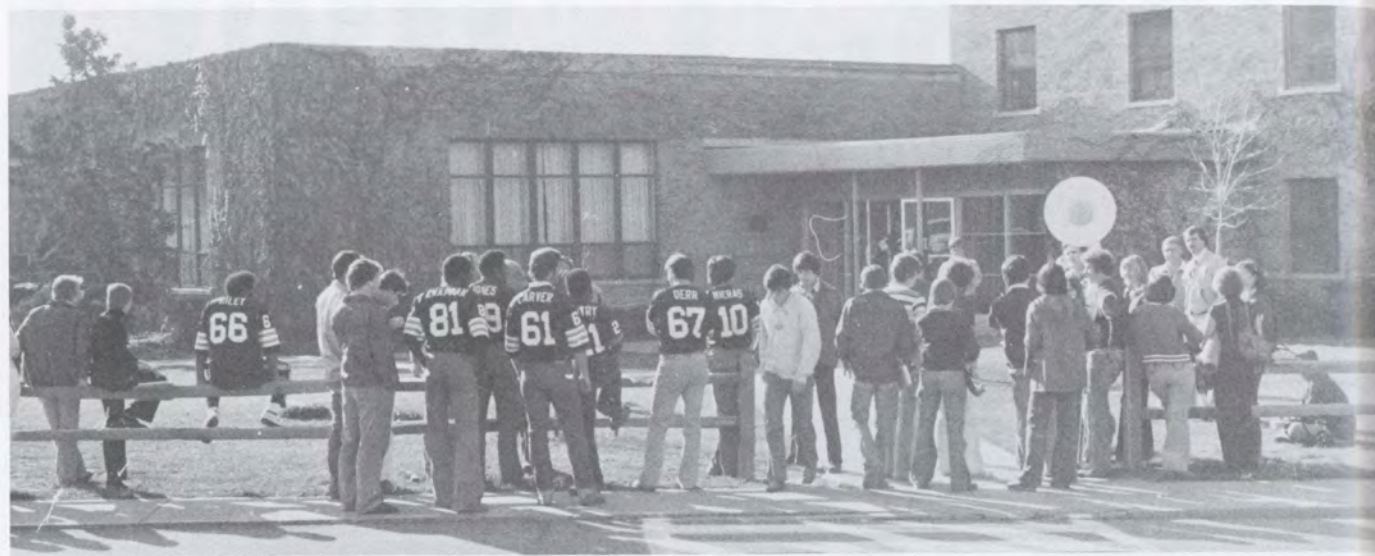
Plans Viet Report
On Nov. 3

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) — President Nixon declared Monday his policy in the Vietnam war will not "be swayed by public demonstrations," and dismissed Wednesday's planned protests as nothing new. "To allow government policy to be made in the streets would destroy the democratic process," and invite anarchy, Mr. Nixon said.

... were the chief weapons employed by both Hawks and Doves during the Moratorium Movement during first semester. Society's critics, particularly those who said that collegians "Don't give a damn," found themselves rudely awakened from their dreams when Morningsiders cared and said so. Actually, more than words were exchanged because, at one time, eggs and fruit flew, hurled by those who cared. While President Nixon made attention-getting statements throughout the world, Sioux Cityans were made aware that THE WAR really did exist and did affect them because U.S. flags flew at half-staff ... even in the rain.

