
The Expanding Vision of Academic Pursuit



Morningside College has traditionally emphasized the values of a liberal arts education. This year the college community grappled with the issues of redefining and restructuring its approach to such an education. The Curriculum Planning Committee, formed during the 1969-70 term, worked long hours this year to produce sweeping changes in the academic structure of the College. Instead of the three traditional divisions (Humanities, Natural Science, and Social Science) the college will now have four, the fourth being a division of Fine Arts.

Many of the approved changes, such as the reduction of Core requirements, will go into effect during the 1971-72 school year. However, a new grading policy, aimed at eliminating the highly punitive aspects of the grading system, was introduced retroactively, to the disgruntlement of some, and the delight of many. This change, wherein an F simply means no credit, and is not averaged into the grade point, reflects a belief that the real ability of the student is not always accurately reflected by the grades he receives, and that the effects of punishment for failure frequently serve to discourage rather than encourage greater effort.

A new philosophy of Education, which would recognize the value of the total campus experience to the educational process, is not in any way to detract from the importance of the Academic disciplines; if anything, it is intended to strengthen them by the increased use of outside sources for class discussions and projects. The future looks very hopeful.




The Humanities

The Humanities division attempts to provide an approach to the cognitive and questioning aspects of man and his culture. Our understanding of our nature as humanity is central to our ability to cope with life. All of the greatest works of literature, the greatest philosophies and the greatest religions of the world reflect a striving; an enquiry into the nature of truth (or truths).

The teaching of the humanities demands a sensitivity to what is frequently intangible and always subject to variant interpretation. Thus one cannot be heavy-handed in his approach. To recognize that we are human, no matter what our cultural heritage, is the first step of scholarship. For with this recognition comes the realization that what we learn, what we teach is fallible; it cannot be deified. And this humility is essential to the best student.






Religious Studies




Speech & Drama

The Department of Speech and Drama offers training in oral communication, and an appreciation for the way in which rhetoric can be a forceful power in determining the attitudes and opinions of the speaker's audience.

Drama presents what must be called a surrealistic approach to a presentation of life. Characters and events which are no more than fiction to begin with, take on a curious reality when called into life on stage. The Department of Speech and Drama offers the students a real opportunity to develop their talents in these areas and to become skilled artisans.





Music

The Department of music is presently structured in the tradition of the old conservatory schools of music. For many of the students, the training they receive is a preliminary to a professional career. But the department emphasizes not only performance. It aims at exposure to a wide variety of musical literature. Concerts frequently include selections not only from the classical and sacred bodies, but from popular music and Broadway musicals as well.

The Department offers two degrees: The Bachelor of Music, which is a conservatory degree, and the Bachelor of Music Education, for those who choose to teach others, rather than to perform themselves.



The Convocation — Chapel series is designed to bring various important and/or interesting speakers and programs to campus. Subjects may range from politics to anthropology to Hitler.











Hay Fever: Experience With Comedy



What is truth?



High Hopes, and a Good Start




