Miss Woodford Retires

Miss Faith Foster Woodford, associate professor of Pianoforte and History of Music is retiring. For over fifty years she has been a part of Morningside College as a student, a student teacher, and a faculty member. Through that half century of time her integrity of character, her musical knowledge and artistry have influenced and inspired generations of students, and have helped to form cultural traditions in the college and in the community.

Miss Woodford was born on a farm near Sergeant Bluff, Iowa, where her grandfather had settled as a pioneer. The Woodford name is recurrent in the history of Morningside College. The family has been a staunch friend and supporter of the school through-out the years. The hospitable Woodford home is remembered by many students as the scene of college good times.

After graduation from Morningside Academy in 1902, Miss Woodford became an assistant teacher of piano at the Conservatory during her college years. After her graduation in 1907 she became an instructor in piano. Since that time she has taught piano, organ and history of music continuously except for periods of study in this country and in Europe.

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TO TEACH IN ITALY

Theodore Barnowe '39, Professor of Human Relations and Administration of the University of Washington, Seattle, is one of five professors from American universities who will teach at a new graduate school of business administration at Turin, Italy.

The Americans will train university instructors and Italian corporation executives, acquainting them with modern American business methods. The school is associated with the University of Turin.

Kline Heads World Group

Allan B. Kline '15 was elected president of the International Federation of Agriculture Producers at their World Conference in Rome, Italy in June. The organization represents 20 million farmers in 30 countries. Mr. Kline flew to Rome directly after giving the Commencement address at Morningside College.

One year was spent in piano study with Emil Liebling in Chicago. The year 1911-12 Miss Woodford studied with Alberto Jonas in Berlin. Several summers were spent in study of organ and theory in Chicago and at the University of Michigan.

In addition to her teaching she has given generously of her time and talent to the community. She was honored for this recently at the dedication of a new pipe organ at First Methodist Church in Sioux City with these words: "To Faith Woodford, teacher, organist, friend, whose life has enriched the culture of Sioux City and the surrounding area by her devotion to the best in music, and who has translated sweet melody into the lives of many during her years of faithful and loyal service to First Church this program is dedicated."

The Alumni of Morningside College echo those words with an added expression of their deep appreciation of her long term of service to her Alma Mater.

Three Morningside graduates have received Fulbright grants for study in Europe. These grants pay all expenses including travel and were made available through the Fulbright act passed by the 79th Congress.

Miss Ruth McDonald '33, Assistant Professor of Occupational Therapy at Richmond Professional Institute of the College of William and Mary, has received one of the 16 lecturer awards available in Italy. She will go to Milan, Italy where she will teach theoretical courses and do practical training and demonstration in occupational therapy.

Observatory Dedication

At Commencement

The dedication of the O'Donoghue Observatory was the memorable feature of Commencement week end.

Dr. J. H. O'Donoghue was a graduate in 1893. On Baccalaureate Sunday, May 31, 1953, sixty years later, the completed building with its telescope, given by his son, Dr. Arch O'Donoghue, in his honor was formally added to the campus.

At the close of the church service the audience followed the academic procession to the Observatory building. Dr. Roadman opened the service stating that the Observatory was being dedicated "to the information and inspiration of the community's observance of God's handiwork in the heavens."

Dr. Arch O'Donoghue presented the building and David W. Stewart, president of the board of trustees, accepted it in behalf of the college. A gold key to the building was given to Dr. O'Donoghue.

The Rev. Harley Farnham led the dedication service. Dr. Myron Graber pronounced the benediction.

Speaking at the preceding Baccalaureate service on "The Stars in Their Courses" the Rev. George D. Davies '32 of Kingston, N. Y., told the graduating class that only in Christ could the confused world find purity, power, and peace. That man must turn to the scriptures for answers that will satisfy his mind and soul.

At the 59th anniversary commencement exercises on Monday, June 1, degrees were conferred upon 95 seniors in George Allee Gymnasium.

