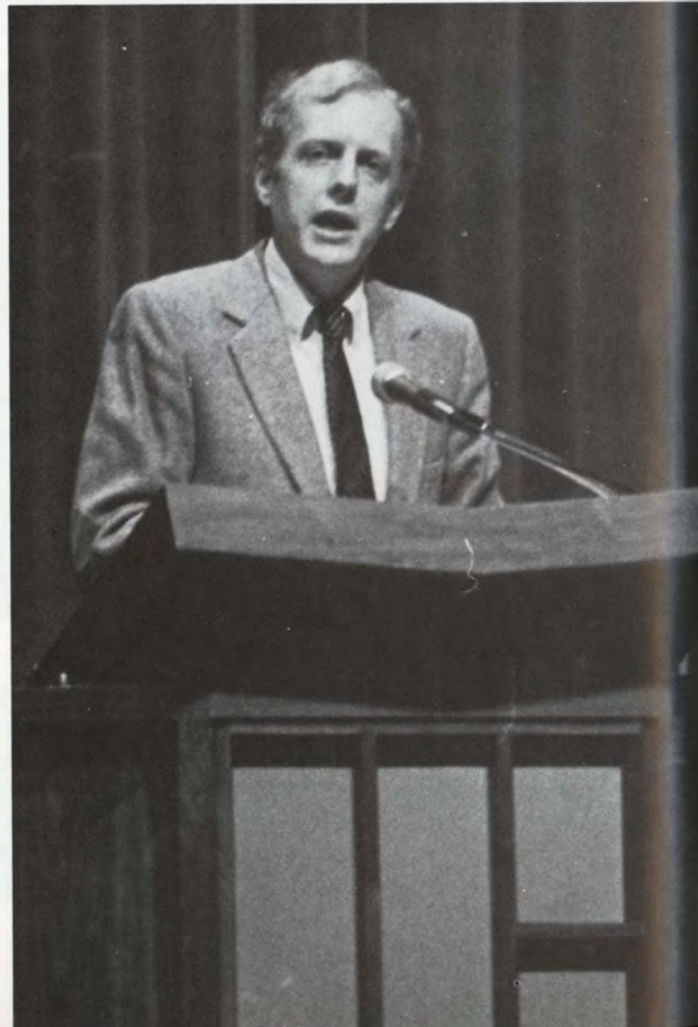

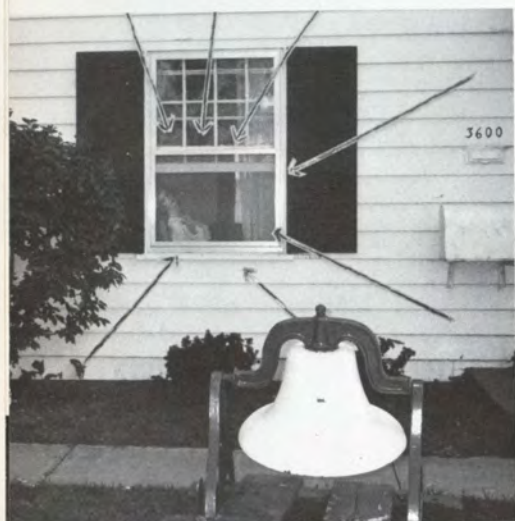

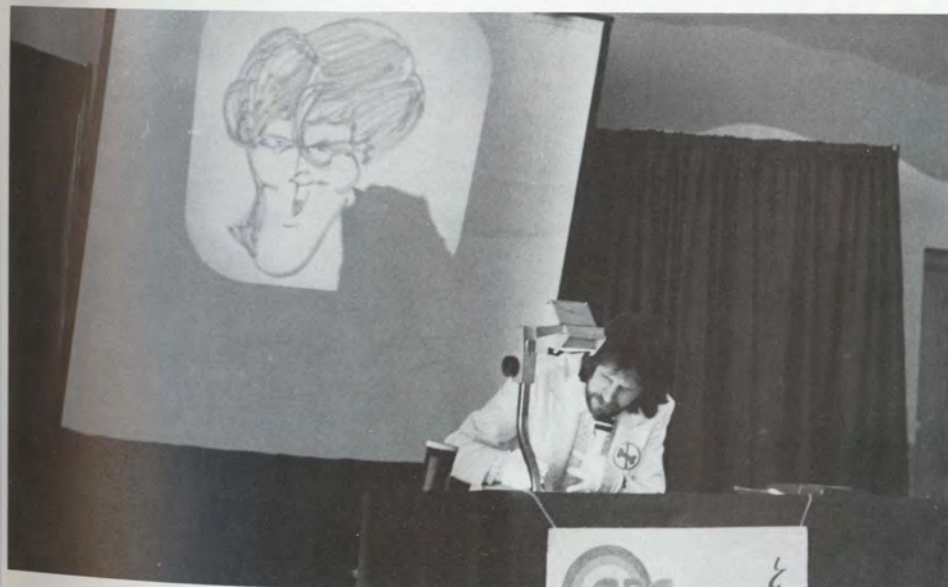
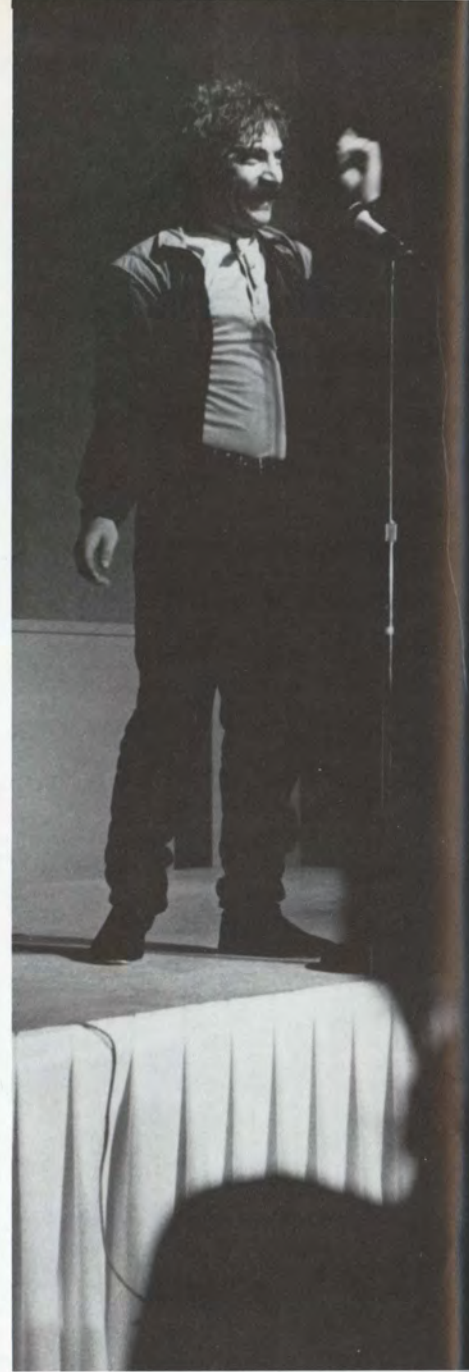


Performers add life to living

Their voices, movements, and breath filled our halls with energy and gave us incentive to strive for our best, to reveal our interstitial selves.



