## Total Enrollment Remains Unchanged

There are 95 new students gracing the campus this semester, of which 68 are freshmen, 10 are transfers from other universities and colleges, and 27 are continuing their formal education here at Morningside after having interrupted it. A total of 51 students dropped out of school during the first semester. These, together with those who just failed to return for the second semester, balance the number of new students, leaving the total enrollment practically unchanged at 1143. The majority of those leaving dropped out of school altogether, some, however, transferred to other schools to take more specialized work in their field. No veteran was dropped from Morningside this semester on account of low scholastic average.

## Campus Activities

The Eighth Annual Conference on Educational Problems was held at Morningside College on Saturday, March 20th, 1948. The two principal speakers at the conference were Dr. C. Gilbert Wrenn from the University of Minnesota and Dr. Marcus Bach from the University of Iowa.

The Morningside Players, under the direction of Mr. Flowers, professor of speech, presented the drama, "Antigone," an ancient Greek play, March 22, 23, and 24 in the gymnasium. Intimate staging, so successfully used in Claudia, was again the center of attraction for "Antigone."

Dr. Lewis L. Dunnington, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Iowa City, Iowa, where he serves 1500 Iowa University students, delivered his favorite theme on the Morningside campus March 1-4 in a series of five addresses; "The Power of an Idea," "Your Faith and You," "Something to Stand On," "This is Fundamental," and "A Quiet Mind and Health." Dr. Dunnington appeared in connection with the local observance of Religious Emphasis Week.

Established again after a period of six years, the Inter-Fraternity Council resumes activity as the governing organization of the Greek Social Fraternities on the campus. The Council, as well as the fraternities, was disbanded in 1942 when the war, with its resultant drainage of men from the college, made continued existence no longer feasible. Although the fraternities have been functioning for almost a year, the past two weeks have seen the first positive action taken towards activating the Council.

## Phi Sigma to Hold Alumni Banquet

The Phi Sigma fraternity will hold its Annual Duck Dinner at the Mayfair Hotel on April 2, 1948. This year the banquet, a tradition with the fraternity, will be in honor of the alumni of Phi Sigma. Approximately 400 invitations have been sent to members in cities all over the United States, and the fraternity anticipates a large alumni attendance at the semi-formal affair. Reservations for the banquet can be made through Roy Haefler, president of the fraternity, and should be addressed to Phi Sigma, Morningside College, Sioux City, Iowa. ## Maroons Open Spring Drills

### Many Report for Track, Baseball, Tennis and Golf

Forty baseball candidates have been working out in the Morningside college gymnasium under the direction of Coach Les Davis.

Included in this group are eight returning lettermen and three service award winners from last year's squad. Missing from the roster are Bob Held and LaVerne Luther through graduation, and Dick Bornholdt, the big gun in the Maroons' batting attack, because of a grade-point deficiency.

The men have been going through arm conditioning exercises mostly with an eye toward the time when they can get outside to start batting practice. A squad reduction to 25 men will be made when the weather permits workouts to be held on Bass field.

Two games have been scheduled with Sheldon junior college for the B squad. They will be played on a home-and-home basis. Another game also has been added to the varsity schedule. The Maroons will meet the Buena Vista college Beavers April 27 on Bass field.

Thirty men have been reporting to track coach Chuck Obye and have been

undergoing conditioning workouts on the indoor track in the gymnasium. Some cross country running has been on the practice menu when weather permitted. Next week they will start working on individual events.

A four-man golf team will be selected from the 14 candidates reporting to tennis and golf coach Al Buckingham. This team will be determined by a ladder-elimination tournament as soon as the city's golf courses are ready for play.

A tournament also will be held to select the six-man tennis team from the 10 candidates who have had to confine their workouts to the gym until the weather breaks and allows work on the tennis courts.

## Awards Given To 12 Maroons

Coach Al Buckingham has announced that 12 varsity basketball players received major awards for the 1947-48 season.

