two years later. In addition to his work in Morningside's classrooms, Knepper has authored numerous articles for English journals, has been active in the National Council of Teachers of English, and is a member of a number of other professional groups.

ISPIRG, the Iowa Student Public Interest Research Group, is a statewide student organization, dedicated to work for active social change in the public interest. The organization, totally funded by college students' money (\$3 per year), works in the areas of governmental responsibility, environmental quality, consumerism and problems of general interest to citizens.

The Morningside ISPIRG chapter has completed its second year of operation. This past year, although somewhat plagued with internal problems, ISPIRG has cooperated with the state ISPIRG organization on statewide projects (which have included a toy safety survey, a drug price survey, a bank interest survey and a campaign disclosure investigation), has worked with the Briar Cliff ISPIRG chapter in areas of concern to Sioux City, and has worked on campus with a breakdown of the General Fee.

ISPIRG's future plans here at Morningside include the formation of a Consumer Protection Service in Sioux City, manned by Morningside and Briar Cliff students.


The Pre-Law Association of Morningside College has five goals:



The Religious Life Council provides Morningside students with opportunities to express, examine, and study the religious meanings and purposes of life. Its work is centered in the Campus Minister's office and the George Dunn Religious Life Center in the Commons Building. Ecumenical in word and stance, it invites students of diverse beliefs and creeds to witness to their faith in appropriate ways. This year approximately 120 students have enrolled as members of this organization.

Special areas of interest for which Religious Life Committees have responsibility include: Convocation Worship, Contemporary Worship Resources, Special Projects, Reader's Theatre, and Seminar Tour. These Committees sponsor a wide variety of activities as their titles indicate and provide students with many avenues of service, both on and off campus.




COLLEGIAN REPORTER

The incidents which take place center around the title character, Electra, older daughter of Agamemnon, brilliantly portrayed by Sue Fuchs, and her attempts at avenging the murder of her father. Electra saved the life of her younger brother, Orestes, by sending him away at the time of the murder, and awaits his return so that he may assist in her endeavor.

The play is tremendous! It is probably one of the best cast and most stimulating dramas that has ever been produced at Klinger-Neal. The set was beautifully constructed, the music superb, and, as a whole, GREAT!





The play, a spinoff of Shakespeare's "Hamlet", concerns the inability of Rosencrantz and Guildenstern to control a situation which they did not choose or want. Gould and Wright are

impressive in their conveyance of a growing sense of fate and unreality which are aided by a surrealistic set and startling special effects. These special effects include two facets of the film media with the use of slide and sixteen millimeter film. This unique blending of film and live theatre give the audience a heightened sense of participation in Rosencrantz and Guildenstern's frustrations and helplessness.

Although the length of the play is at times readily apparent to the audience, we found Klinger-Neal's production of "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead" to be most entertaining, stimulating, and a just end to this year's fine list of major productions.

















Morningside suffered through its worst football season ever in 1973, finishing winless in nine outings. The Maroon Chiefs opened their season with a heartbreaking 7-6 loss to Southwest Minnesota State, when a two-point conversion attempt failed in the fourth quarter. Two weeks later, the chiefs waged a head-to-head battle with eleventh-ranked North Dakota State. A spirited Maroon defense held the Bison to two touchdowns, but the Morningside offense failed to score in the 14-0 loss. Morningside's other seven defeats were all by twenty-five or more points.


Final North Central Conference statistics showed Morningside last in the conference in both total offense and total defense. The Maroon and White led the league in turnovers by an embarrassing margin. Only two Morningsiders appeared high in individual statistic rankings: Brad Engle led the conference punters with a 40.7 yards-per-kick average, and Steve Brower pulled down 21 passes to rate fourth in that category.

At season's end, Coach R. Duane Halford was relieved of his head coaching duties and athletic directorship and was named Assistant to the Academic Dean.






Coach Dan Callahan and the team, battling injuries and a lack of experience, lost 13 of their first 17 games. The squad did, however, provide excitement by coming from an 18 point deficit to upend Missouri-Kansas City 72-70 for a win which broke a 31 game losing string. The final eight games of the season were a different story as the Chiefs won five. The squad jelled into a solid team and finished the year with three consecutive wins.