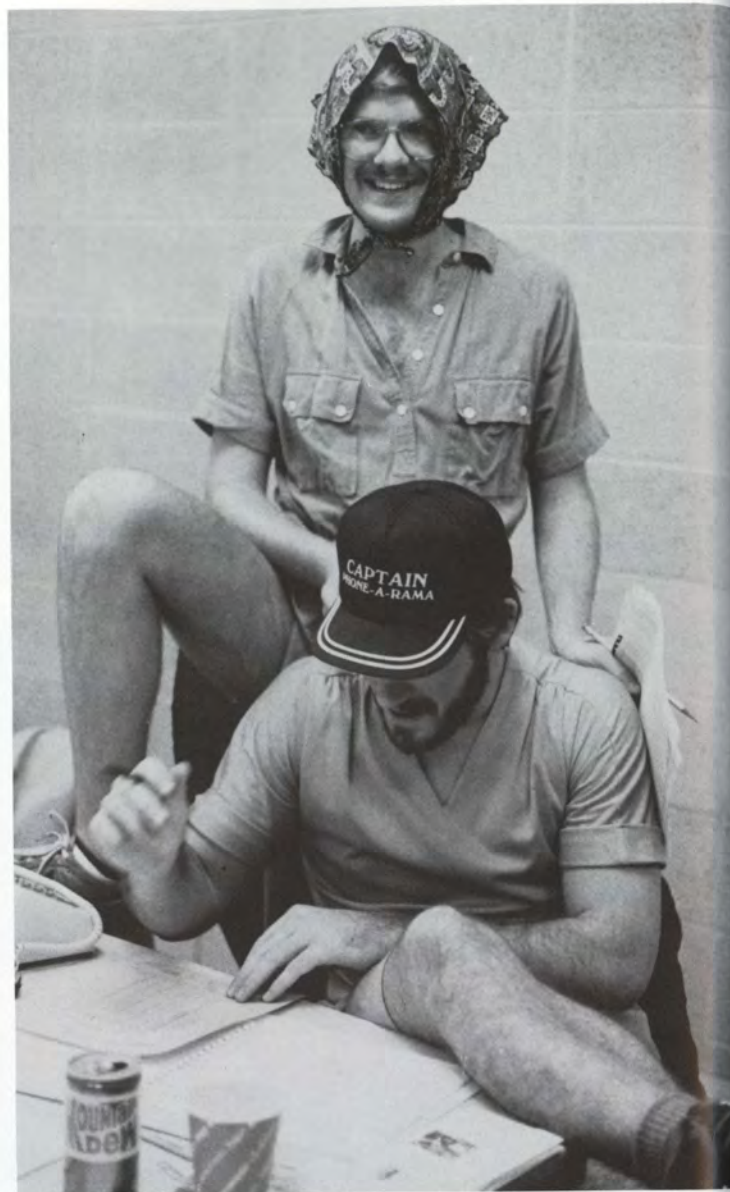

Phone-A-Rama exceeds goal

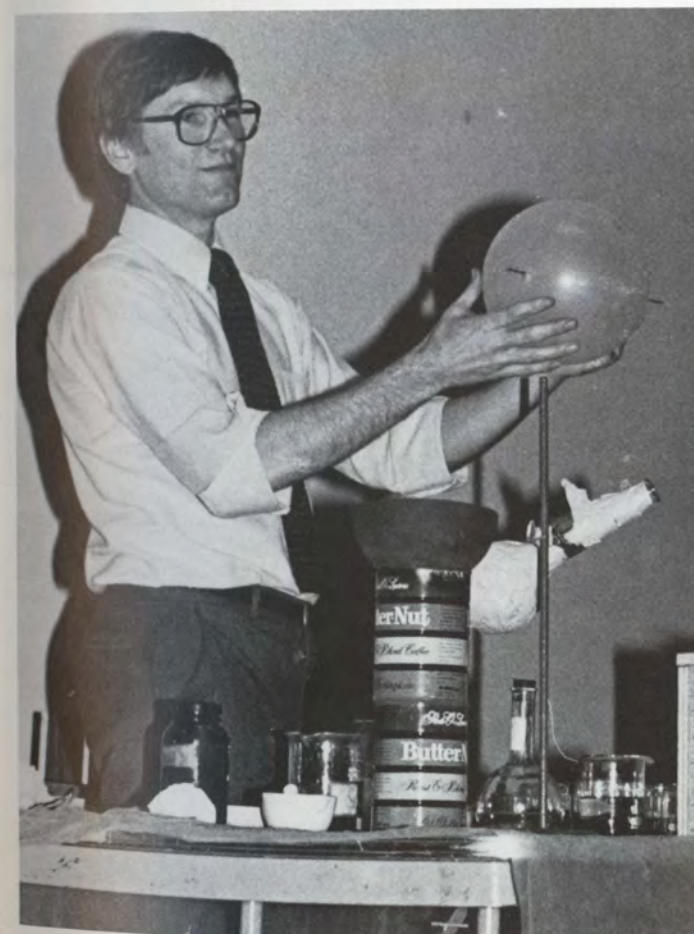

. . . was the message Arturo Revelo Magana brought about Americans' attitudes toward their country's involvement in Central America. Arturo Spoke during the Global Awareness "Focus on Central America" program Nov. 8-10. Other speakers for the program were Rev. Robert S. Crandall and faculty Dr. Bruce Forbes and Dr. Dave McAlpine.

The Global Awareness series brought another program March 13-15, entitled "Human Rights." Speakers were Doris Strieter from Amnesty International, James Thyden from the State Dept., and faculty Dr. John Lawrence and Rev. Steve Plymale. Plymale was the Director of the program, which was created to "clarify issues, raise questions, discuss options and encourage thought and concern;" Kary Olsen was the Student Director.

The campus was visited by democratic presidential hopefuls Alan Cranston, Gary Hart, and George McGovern, but student turn-out to the events was very low.

A student/faculty demonstration was organized by Young Democrats President Andrew Barnebey on Nov. 2 protesting the U.S.'s invasion of Grenada to rescue Americans allegedly in danger there.

Some students disagreed with the protesters, including one senior who was quoted in the Collegian Reporter, "I'm all for kicking Communist butts. Grenada is the only country the U.S. could beat."



A group of concerned faculty and students - Morningsiders for Peace and Justice - organized to generate political interest and/or action. The group set up a "Firebreaks II" on March 25 at which participants role-played American and Russian leaders in a crucial situation.

Other political action included a program by retired Rear Admiral Gene R. LaRocque called "Beyond War: A New Way of Thinking;" a forum and discussion with State Rep. Al Sturgeon; and convo with Dr. Gary Orren, from Harvard, speaking on "The 1984 Presidential Campaign: A Look Behind-the-Scenes."