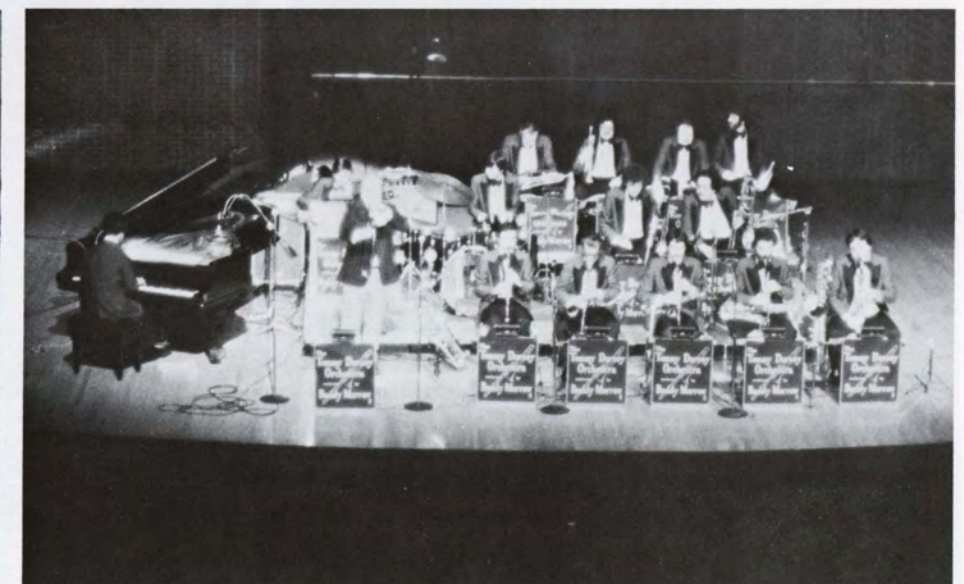
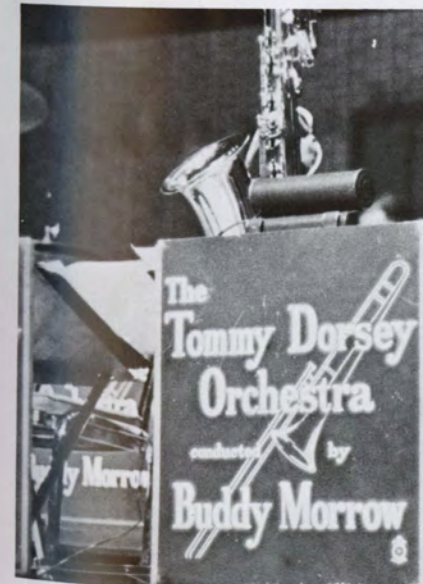

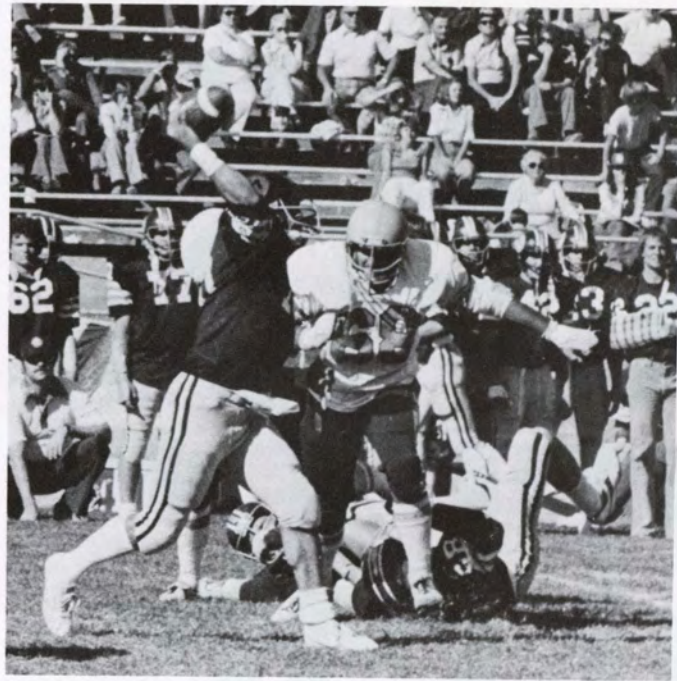

"Thursday Night Live" was produced by students, funded by the Commons Board of Control, and designed to provide entertainment for students at no charge.



