## NEW PRESIDENT CHOSEN



The Rev. J. Richard Palmer, president of Westminster College, Salt Lake City, was unanimously elected by the board of trustees to succeed Dr. Earl A. Roadman, as president of Morningside College.

The Rev. Palmer is forty years old, is married and is the father of two daughters, Patricia Lorraine, 10, and Kathleen Ruth, 6. Mrs. Palmer is the former Ruth Sumner of Tulare, South Dakota. Both Rev. and Mrs. Palmer are graduates of Dakota Wesleyan University at Mitchell, South Dakota.

The new president was born in Lake Forrest, Illinois, but grew up in South Dakota where his father was an early day minister. Following his graduation from Dakota Wesleyan he studied at Iliff School of Theology in Denver and was granted a Master of Theology degree. He served as pastor of Emmanuel Methodist Church in Denver from 1944 to 1952 when he went to Westminster college as president.

During his presidency that college has doubled its enrollment, increased faculty salaries and made extensive campus improvements.

The Rev. Palmer said he was honored to be asked to assume the presidency of Morningside college because "the college is one of the most promising private liberal arts colleges and because of the caliber of the man who has been its president the last 20 years."

The new president believes in the indispensibility of the privately supported liberal arts college and says his philosophy rests on three beliefs:

1. The private higher education institutions are imperative to the preservation and maintenance of basic freedoms. Regardless of the unmistakable worth of and need for the state-supported college or university, the private institutions act as bulwarks of democracy in the matter of preserving academic freedom.

2. The small college has something unique to offer — the family-type intimacy not found on the university campus.

3. The private, church-related college naturally includes an emphasis on "intellectually respectable" religion. "Religion is essential to a balanced program of higher education," he said. "The need for moral fiber as a means for guiding the use of skills and knowledge is perhaps as important as the skills themselves.

"Academic quality is the cornerstone of the private liberal arts college. Without it the significance of this type of educational institution would be lost and a philosophy for it would be useless," Rev. Mr. Palmer asserted.

## Gwinn Receives Grant

Ira Gwinn '22, associate professor of physics, has received notification that he has been chosen as one among a selective group to be granted an honorarium to attend an Institute on Astronomy at Wisconsin State College at Eau Claire. The Institute is sponsored by the National Science Foundation and will be held from June 18 to July 14.

## Beloved Faculty Member Dies



Morningside College lost a beloved faculty member when Miss Ethel Murray, professor of history, died at her home on April 21 after a long illness.

Miss Murray was born at Woodlawn, Illinois in 1888. She later moved with her parents to Schaller, Iowa. After graduation from the Schaller high school she enrolled at Morningside, graduating in 1909. She received a master's degree from the University of Illinois in 1917, and did additional graduate work at Columbia University and Washington University in St. Louis. She spent the years of 1927 to 1929 in study at the University of Illinois.

She came to Morningside as a faculty member in 1921, prior to that time she had been principal of the high school in Rock Rapids, Iowa. In addition to her teaching she was college registrar from 1921 to 1942.

Faculty, students and alumni loved this gracious woman for her friendly helpfulness and greatly respected her for her scholarship and her integrity. This love and

respect was expressed again and again through the years in honors accorded her. Annuals were dedicated to her, she was the recipient of the "bean shower" in 1942 and again in 1955, and in 1953 she was sent on the Roadman Tour of Europe, a project initiated by her students and aided by alumni and friends. In 1954 when a Alumni Achievement program was instituted, Miss Murray received one of the first awards.

The hospitality of Miss Murray in her spacious home will be a treasured memory to all.

Forty years of the life of Ethel Murray were spent on the campus of Morningside College. They were years of dedicated service to generations of students, a gift which far outweighs any material construction of bricks and mortar in the building of our College.

Funeral services were held in Grace Church, on Monday, April 23.

Burial was in the cemetery at Schaller.

Miss Murray is survived by a sister, Mrs. Edith Dakin, who lives at the family home, 3911 Fourth Ave., Sioux City, and by a niece, Mrs. George Parden, and three grandnephews of Sioux City.

## MEREB MOSSMAN HONORED

Miss Merib Mossman '26 Dean of Instruction and Professor of Sociology Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, was the recipient of the eighth annual O. Max Gardner award.

The award is made each year to the faculty member of the University who during the current scholastic year has made "the greatest contribution to the welfare of the human race." The award includes an engraved citation and a check for the annual income of a trust fund provided in the will of O. Max Gardner, former governor of North Carolina.

Merib Mossman is the daughter of the late Dr. and Mrs. Frank Mossman. Dr. Mossman was president of Morningside College from 1919 to 1931. She received her B. A. degree from Morningside, and M. A. from the University of Chicago, School of Social Service Administration. She has taught at Woman's College since 1937. Previously she served as a social worker in Chicago, taught at Ginling College in China for 6 years and at Alabama Woman's College.

The award citation referred to Miss Mossman as a "creative artist in human lives."

Miss Hazel Batzer, associate professor of English, was granted a Ph. D. degree by the University of Michigan at their mid-year convocation.



### Awarded Medal

Dr. Raymond Hess '12 was awarded the 1956 Jacob F. Schoellkopf Medal of the Western New York section of the American Chemical Society "for outstanding contribution to the solution of the chemical, social and economic problems associated with the control of pollution, and for devoted service as officer, committeeman and historian."

## FORMER PRESIDENT DIES

Funeral services for Dr. Luther Freeman, former president of Morningside College, were held on April 23rd in Claremont Memorial Chapel, Claremont, California.

Dr. Freeman was president of Morningside College from 1910 to 1912. He was an outstanding minister and came to the college from Kansas City. He was 89 years old at the time of his death and had served for 46 years as a minister before his retirement. He was pastor of the Pilgrim Congregational Church in Pomona, California from 1922 to 1930, and served for many years as a trustee of Pomona College.

He is survived by his second wife, the former Alletta Gillette, who was on the faculty of the college, and by two daughters, Mrs. Robert McClure of St. Simon's Island, Georgia and Mrs. Ronald Hissey of Los Angeles, and a son, Mansfield of Alpine, New Jersey.

## In Memoriam

Miss Florence Cate '02 of Winfield, Kansas died on March 30th in a hospital in Wichita. Miss Cate was a member of the faculty of Southwestern College, Winfield for many years. She taught Latin and French. Miss Cate was the editor-in-chief of Morningside's first annual, and took a leading part in all college activities.

Miss Ruth French '15 of Hawarden, Iowa died April 18 of cancer. Miss French was a music instructor and was well known as a composer and author. Many of her compositions were published and she was a frequent contributor to the Etude, a music magazine.

After graduation from Morningside in 1915 Miss French studied for four years at the New England Conservatory, and later at Northwestern University where she was granted a master's degree. She taught at Louisburg College and at Atlantic Christian College in North Carolina, before going to Hawarden.

In 1946 she was named a Woman of Achievement by the Sioux City Journal and Tribune publications, and this year received the Award of Merit of the Hawarden Business and Professional Women's Club.

Miss Talma Kitchen '11 passed away on April 10 at her home in North Hollywood, California. Her ashes will be brought to Fort Dodge, Iowa for interment.

Miss Kitchen was a buyer for Marshall Field's in Chicago for many years and later for a shop in California. One brother, Paul, survives.
