Plans Made for 1948 Commencement

NEW HEAD FOOTBALL COACH AT MORNINGSIDE

An announcement by Athletic Director Les Davis after a meeting with President Earl A. Roadman and the Athletic committee of the board of trustees has revealed the signing of George Allen, assistant coach at the University of Michigan, as

head grid mentor of the Maroons.

Coach Davis, who has doubled as football coach, will devote full time to the athletic directorship and his duties with the physical education department after 25 years in the coaching business.

The new coach, who lettered at Marquette where he played as a naval trainee during the war years, has been an assistant coach at Michigan for two seasons, aiding with the junior varsity while working toward advanced degrees. He has a master's degree and has completed half the required work for a doctor's degree. He was also active in all other major and minor sports, such as basketball, track, wrestling, baseball, weight lifting, boxing and golf. He has been extensively trained in the single-wing, unbalanced line formation that took Michigan to the Rose Bowl. Mr. Allen, who

weighs 180 pounds and stands an even six feet, was an all-conference end three years while in high school.

The new Maroon mentor comes here highly recommended by Fritz Crisler, former head coach at Michigan, and by Benny Oosterbaan, current head mentor there. Crisler says, "I believe Allen has superior qualities as a football coach. He is conscientious, loyal and industrious."

Coach Allen will report for duty at Morningside in mid-August, but was on the campus May 17 when he was honored at a dinner in the Women's Residence Hall at 7:00 p. m. Sixty of the outstanding athletes of the surrounding territory were present to get acquainted with the Morningside College coaching staff. Colored pictures of the New Years' Day Rose Bowl game between Michigan and the University of Southern California were shown by Mr. Allen at the dinner.

MORNINGSIDER IN PRINT

The 1948 May issue of Ebony, the country's top-ranking Negro magazine, carries an article entitled "Single Men" by Era Bell Thompson, '33. Her first book, an autobiography, *American Daughter*, published in April 1946, was a Regional novel for four states; Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota. Below we quote the first two paragraphs of Era Bell's article:

"This first postwar leap year of 1948 has opened vast virginal vistas to the man-hunting army of brash, bold females who got left behind in the mass march to the altar after V-Day. For those who have the predatory urge, the one out of every ten adult males of the species who are marital holdouts are fair game with no holds barred.

"Despite the widespread rumor (probably man-made) that there is a shortage of eligible manfolk, facts are in this area of women's revolt that bachelors are plentiful with no less than one million Americans who are free, non-white and over 21.

But as always, they are a wary league of woman-frightened men who believe with sage George Bernard Shaw: "Its a woman's business to get married as soon as possible and a man's to keep unmarried as long as he can."

Mr. Paul MacCollin and Mr. Leo Kucinski have announced plans for the 20th season of the Lake Okoboji Summer Music Camp. The Music Camp is affiliated with Morningside College, and will be open from June 20 to August 1, 1948.

Mr. Kucinski and Mr. MacCollin are co-directors of the camp, the purpose of which is to enable students and teachers desiring specialized training, to devote six uninterrupted weeks to the study of music. The camp is located on West Okoboji Lake in northwest Iowa.

One to seven hours college credit may be earned by Morningside students during the summer term. Courses in Theory, Conducting, School Music, and History of Music are offered, as well as instrumental, voice, and piano study.

In addition to all this the camp offers swimming, boating, fishing, golf, tennis, moonlight and other recreational facilities that are hard to heat.

A Look at Tomorrow Today

1. Morningside in the Next Decade

- (a) Full time enrollment will exceed 1,000 boys and girls annually.
- (b) The A. W. Jones Hall of Science, the George M. Allee Gymnasium, the Lillian E. Dimmitt Residence Hall for Women will be followed by a new Library, a residence hall for men, an enlarged and modernized Bass field.
- (c) Income producing endowment must be increased from the present \$490,000 to \$2,000,000.
- (d) The annual budget will rise with steadily improving standards of education and the increased maintenance of additional buildings. However, a men's dormitory, like the Dimmitt Residence Hall, should be self-sustaining.
- (e) Student tuition will pay only 78% of next year's \$518,500 budget; and the percentage will steadily decrease as enrollment levels off at about 1,000 students, while facilities and improvements are added.

Here's Where the Alumni and Ex-Students Come in!

- (a) Those Morningsiders who are financially able will help finance the building program and build up the permanent endowment.
- (b) The rest of us will band together in the living endowment movement and increase our annual aggregate gift from \$4,000 to \$40,000—\$800,000 of living endowment when capitalized at 5%. This can be done if the 250 Morningsiders who presently participate with an average gift of \$18, increase to 2,000 with an average annual payment of \$20.