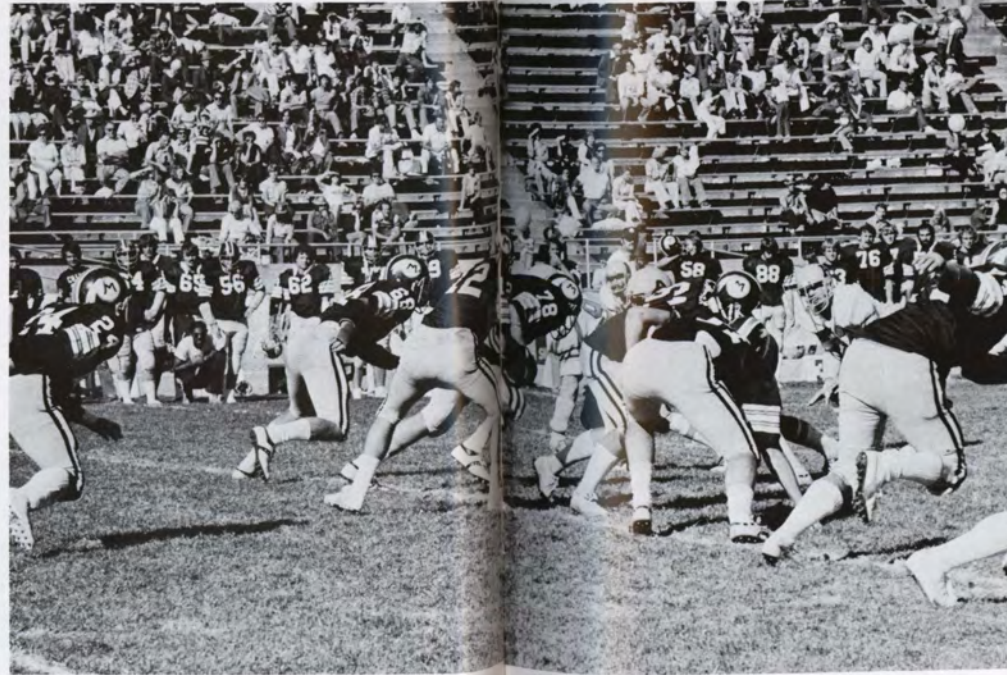

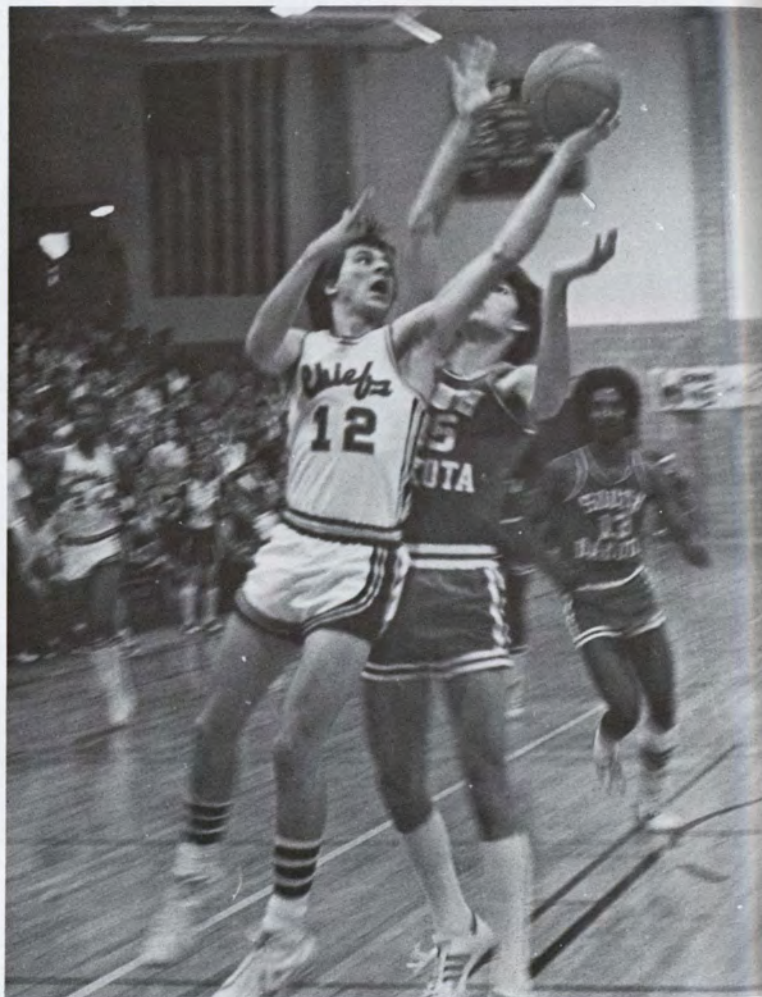

The Morningside Maroon Chiefs concluded the 1978-79 basketball year with a winning season finishing with a 13-12 over-all record. In the North Central Conference the Men of the "M" had a 5-7 record right in the middle of the pack.