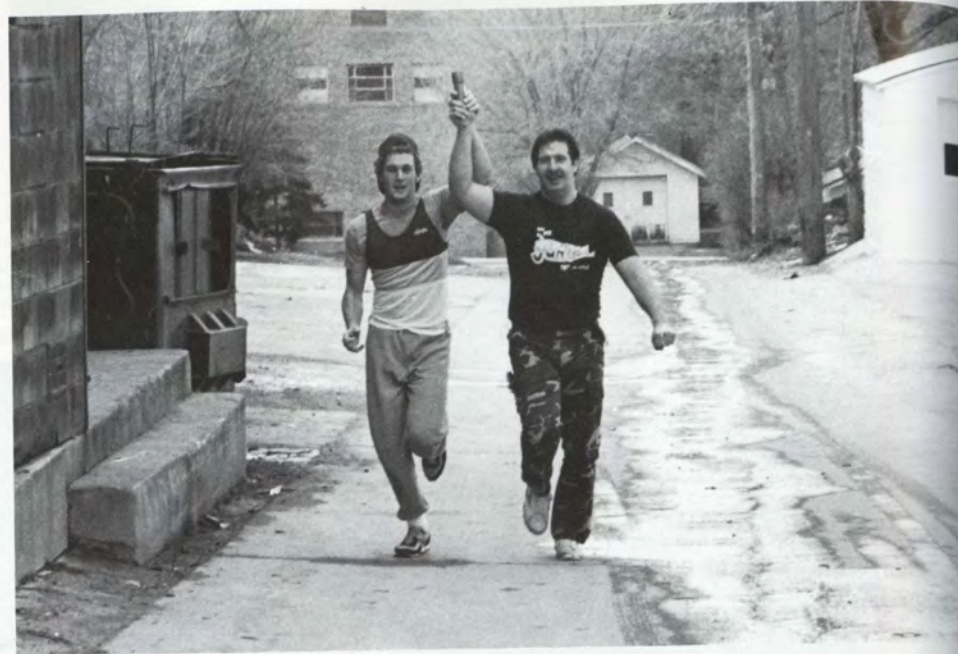

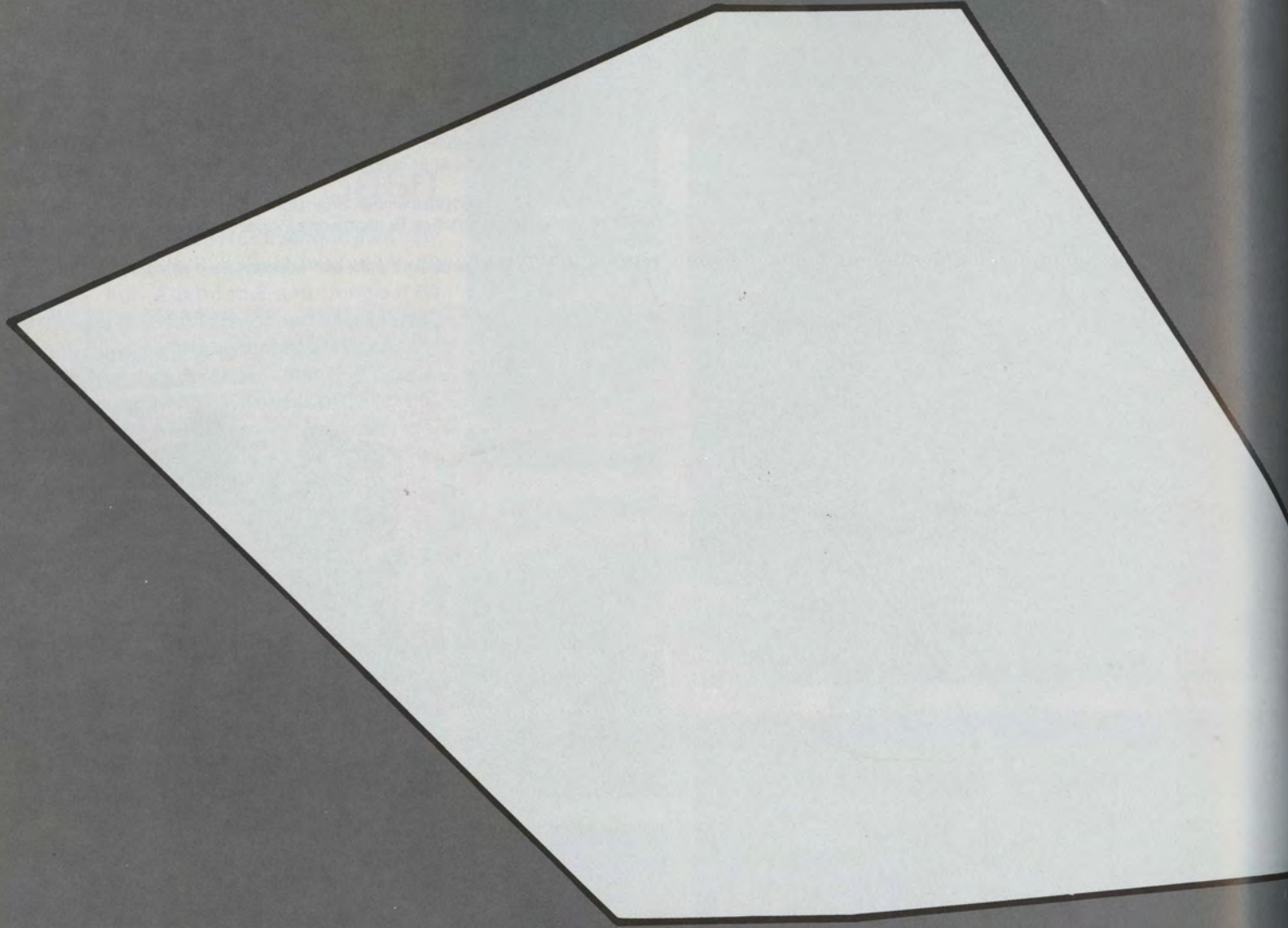

The Collegian Reporter

