Morningside's Homecoming Queen was crowned by Dr. Roadman Friday night at a ceremony during the intermission of the traditional Homecoming Dance in Allee Gymnasium. Miss Bonnie Schrader, senior from Rudd, Ia., English and Sociology major, and a member of Kappa Pi Alpha sorority, was chosen queen. Her attendants were Miss Norma Jean Peters, Gilmore City, Ia., and Miss Charmaine Reed, Osmond, Nebr. The Siouxland Four, Sioux City's male quartet, sang for the queen and her attendants after the coronation event. The large crowd of alumni and students danced to the music of Mal Dunn and his orchestra in the beautifully decorated gym.

Saturday was the big day, of course. Beginning with the parade at 10:00 a. m., there was not a lull in the celebration until the last Morningsider had filed out of the football stadium after the Maroons had triumphed over the Augustana Vikings, 25-0.

Second prize went to Kappa Pi Alpha sorority with its argyle sock float bearing the slogan, "Argyle's Sock 'Em." Three bands participated in the parade, those of Morningside College, Central High School, and an Alumni Pep Band, organized by Mr. Robert Lowry, Morningside band director.

Cornell College of Mt. Vernon and Morningside College of Sioux City have thus far received \$204,500 in cash and pledges.

The two Methodist schools are conducting a campaign to raise \$500,000 for each institution by about December 1.

The \$204,500 raised thus far is the result of less than three weeks of active solicitation among the Methodists of north Iowa.

Cornell has raised \$120,000 and Morningside, \$84,500.

Left to right they are: Bernadine Hickey, Elaine Bovis, Jo Ann Hammerstrom, Judy Larson and Connie Saris.

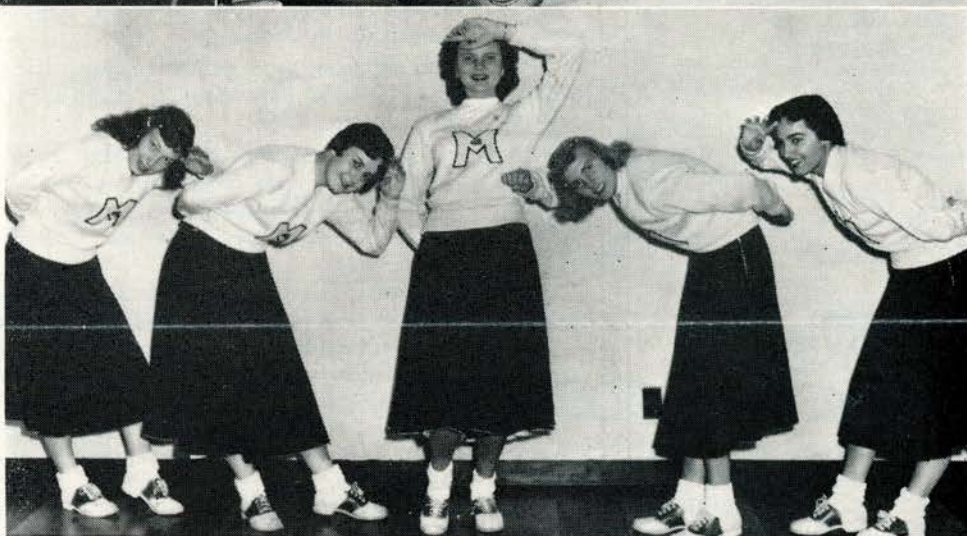
Alumni are Welcomed

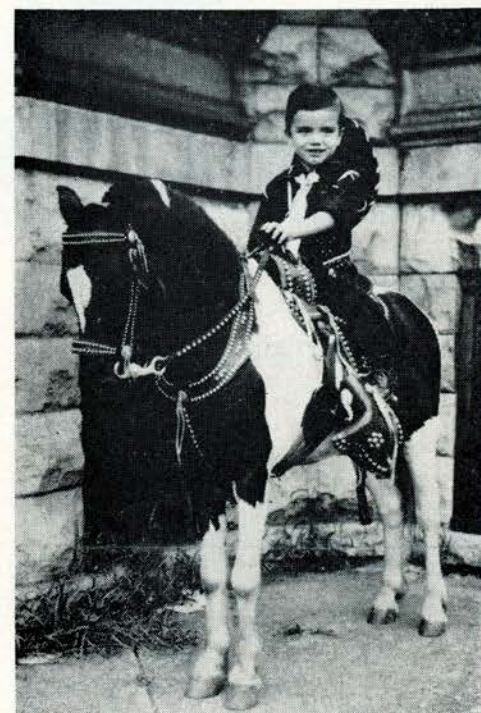

MAROONS IN ACTION

The Morningside football Maroons began the 1951 campaign with a victory and a loss in their first two home starts.

In the season inaugural Coach Drouillard's team demoralized a strong Minnesota State Teachers eleven 14-0 and the following week barely missed spilling powerful South Dakota State. The final score showed the Jacks on top 28-26.

Ralph Ginn, South Dakota State mentor, termed the Morningside game a "bad physical beating" for his defending conference champions. The visitors, regarded as one of the best small college teams in the nation, ran up a 14-point lead in the first 20 minutes and looked like easy winners.

The never-say-die Maroons then stormed back with Tony Levitto and Curt Creglow leading a devastating ground attack, to score 26 straight points against the bewildered Bunnies. Terrific line play on the part of Gl O'Doherty, Ken Bengford, Jack Reardon and the other forwards held State to a meager number of yards gained during the comeback.

Late in the game Morningside's lack of line depth began to tell and State, powered by halfback Pete Retzlaff, squeaked to victory.

Morningside was again the victim of a late splurge September 29 as the Maroons dropped a North Central conference game to North Dakota U. 21 to 16.

After North Dakota had pulled ahead with two touchdowns, Dick Weikert punched over a second tally from one yard out. Morningside led 16 to 14 but a late 85-yard march won the game for the Nodaks.
