I was seventy years of age on November 14 of the year just passed. I am, therefore, requesting that my term as president of Morningside College be completed not later than July 1, 1956.

I was elected to this position on February 7, 1936. I assumed the office on April 17 of the same year. Twenty years are comparatively short in the existence of institutions. They are, however, a considerable span in the lives of persons.

In retrospect, however, twenty years seem very short and very wonderful. The experiences have been inexpressibly meaningful and happy. I have loved every minute of it. The host of happy student personalities, the lists of faithful faculty and staff associations, the splendid cooperation of Board members, the loyalty of alumni, the warmth of Sioux City and Siouxland friends, have filled the months and the years with experience which are evidences of the goodness of God and the fellowship of men.

To one and all, Mrs. Roadman and I want to say with fervent gratitude, thank you for the privilege of these twenty years.

Dr. Roadman Resigns

On February 7, exactly twenty years to the day he was elected president, Dr. Earl A. Roadman submitted the Board of Trustees of the college, the resignation to be effective July 1.

The Board moved that the resignation be accepted with regret and that, upon the taking effect of his retirement, he be elected president emeritus of Morningside College.

The twenty years of Dr. Roadman's administration have been years of growth for the college. A great building program has been developed. The A. W. Jones Hall of Science, The George Allee Gymnasium, the O'Donoghue Observatory, and the Men's Dormitory have been erected. The old auditorium in Main Hall was remodeled into the Klinger Forum, remodeling improved the Conservatory, and the old Alumni Gym will be completely changed into a modern library by June 1.

Dr. and Mrs. Roadman will go to Europe this summer as tour leaders, after that their plans are uncertain.

The Board of Trustees took action to obtain a successor for Dr. Roadman.

MID-TERM COMMENCEMENT

Dr. Kenneth Metcalf '38, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Cedar Falls, was the speaker at the Mid-Year graduation exercises, which were held in Grace Methodist Church on February 1.

Seven seniors were presented for degrees by Dean Thomas Tweito. The diplomas were awarded by Dr. Earl A. Roadman.

Mary Jane Tawney O'Meara received Cum Laude honors.

The Brass Ensemble under the direction of Mr. James Hustis of the Conservatory faculty furnished the music.

Dr. Metcalf is at present in Alaska as one of the 16 members of a preaching mission to that country.

Portrait of Miss Dimmitt

A portrait of Miss Dimmitt is to be hung over the fire-place in Lillian E. Dimmitt Hall. In January of this year Miss Dimmitt flew to Cleveland and was the guest of Cornelius and Margaret Eerkes, who had made arrangements for her to sit for a portrait to be painted by Rolf Stoll.

Mr. Stoll is the head of the department of portrait painting at the Cleveland Institute of Art. A native of Germany, the artist was trained in the Academies of Fine Arts at Karlsruhe and at Stuttgart, and at the Art Students League in New York. He has exhibited widely and has painted many famous people of the middle west.

The Eerkes are sponsoring this portrait as a part of a Lillian E. Dimmitt Memorial. They are Morningside alumni of the class of 1924. Margaret was Miss Dimmitt's secretary during her college career. Cornelius returned to Morningside following graduate work at Northwestern as a member of the faculty. Following that he entered the mercantile field and is now an executive of the Higbee store in Cleveland.

Miss Dimmitt was accompanied on her trip to Cleveland by her niece, Frances Kolp Gingles '18.

Since her return the portrait has been finished, and Mrs. Eerkes writes of their complete satisfaction with it. She says, "You are so real that I would not be a bit surprised if you moved, or started speaking... There is dignity, warmth, intelligence and much beauty of character, all captivated in oil in a very interesting portrait study... I think this portrait will mean much to the girls in the dormitory, and it will be a joy to all who have had the good fortune to know you."

The portrait will be presented to the college at a date to be announced.

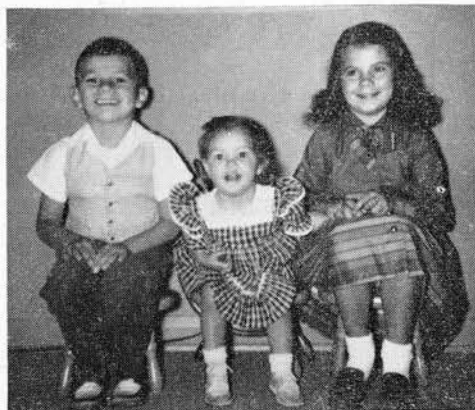
Dr. James C. Olson, a Morningside graduate of the class of 1938, was named chairman of the history department of the State University of Nebraska, effective September first.

IN MEMORIAM

Christian N. Jepson, 83 year old Sioux City attorney, died on January 17. Mr. Jepson attended the University of the Northwest, which later became Morningside College. He received his law degree in 1894 from the State University of Iowa and practiced law for 46 years before his retirement. He served in the Iowa legislature for two years. Survivors include 3 sons and 3 daughters.

Elizabeth Nixon, class of 1935, was killed in an auto accident on January 17. Her brother, Glenn Nixon, 1923, was injured and Mrs. Glenn Nixon was killed in the same accident. Elizabeth received her master's degree in Journalism from Northwestern University and had been a member of the faculty of Westminster College, New Wilmington, Pennsylvania, for ten years. She was the daughter of the late Rev. F. B. Nixon and Mrs. Nixon, who lives at 2523 S. Cypress, Sioux City. Three sisters, Mrs. Simeon Hickman 1925, and Mrs. William Earlich of Sioux City, Mrs. Floyd Becker of LeMars, and a brother, Cecil of Norfolk, Nebraska survive.

The Rev. Arthur Hopkinson '23 of Greenfield, Massachusetts, died January 23 of a heart attack. Mr. Hopkinson was born in England and came to this country in 1910. He enrolled in the Academy of Morningside and later graduated from Morningside college. He was granted a degree from Boston University School of Theology and took graduate work at Harvard Divinity School. Mrs. Hopkinson and two sons, Arthur, Jr., minister to Methodist students at Syracuse University, and Victor, an engineer with General Electric in Lynn, Massachusetts survive him.

The weatherman permitting, Football Coach Dewey Halford, will call out his 1956 gridiron hopefuls for spring practice the last week in March.