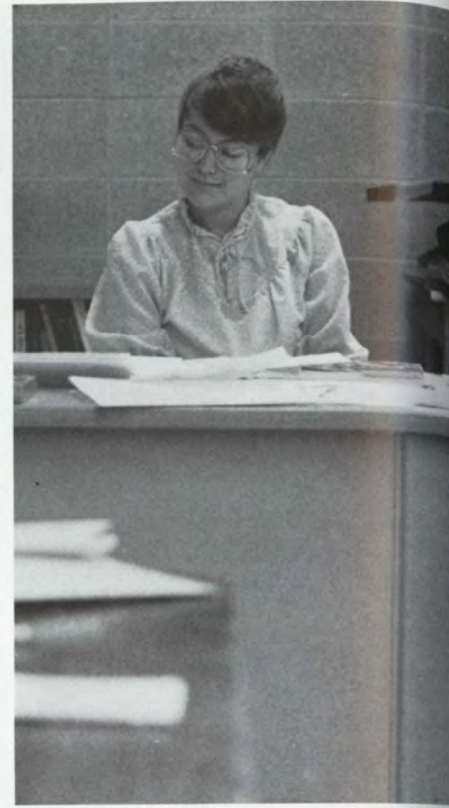

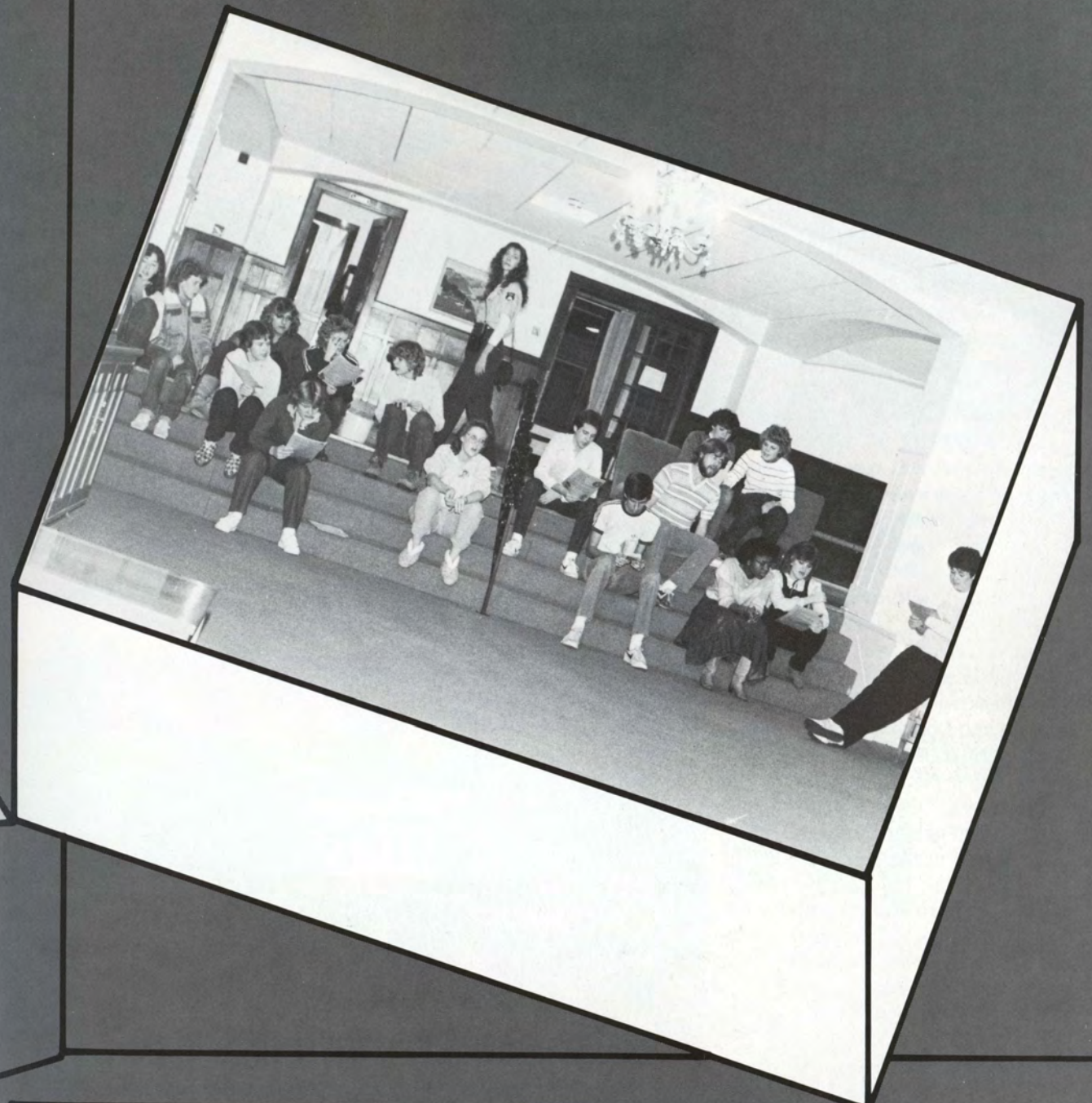
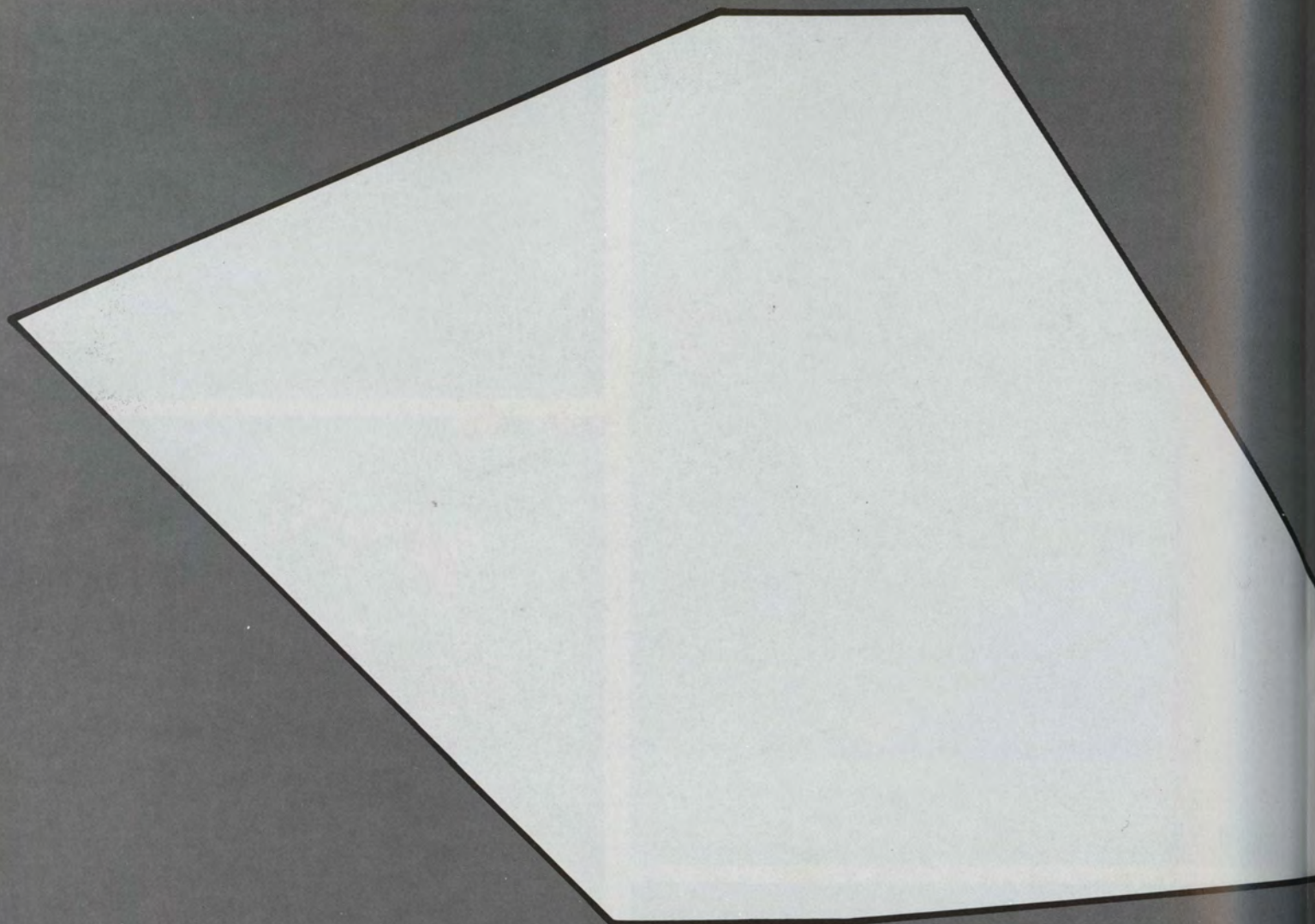