The season was highlighted by an impressive Hardee's Tournament Championship to open the season. This was followed by their second consecutive place finish in the North Central Conference Holiday Tournament losing a heart breaker to the University of Omaha 66-59 in overtime. The Chiefs stayed in the race up until the last three games of the season. Another highlight in the year was a "big win" at UNO when they were 8-0 and running off with the crown, the battling Chiefs beat them in a 74-73 thriller.

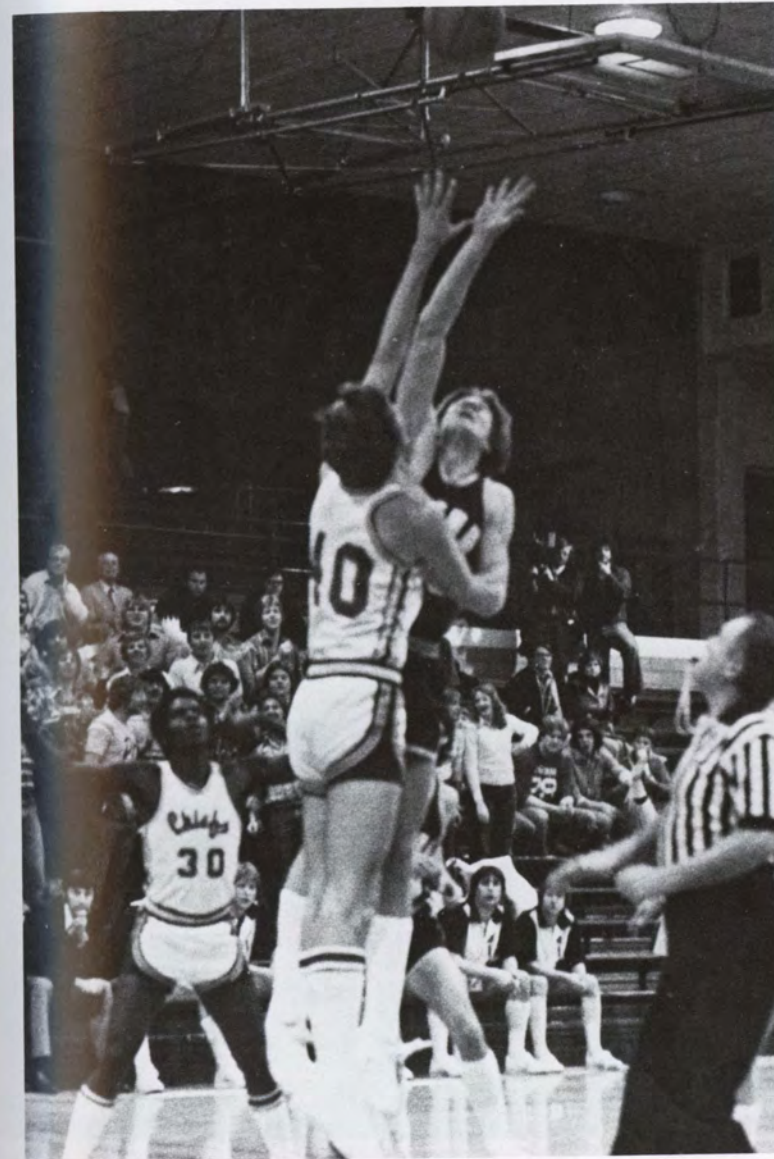
Basketball

The Captains for this year's team, Steve Kovarna and Jon McCurdy will be greatly missed, along with Senior center, Keith Kohler. Keith was selected the Most Valuable Player in the Hardee's Tournament at Marsha 11, Minnesota. And after all the beer cans have been collected . . . what's next? Beer bottles of course!