Allan B. Kline, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation and a 1915 graduate of Morningside College, gave the Commencement address. He stressed that "colleges must turn out people with critical minds as fortresses against those who would deprive us of our liberties."

Dr. Earl A. Roadman conferred honorary degrees upon Mr. Kline, the Rev. George D. Davies, and the Rev. Roscoe Jerrell, pastor of the Washta-Quimby Methodist circuit.

IN MEMORIAM

Dr. Clarence Tucker Craig

Dr. Clarence Tucker Craig '15, dean of Drew Theological Seminary, died of cancer, August 20th, in the Methodist Hospital, Brooklyn, N. Y.

Dr. Craig, the son of the late Dr. Alfred Craig, president of Morningside College from 1911-1918, was an internationally known New Testament scholar and ecumenical leader. He had held the Drew position since 1949, previously having taught at the Yale University Divinity School and the Oberlin Graduate School of Theology.

In 1946 Dr. Craig spoke in 33 states as educational representative in introducing the Standard Revised Version of the New Testament. He was chairman of the editorial committee for 'Gospels Parallel', a synopsis of the first three gospels based on this edition. He wrote the commentary on First Corinthians for the new Interpreter's Bible. He was the author of many books and articles in his special field.

After graduation from Morningside in 1915 he taught for a year in Foochow, China. Later he attended Boston University School of Theology. He received the Jacob Sleeper traveling fellowship and continued his graduate studies at Harvard, Basel, Switzerland and Berlin.

Among the many honors awarded Dr. Craig was an honorary degree by the University of Glasgow on the occasion of its 500th anniversary in 1951.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Rena Stebbins Craig; two sons, John Tucker Craig and Peter Stebbins Craig; a daughter, Martha Alden Craig; his mother, Mrs. Clara Tucker Craig and his sister, Miss Frances Craig '16.

Clara Lockin Blankenship '10 of La Canada, Calif. suffered a fatal heart attack as she and her husband were driving to an observance of their 20th wedding anniversary. Clara was born in Aurelia, Iowa, and after graduation from Morningside College in 1910 she taught school in Hartley, Wapello and Aurelia. Later she attended library school, and was a librarian in Los Angeles. She married Charles Blankenship in 1933 who, with a brother and a sister, Coralinn Lockin Miller '05 of Mapleton, Iowa, survives her.

Zeta Sigma

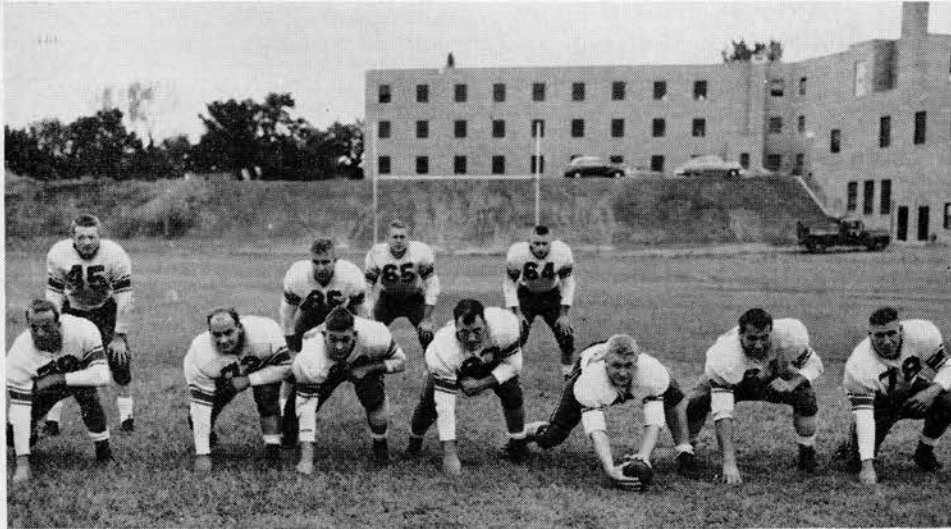