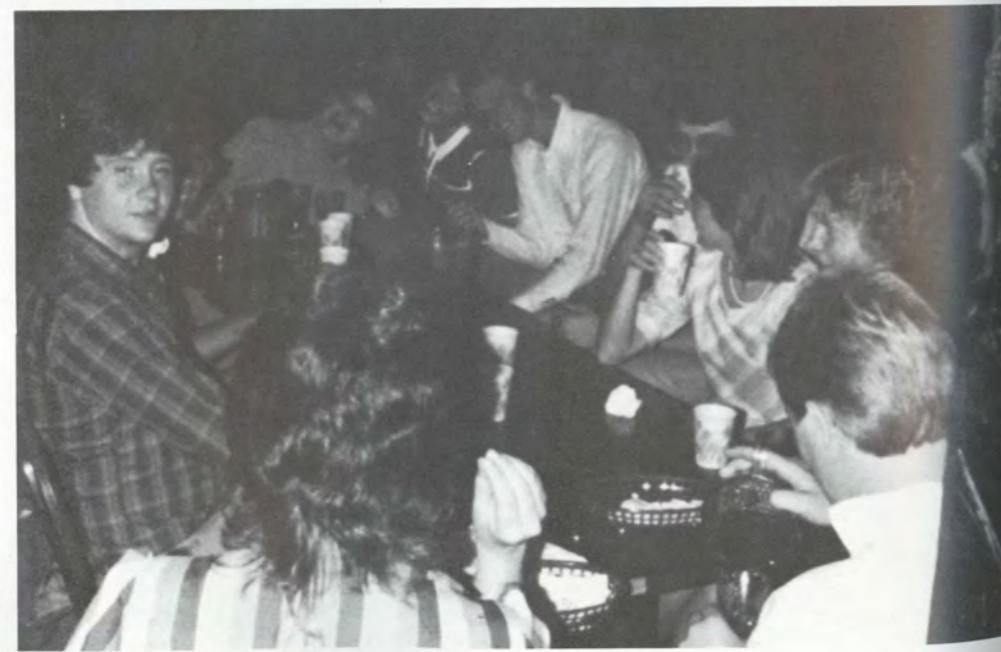

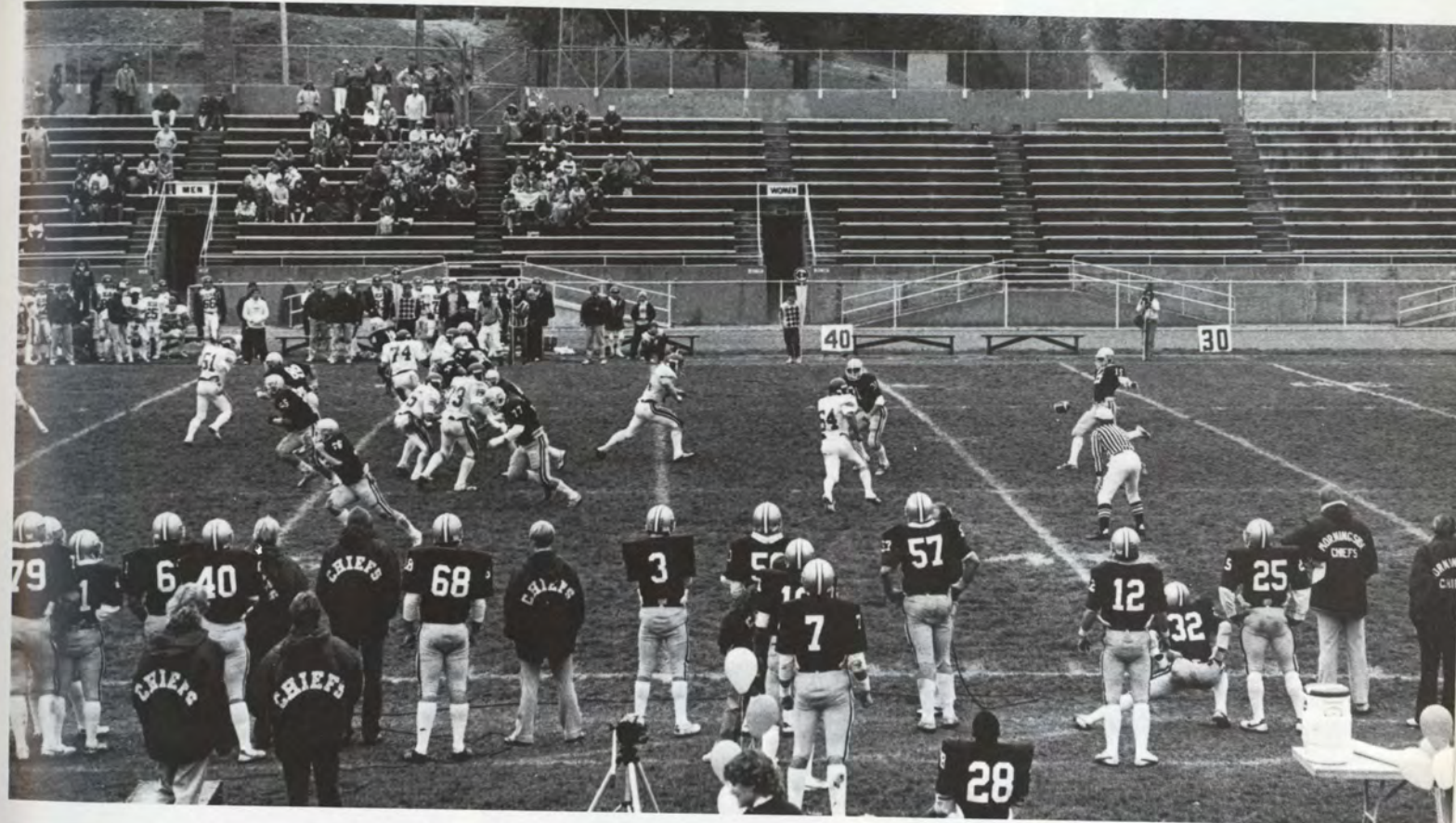
Young Chiefs gain experience

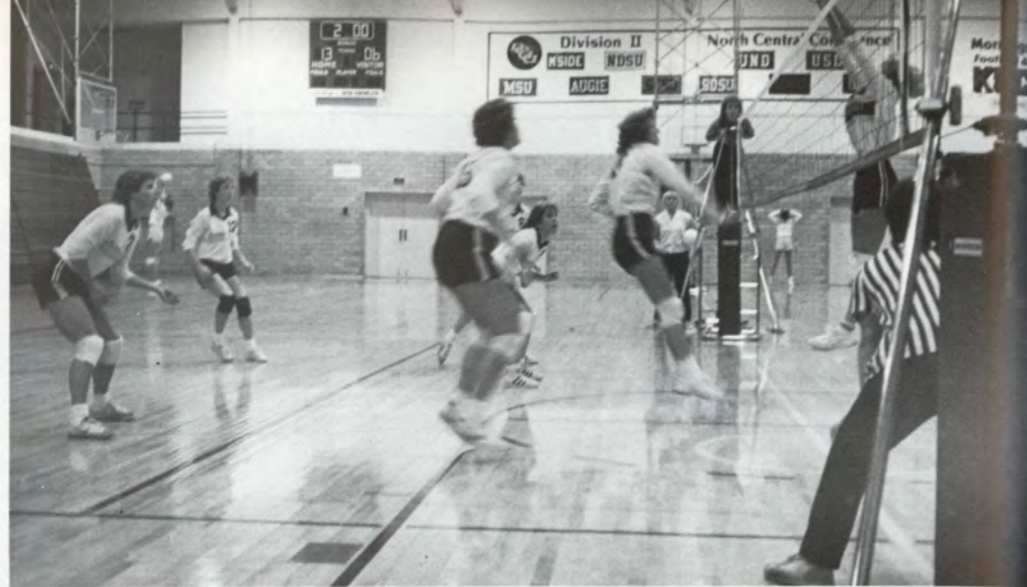

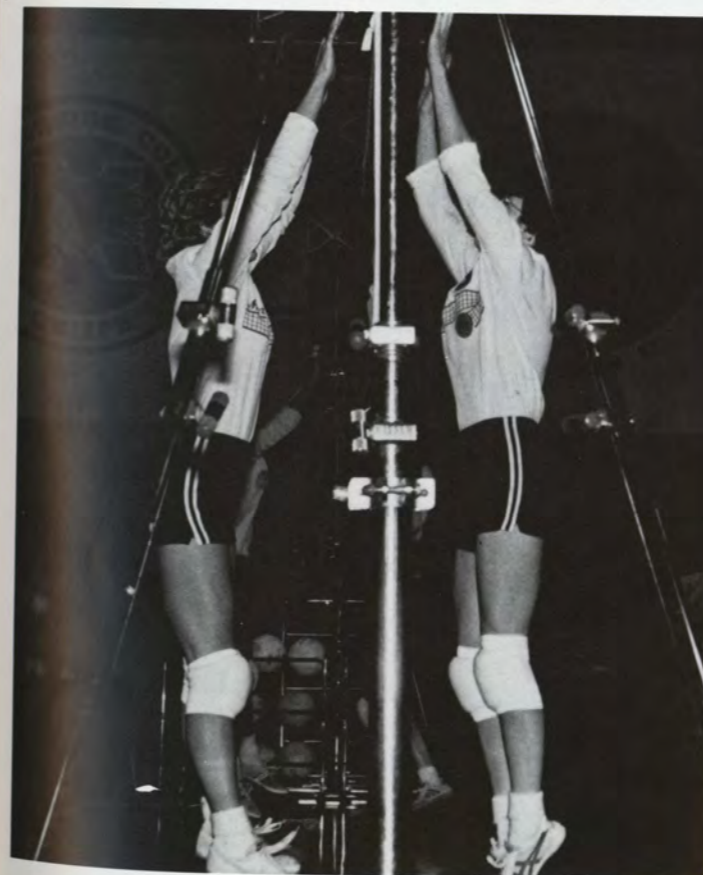

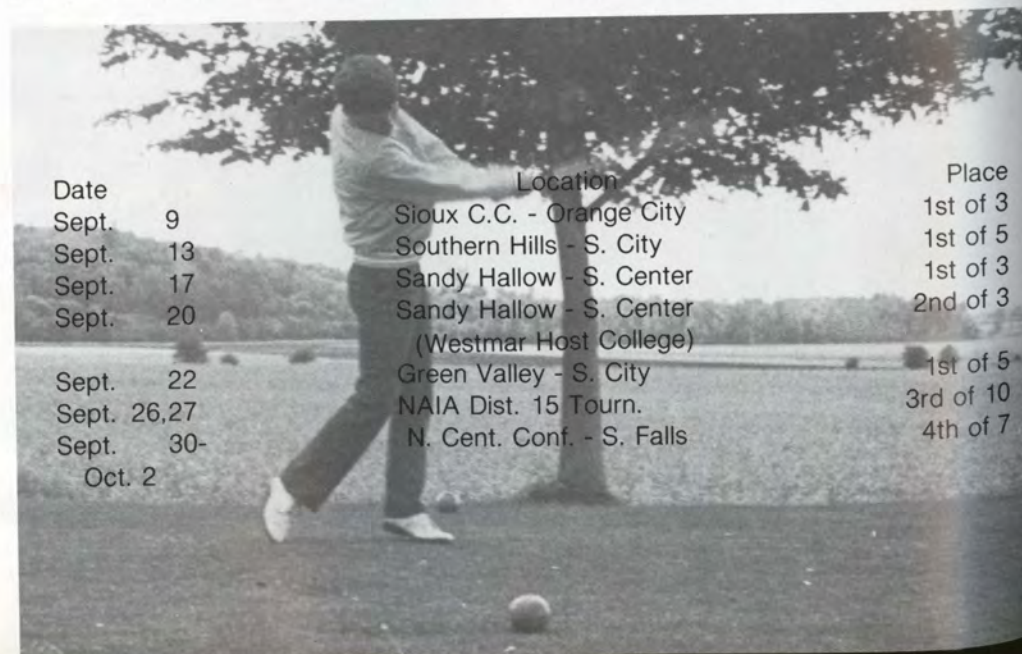
Golf team dominates

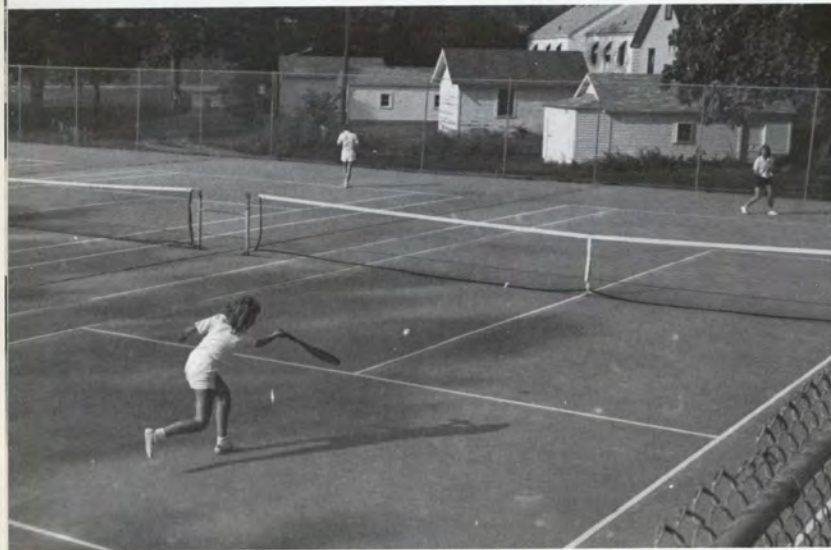

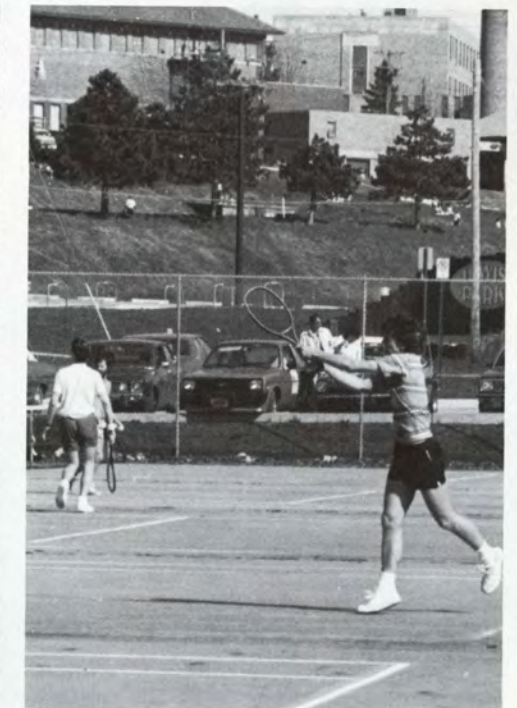

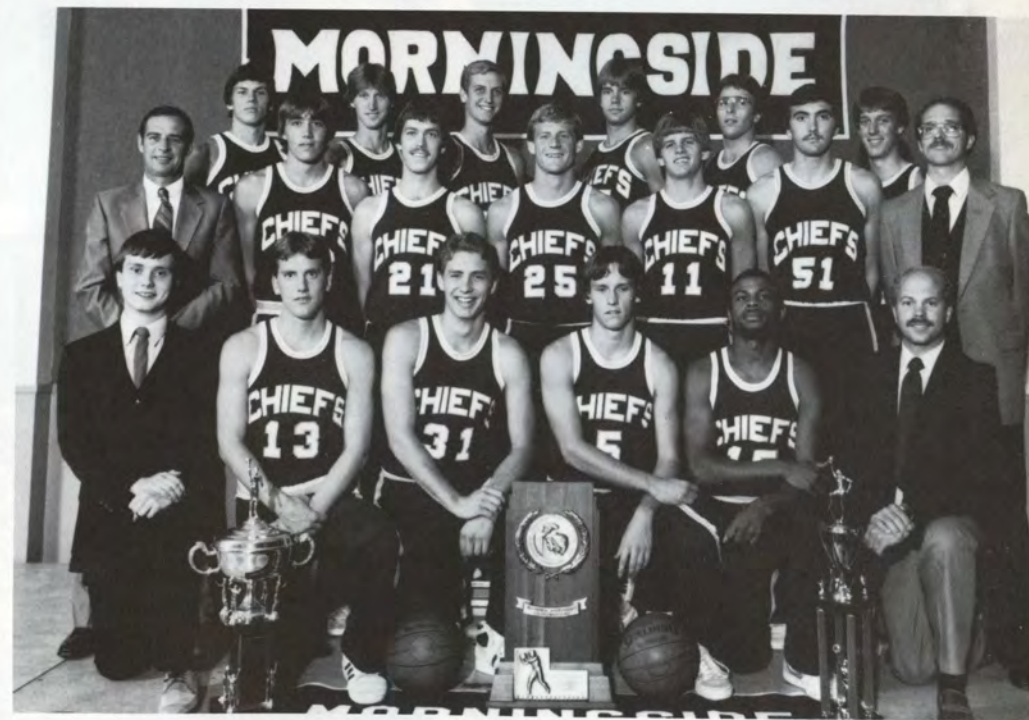

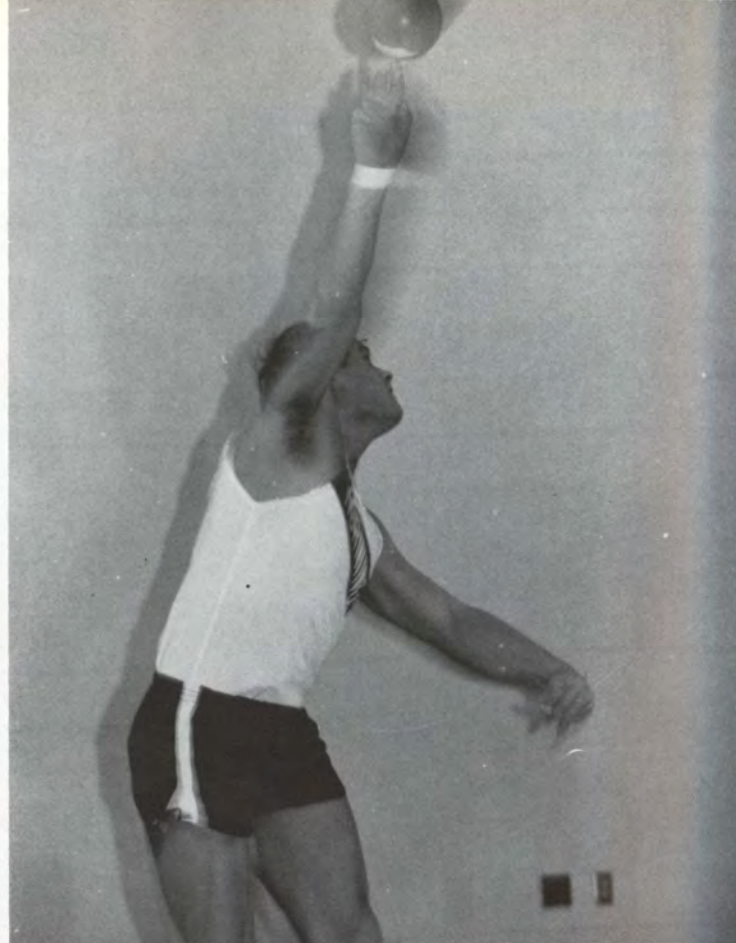

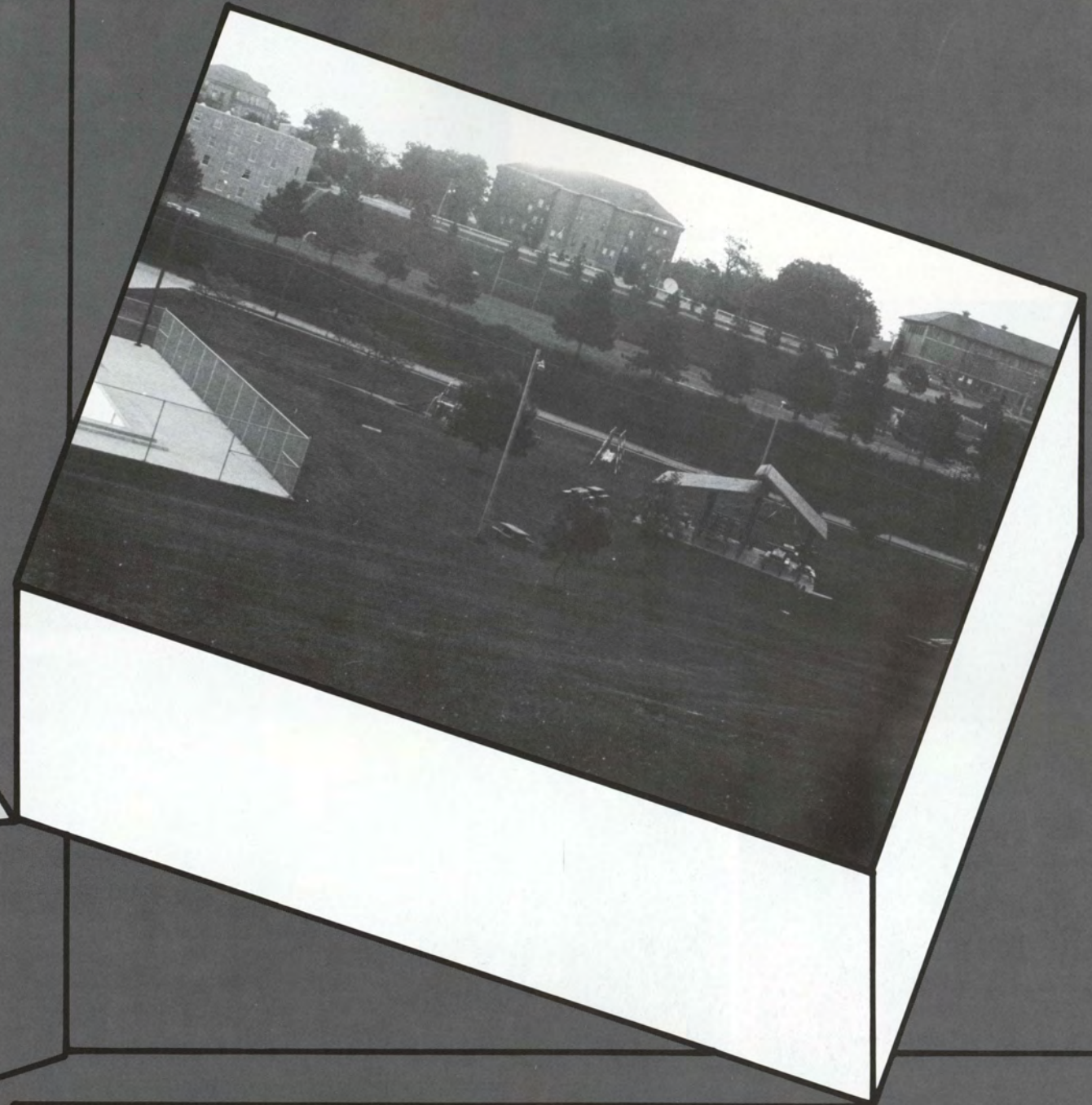
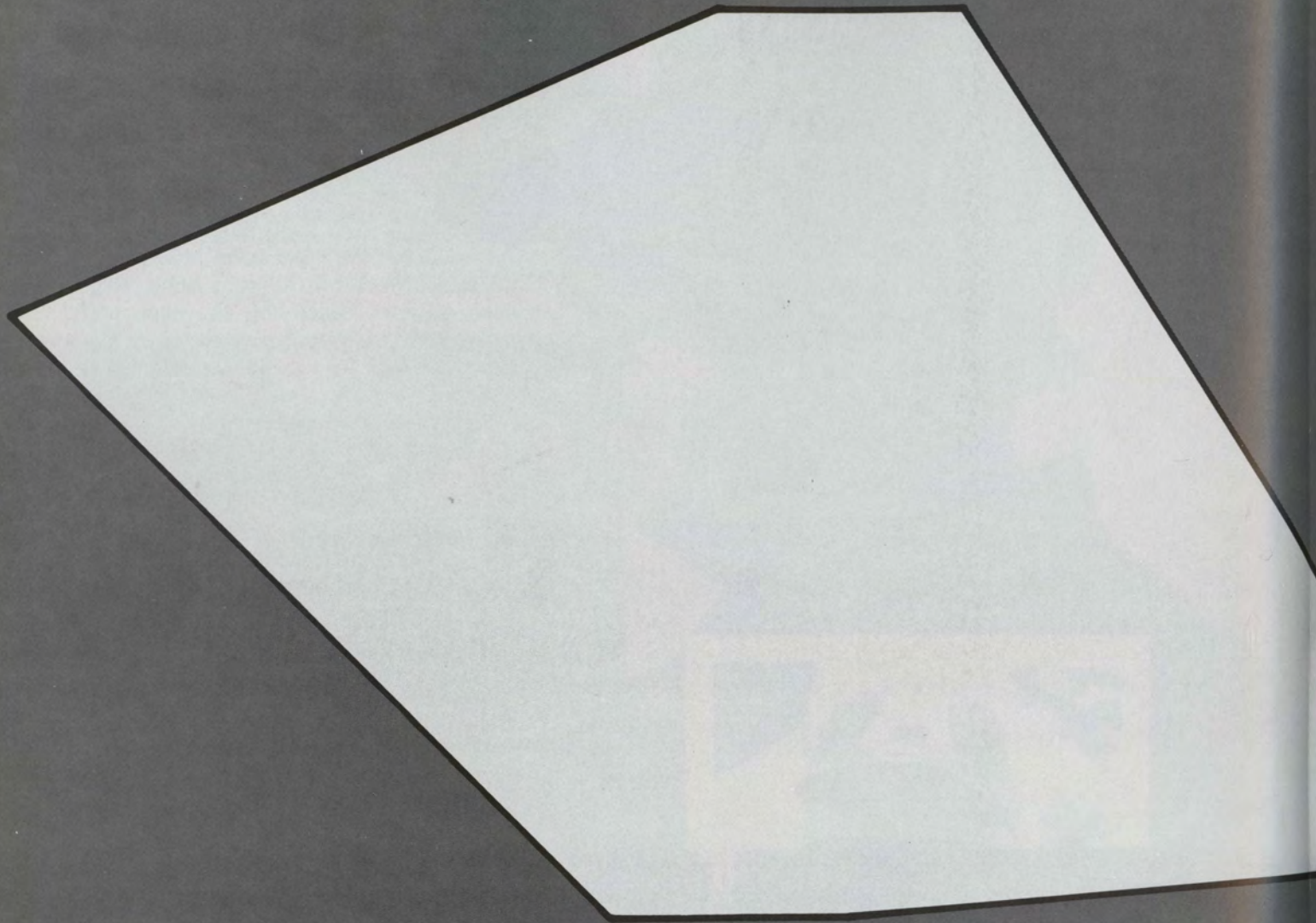