Those receiving awards are Bill Briggs, Sioux City; Clayton Bristow, Sioux City; Basil Brock, Battle Creek; Don Coome, Salem, S. D.; Bob Downing, Ute; Howard Harmon, Pisgah; Henry Langstraat, Newkirk; Bob Norris, Alexander, S. D., Wally Piper, Sioux City; John Wansink, Sioux City; Dick Wiedenfeld, Sioux City; and John Williams, Sloan.

Bill Briggs, who received his third basketball letter along with John Wansink, who earned his second major award, are the only seniors. Clayton Bristow and Henry Langstraat also received their second major award.

Bristow, selected honorary captain by his teammates and most valuable player on the squad, was high scorer for the maroons with a season total of 197 points in 20 games for an average of 9.9 points.

### Morningside Class Rooms Depopulated By the Epidemic

SIOUX CITY, Ia., March 1.—Special: An epidemic of the mumps has depopulated the class rooms at Morningside college. Nearly a hundred students are suffering from the disease, and it is rapidly spreading. The afflicted students have not been kept in their rooms, and almost the entire student body has been exposed.

## Basketball Season Ends

A fighting Augustana College Viking quintet staved off a second half rush at Alumni gym February 24 to hang up a 55 to 48 North Central conference victory over the Maroons. After a dismal initial half which saw the Maroons hit a poor percentage of their shots from both the foul line and floor and end up on the short end of a 33 to 19 count, they suddenly came to life during the last half. They drew within four points at 52 to 48 during the waning minutes of the game but a rangy forward by the name of Haugejord proved to be too tough and iced the game for the Vikings. The Maroon scoring was fairly evenly divided with forward Bob Downing's 10 points being Morningside's best individual offer.

The Maroons played their best game of the season against the Panthers of Iowa State Teachers at Cedar Falls on February 28, but lady luck was against the ill-fated Maroons and a last second desperation shot by Jespersen of the Tutors sank the Maroons' hopes for victory in what was the best game of the entire 1947-48 North Central league crown race. The Maroons had the Panthers playing the brand of ball they wanted them to play and it was a grueling kind of dog fight with both

squads scrapping for that precious winning point. The loss of center Dick Wiedenfeld and forward Clayton Bristow via the foul route during the fourth quarter hurt the Maroons' hopes for victory. The work of guards Wally Piper and Bob Norris sparked the Maroon defense which prevented the Panthers from establishing three records they were out to set. Forward Bob Downing's scoring eye was off for the first time in many games, but he played an excellent floor game in helping to set up many of the Maroons' scoring plays. The work of reserves Don Coome and Forest McElmurray was also commended highly by Coach Al Buckingham, and it would have been McElmurray's hook shot making the score 40 to 39 that would have spelled victory for the Maroons had it not been for that last second shot by Jespersen. Bristow of the Maroons shared scoring honors for the evening with Coome, each having garnered 16 points.

The Maroons dropped the curtain on their disastrous 1947-48 cage season at Alumni gym March 2 by absorbing their seventh straight defeat, losing to a speedy little Western Union College five 45 to 42. As far as the Maroons were concerned, they lowered the screen three minutes too late for it looked as

if they might break their month long losing streak when the Golden Eagles came from behind by turning loose a blistering six-point assault. The Maroons can charge much of their defeat to a faulty free throw performance which saw them net only six out of 22 attempts. Cayton Bristow again led the Maroon scoring with 10 points.

## Maroons Card Bowling Green

Athletic Director Les Davis of Morningside college has announced the addition of Bowling Green State university to the Maroons' 1948 football schedule.

The game will be played at Bowling Green, O., on the afternoon of November 13.

This will be the first long football trip Morningside college has taken since it played Hardin-Simmons university at Abilene, Texas, in 1936.

The addition of this tilt brings the schedule to nine games with one open date, October 30, remaining to be filled.

Workouts will begin August 30, which is the earliest opening date of football practice in North Central conference history, because of early night games.