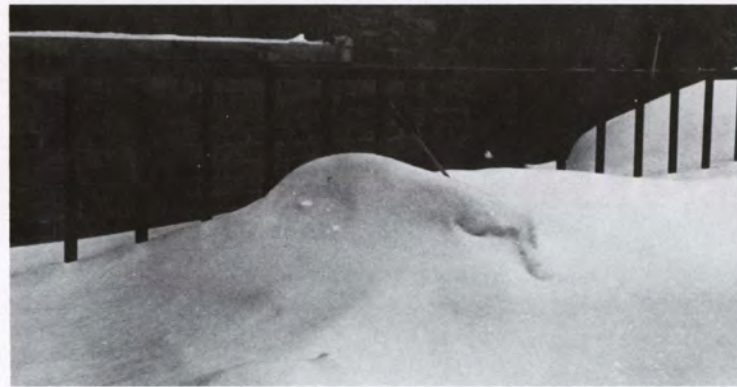

ROBERT M. LINCOLN CENTER

Official groundbreaking ceremonies for the Robert M. Lincoln Center for Business Administration, Economics and Continuing Education were held on the building's site directly east of the Commons on August 30, 1973.

Guests of honor at the event included Mr. and Mrs. Robert M. Lincoln, Iowa Falls, Iowa, whose \$200,000 gift made the Center possible. Others who donated to the facility were also represented. Contributions received from individuals and foundations included the 1907 Foundation, a central auditorium will bare the foundation's name; Perkins Brothers Company, a business library in the building will be named in honor of the firm's founder, George D. Perkins; Carter W. Dennis; Sioux City Bankers Association; Payless Cashways, Inc.; Younkers; National Board of Education of the United Methodist Church; and the Sooland Chapter Chartered Life Underwriters.

The one-story, 11,400 square foot structure will include three classrooms, a lecture classroom to accommodate 60 students, a central auditorium seating 154 students, an amphitheatre styled classroom, a seminar room, student-faculty lounge, departmental offices, a library, and mechanical equipment rooms. Parking areas for the building have been located directly north of the structure.

Morningside President Thomas S. Thompson presided over the half-hour ceremony and noted that the groundbreaking for the new structure represented a "great occasion in the life of the College."

Comments were brief as dignitaries turned over the reddish-brown earth to signify the start of construction on Morningside's 15th building.

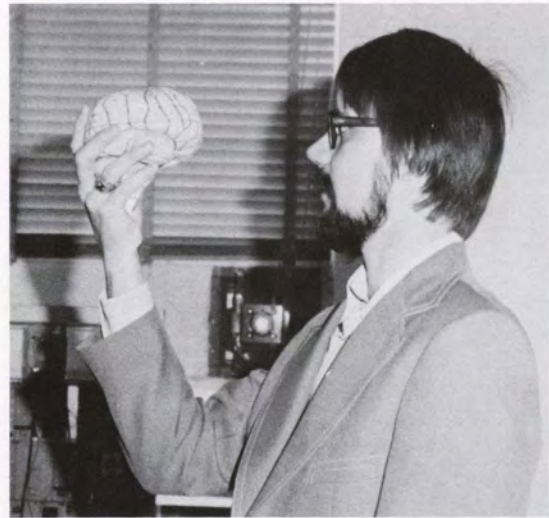
Psychology

MORNINGSIDE LOSES VITAL ST. LUKE'S CONTRACT

To the astonishment of Morningside's board of directors, administration, and faculty, the long-time agreement concerning the St. Luke's nursing program has been terminated. The loss of the program, which involves around 50 nursing students, will mean a loss to the college of thousands of dollars in tuition.

For the past 40 years, Morningside has had an agreement with St. Luke's that allows the hospital's first-year nursing students to spend the first year of their education at Morningside-attended classes here, live on campus, and pay Morningside tuition.