The season was topped off when 6'-11" junior center Dave Schlesser, who led the North Central Conference in scoring, rebounding, and field goal accuracy, was named the NCC's Most Valuable Performer.

Six players were selected as special award winners by a vote of the squad. Freeman Berry was named honorary captain for '73-'74; Marv Munden and Dan Pomerenke were named co-best defensive players; Scott Otis was chosen as the most improved player; Rick Soligo was presented the "Big Chief" award for being the player who gave the most of himself for the good of the team; and Schlesser was named Morningside's most valuable player and was also voted team captain for '74-'75.

By season's end, the Chiefs had set three new team and individual records. The team set a new NAIA record by making 25 of 25 freethrows in the loss to the South Dakota Jackrabbits. Bob Curry set a Morningside individual freethrow record by sinking 14 of 14, and Dave Schlesser set a new team mark in single season rebounds with 367.







The Morningside College Baseball, Maroon Chiefs opened a record-breaking 37 game 1974 schedule on March 28, with a double-header at Emporia, Kansas. Six weeks and 34 games later (the Chiefs lost three games to rain) Coach Don Protexter and his charges had finished the campaign with a 7-10 North Central Conference record, good for fith place, and an 11-23 record overall.

The season started miserably for the Chiefs as they lost their first 13 non-conference games. Despite their poor showing outside the league, the Chiefs, after nipping Mankato State 1-0 in 10 innings on April 20, found themselves in a first place tie for the NCC lead with a 4-2 conference record. A week later, Northern Iowa swept a crucial three-game series from the Maroons and headed them toward their fifth place finish.

Pitcher-outfielder Steve Zedicker was the big man in the Chiefs' offensive attack for '74, leading the squad in average (.344), home runs (7), and runs batted in (23). He had help from first baseman Rodd Norstrom, a .309-hitter with 6 home runs, and outfielder Skip Holton, who also cracked 6 homers. Zedicker, Al McNiven, Tom McWilliams and Tom Polt divided the pitching chores.

Besides playing more games than ever before, the '74 Chiefs broke four other team records and tied a fifth. The team total of 35 home runs smashed the old record of 21 set in 1964. Zedicker broke three individual records: hits (32), walks (29), and runs scored (27). His 7 home runs also tied the squad record.




CROSS COUNTRY

Coach Lonnie Rogers made his first year as head track coach at Morningside College a successful one as the Chiefs broke four team records and won two Iowa College Division Drake Relay titles. During the indoor season, Bob Larson broke his own record in the 880 yard run with a time of 1:58.7, Pat Riddle surpassed the standard in the 600 yard run with a clocking of 1:15.2, and the mile relay team of Rick Brzuchalski, Dave Honeck, Riddle, and Tom Tucker turned in a record time of 3:27.6. Ron Heaton set a new team outdoor record of 14.9 in the 120 yard high hurdles.

At the Drake Relays Classic on the last weekend in April, the Chiefs, for the fourth consecutive year, won the mile and 440 yard relays in the Iowa College Division. Honeck, Riddle, Tucker, and Freeman Berry carried the baton in the mile relay, while Honeck, Tucker, and Berry teamed with Henry Duffy to take the 440 title.

The Chiefs got a late start on the season, working without indoor facilities, and did not score at the North Central Conference Indoor Meet in mid-March. But the team progressed rapidly during the outdoor season, winning the Blue Jay Invitational Meet in mid-April.

The year was culminated May 11 at the NCC Outdoor Meet, where the Chiefs earned 19 points and a fifth place finish. Scoring in that meet for the Chiefs were: Freeman Berry, firsts in the 100 and 220 yard dashes (for the third consecutive year), the 440 relay team (Honeck, Duffy, Tucker, and Berry), second, and the mile relay team (Honeck, Riddle, Tucker, and Berry), third.






WRESTLING









1973-74 was a record-breaking season for Coach Arnie Brandt and the Morningside Maroon Chiefs Wrestlers. The squad set a new dual meet wins record with 16 dual victories against 5 losses. That topped the old mark of 12 dual wins set in the 1971-72 season.

