Van Meeteren was named to the 2003 All-GPAC second-team, and Hogue was named to the All-GPAC honorable mention list. Van Meeteren led the team with 3.53 kills per game, 80 ace serves, .82 blocks per game, and was second on the team with 2.90 digs per game. 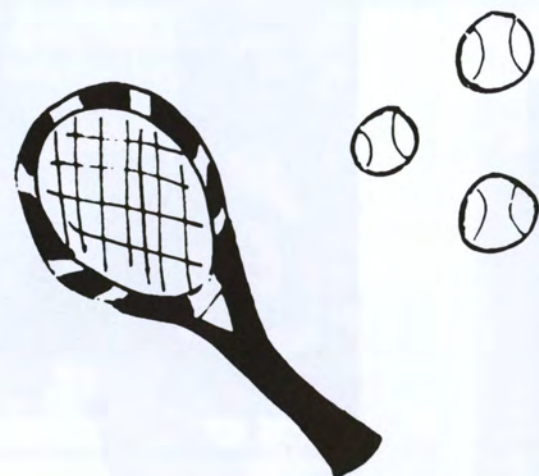

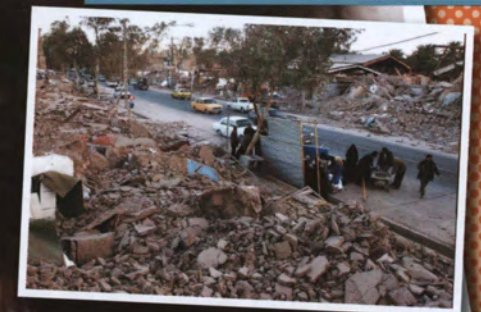

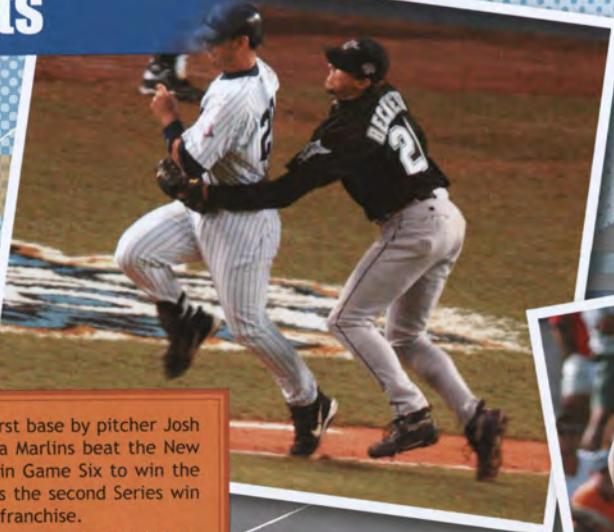

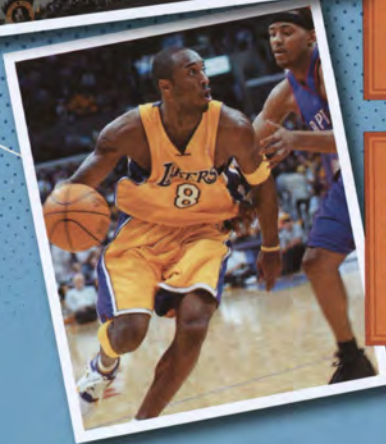

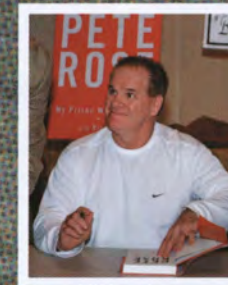