After the 77-78 school year those students will be fulfilling their first-year requirements from Briar Cliff College, the winner in a 4-way "bid" for the lucrative contract. Morningside's first official notice of St. Luke's change of plans came April 11th in the form of a letter from the director of education at St. Luke's, James Hamilton, stating that the hospital had decided to give three other educational facilities, Westmar, Western Iowa Tech, and Briar Cliff, a chance to "bid" on the contract. Morningside was given until May 1st to make a final offer. However, St. Luke officials made it clear that certain changes would have to be made in the program, regardless of which institution obtained the contract. They were 1) The instructors from the college would have to travel to St. Luke's to teach the classes, and 2) The nurses would be housed by the hospital, not by the respective college. In addition, St. Luke's requested that a 11 credits earned by the first-year students be given on-campus designation, not extension credit.

Morningside had reservations concerning all of the proposed changes and in response to the letter from St. Luke's, dated April 28th, Dean Prigmore tried to convince hospital officials to maintain the original agreement with Morningside by comparing the old with the new.

In the letter, Prigmore stated that because of academic standards set down by the board of directors, the college would not be able to grant on-campus credit to the nursing students, only extension-course credit.

The reasons for denying the request were 1) The students were residing in an off-campus facility, and 2) There was a lack of adequate facilities necessary for creditable instruction. According to Prigmore, the facilities lacked such vital necessities as space burners and proper ventilation.

Prigmore stated other disadvantages as well, all under the category of costs. Because of the time an instructor would need traveling back and forth from the hospital and time necessary to transport the necessary equipment, additional instruction from Morningside would have to be hired to compensate.

Prigmore speculated the number of additional full or part-time professors needed would be 4, and at an approximate cost of \$45,000 yearly in salaries.

When the director of education at St. Luke's James Hamilton, was asked why, after over 40 years of maintaining the agreement with Morningside, the hospital suddenly decided to change policy, he replied that the reason was to give students in the first year of the program a reduction in costs.

He estimated the savings of changing from Morningside to Briar Cliff at about \$1,000 per student. Hamilton also said that an important secondary consideration was the fact that the hospital was interested in bringing the program back on their campus where vacancies exist that could be filled with the first-year students.

At a recent faculty meeting President Thompson went so far as to say that the college would have evidence forthcoming that a prior arrangement was indeed made.

Officials from St. Luke's emphatically deny that any deal had been made.

Hamilton did state that some Briar Cliff officials were contacted in late March but that no "deal" was ever made at that meeting. He further stated that all the institutions involved (Westmar, Briar Cliff, W.I.T., and Morningside) all were sent letters at precisely the same date and given the same May 1st deadline to respond.

Assistant administrator Douglas Campbell also denied any such deal had been made. He said that the process was handled by the education committee of the board of directors and that "They studied the bids and made the selection."

Regardless, the decision still took many people by surprise. According to Prigmore, four members of the board of directors of Morningside College who are also board members of St. Luke's, kept giving the college reassurances that the agreement would be retained at Morningside right up until the day the announcement was made that Briar Cliff had been awarded the new contract.

Several individuals seem to be upset as well as surprised.

According to a reliable source who chose to remain unidentified, several ministers in the Methodist Church are upset over the loss of the agreement, particularly in the Fort Dodge district of the church. There has been speculation on the part of the discontinuance of the agreement was because of the difficulty many of the St. Luke's students seem to have with the two biology courses taught by Dr. Webb.

While Deam Prigmore did admit this was true and that this has previously been discussed between hospital and college officials, he doubted seriously if it was a factor in the hospital's decision to alter the plan. He told the Collegian Reporter, Morningside's College newspaper, "It's possible, but I really can't believe the hospital would take that into consideration."

When asked if the loss would adversely effect the college's financial situation, Prigmore replied, "not in the long run, but in the short run it poses a challenge."

Prigmore also mentioned the possibility of reducing the faculty as a result. Where that reduction would occur he would not specify but admitted that the science department would be the logical place.

A greater tuition increase is also possible as a result of the loss of the contract. However, it may be some time before any one knows the exact effect the situation will have on the college but it is likely to be significant.