The Chiefs did not fare so well in tournament competition, failing to win the NAIA District 15 championship for the first time in three years. In both that tournament and the conference tourney, the Chiefs were without 177-pounder Kelly Greene, who missed the last month of the season with a leg injury. Greene had won the 177-pound title at the UNO invitational and had compiled a 10-1-1 dual record before being sidelined. In Greene's absence, Rod Foutch (167) became the team leader. Foutch finished third in the District 15 tournament and thereby qualified for the NAIA nationals.

As well as breaking the team dual meet wins record, the 1973-74 grapplers also set five new individual records. Mark Montange (118) set a new standard for most dual wins with 19. Montange, who finished at 19-2-0,

also set records for 2-point near falls, 10, and most team points, 91.


Dave Edmonds, 10-6-3 at 150, set a new mark for most escapes with 17. Mike Pickford (134) and Dave Galler (142) both set a new standard for most match points, 123. Pickford was 13-3-1 on the year, while Galler was 14-4-2.

At season's end, by a vote of the squad members, Pickford, a Fort Madison senior, was selected team captain, and Galler, a junior from Hobart, Indiana, was named Morningside's most outstanding performer.




















REGISTRATION & ORIENTATION







GRADUATION

Those who were honored at the ceremony in Allee Gymnasium are: Miss Elizabeth Sammons, president of Perkins Bros. Co., and publisher emeritus of the Sioux City Journal; Air Force Col. George E. (Bud) Day, a native Sioux Citian and Morningside graduate who was a captive of the North Vietnamese for nearly six year; the Rev. Frank A. Nichols, superintendent of the Creston District of the United Methodist Church of Iowa.

Miss Sammons was born in Sioux City and graduated from the University of Wisconsin. A granddaughter of the late George D. Perkins, Journal publisher from 1869-1914, she began her career with the newspaper and with Radio Station KSCJ. In 1961, she was named president of the Journal-Tribune Company and served as publisher of the Journal until 1971. She also was president of KTIV, Sioux City television station from 1965 until its sale this spring to Black Hawk Broadcasting Co. She has been president of Perkins Bros. Co., since 1962.

Col. Day, who holds a master's and a law degree in addition to his Bachelor of Science from Morningside, served with the Marine Corps in the South Pacific during World War II, with the Air Force in Korea, and was a squadron commander in South Vietnam. He presently is studying at Arizona State and at the conclusion of the current semester will return to operational flying as vice-commander of the 33rd Tactical Fighter Wing at Eglin AFB, Florida. He also recently completed a book, "Return with Honor", which is being prepared for publication.

Rev. Nichols was born in Waverly, Iowa, received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Cornell College, a Master of Science from Iowa State University and Bachelor of Divinity degree from Yale University. He served Iowa United Methodist churches at Sheffield, Spencer, and Eldora. Nichols was appointed superintendent of the Creston district in 1971. Rev. Nichols served as a delegate to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences of the United Methodist Church in 1968 and 1972. He was one of six Iowa Conference miniters who visited Mississippi in the early 1960's at the invitation of President Ernest Smith of Rust College. The visit resulted in the first meeting between black and white ministers of Methodist churches in Mississippi.

Official groundbreaking ceremonies for the Robert M. Lincoln Center for Business Administration, Economics and Continuing Education were held on the building's site directly east of the Commons on August 30, 1973.

Guests of honor at the event included Mr. and Mrs. Robert M. Lincoln, Iowa Falls, Iowa, whose \$200,000 gift made the Center possible. Others who donated to the facility were also represented. Contributions received from individuals and foundations included the 1907 Foundation, a central auditorium will bare the foundation's name; Perkins Brothers Company, a business library in the building will be named in honor of the firm's founder, George D. Perkins; Carter W. Dennis; Sioux City Bankers Association; Payless Cashways, Inc.; Younkers; National Board of Education of the United Methodist Church; and the Sooland Chapter Chartered Life Underwriters.


The one-story, 11,400 square foot structure will include three classrooms, a lecture classroom to accomodate 60 students, a central auditorium seating 154 students, an amphitheatre styled classroom, a seminar room, student-faculty lounge, departmental offices, a library, and mechanical equipment rooms. Parking areas for the building have been located directly north of the structure.

Morningside President Thomas S. Thompson presided over the half-hour ceremony and noted that the groundbreaking for the new structure represented a "great occasion in the life of the College."

Comments were brief as dignitaries turned over the reddishbrown earth to signify the start of construction on Morningside's 15th building.