Donald H. "Pro" Protexter, Morningside College's Director of Athletics since 1980, head baseball coach for 28 years, and member of the Economics and Business Administration faculty, died on August 4, 1983.

"Pro" was born November 4, 1922, in Larchwood, Iowa. He graduated from Little Rock High School in 1940 and then entered the military during World War II. After the war he married Marvella Christians of Little Rock and graduated from Morningside College in 1949. He then taught and coached at Albert City High School.

Mr. Protexter earned his Master's Degree from Drake University in 1955 and then came to Morningside. His Maroon Chiefs baseball team won conference championships in 1960, 64, 78, 80. In addition, he was an assistant football and basketball coach in his earlier years.

Protexter's honors include: Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association's College Coach of the Year, 1973 and 1980, and its Hall of Fame; NCAA Area Coach of the Year; NAIA Baseball Coaches Association Helms Hall of Fame; North Central Conference Hall of Fame.

Don Protexter was an example of dedication. In the words of President Miles Tommeraaen, a long-time friend, "To him, coaching was more than just winning and losing. He was constantly working to improve the performance of his athletes, the quality of life at the College, and to instill a sense of sportsmanship and fair play on and off the field in all of his players."

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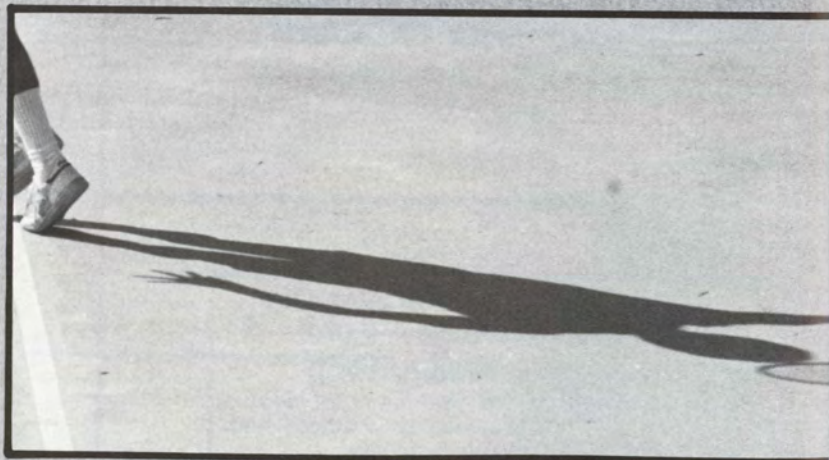
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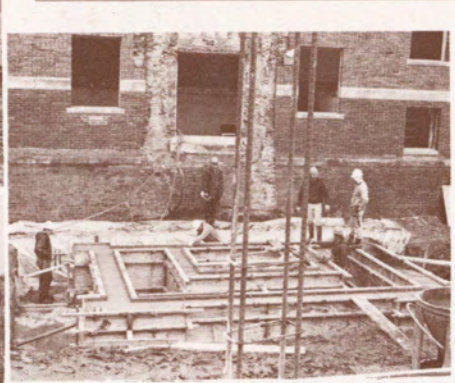
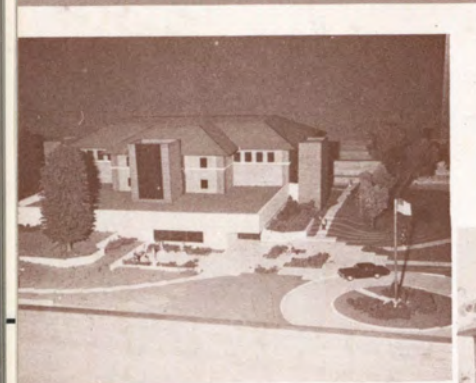
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My shadow is my alternate.