Dean Prigmore said that St. Luke's had considered housing their own freshman students several times in the past.

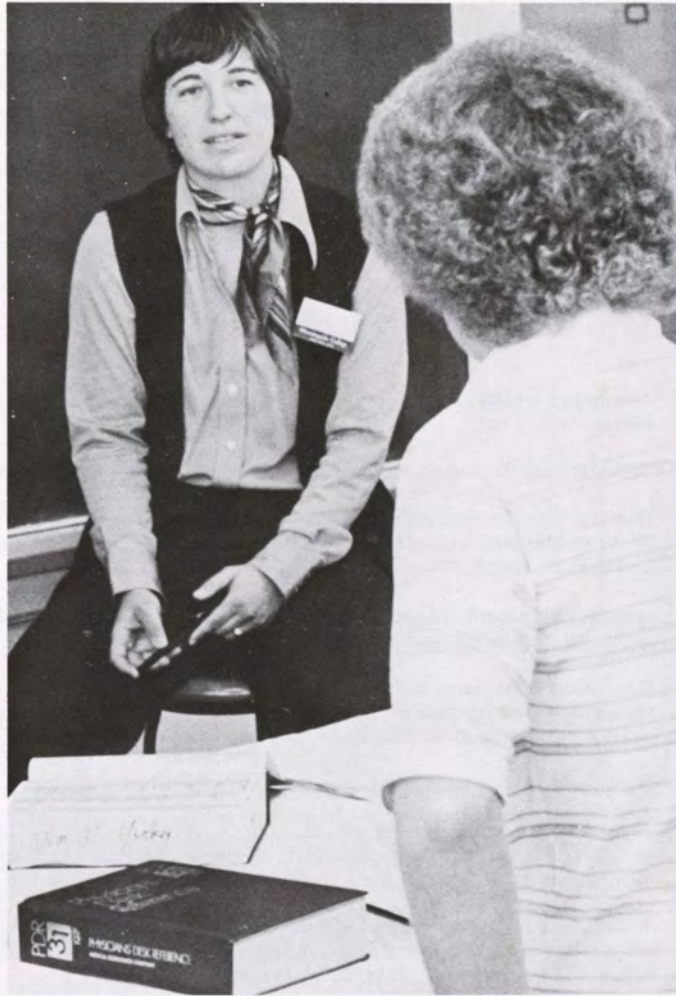
The main controversy in the issue is when the "real agreement" with Briar Cliff had been made for the program. On this point there seems to be much suspicion and difference of opinion. Prigmore said that certain facts could lead one to the conclusion that a deal had been made before Morningside even had official notice of the decision. Those facts are 1) The shortness of time to prepare a response (19 days) and 2) Some of the assumptions that had been made in the proposal.

SCIENCE, MATHEMATICS, NURSING, AND PSYCHOLOGY FORUM

The third annual Forum was a great success. Originally conceived both to give high school students a "hands-on" workshop experience at the College and to bolster the recruitment of new students, the Forum has attracted over four hundred high school students and teachers in each of its three years. For the Fall 1978 Forum students came from thirty high schools, some as far away as one hundred miles. The afternoon's activities began with two and one half hours of workshops. Each student selected an individual schedule from amongst thirty offerings in the departments of biology, chemistry, mathematics, nursing, physics, and psychology. To end the afternoon everyone gathered in Eppley to view an excellent film on the Amazon by a Sioux City teacher and naturalist, Robert DeLoss.

The key, however, to the success of the Forum is the cooperation between the faculty and Morningside's students. Morningside students helped to plan and set up many of the workshops; and they personally directed nearly one half of the workshops. Without the enthusiasm and support of our students, the Forum would not be possible.

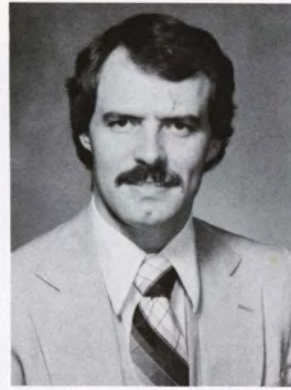

The opening of the new Student Services Center on the second floor of Lewis Hall marks a first for Morningside College. Students are now able to visit in one major area the following offices: Office of Student Affairs, which includes Housing, Counseling, Foreign Students, and Minorities; the Office of Financial Aid; the Life Learning Center; the Career Resource Center; and the Reading/Writing Lab. "Serving students and meeting their needs is the primary purpose of the center," emphasized Dr. Donald Poppen, vice-president for student affairs. The combination of these offices into one centralized location allows the college to do this more adequately than was previously possible. The Reading/Writing Lab and the Career Resource Center are both open to students. There is also a conference room which students can reserve for meetings.

The appearance of second floor Lewis Hall has changed drastically as the Klinger Forum, where Morningside's theater productions and chapel services once took place, has been renovated. The project commenced two years ago and the forum's balcony was remodeled to become the Gethmann Communications Center, headquarters of KMSC, the campus radio station and the offices of speech, drama, and mass communications. The completion and opening of the Student Services Center has been one of the goals of Morningside's Advanced Institutional Development program which has funded new programs and services under a \$1 million grant from the federal government. AIDP funds helped pay for the center's construction. The new center has also indirectly benefitted other administration offices in Lewis Hall. The service which moved to the second floor center opened space for other offices to expand on first floor.

WRESTLING PROGRAM TO BE DROPPED

Bud Brockman, director of Athletics at Morningside College announced that wrestling will be dropped from the Intercollegiate athletic program effective next Fall.

"This was a tough decision for the Athletic Department to make, but one that was inevitable in light of the sharp raise in travel costs, and equipment," Brockman said. He added that the decision to drop wrestling was thoroughly discussed with the entire coaching staff and college administration. "We came to the conclusion by dropping wrestling the overall athletic program at Morningside would remain stronger if we eliminated one sport from the program instead of making cutbacks in each sport."

Wrestling Coach Merle Masonholder said he supported the decision which was announced to the 13 members of the wrestling squad Wednesday night. "Because of inflation the college is tightening it's belt and examining the financial health of all departments in the college which, of course, includes the athletics," Masonholder said.

Masonholder will remain at the college as a physical education instructor and will be reassigned to other coaching duties. The Morningside wrestling program was established in 1961 under Dr. Allen Jackson, a Morningside professor.

Morningside is the second school in the North Central Conference to drop wrestling from its athletic program. The University of South Dakota eliminated its wrestling program in 1977.

Under long-time coach Arnie Brandt, who was head coach from 1963 to 1977, Morningside wrestlers won individual and national championships.



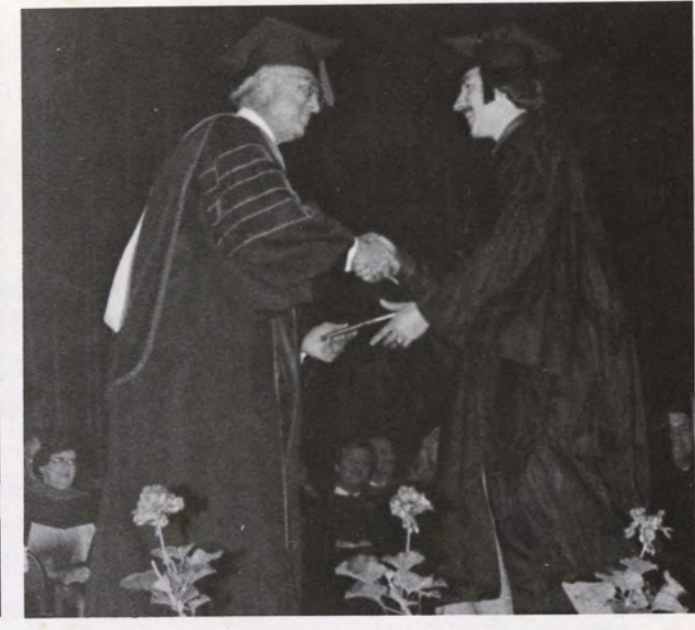
