The department also sponsored a field trip to Chicago on March 12-16. Visitations were made to art and cultural related attractions including the Art Institute and numerous small galleries.

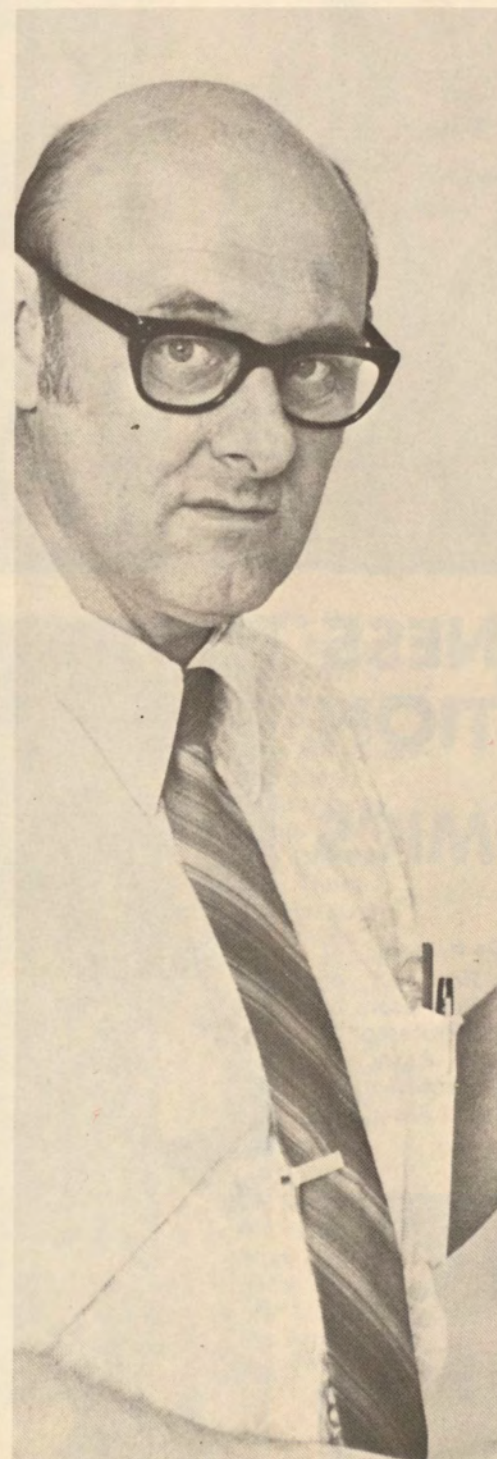

Unlike the Realists, Bertolt Brecht thought that the theater should not treat contemporary subject matter in a lifelike manner. Rather, he thought the theatre should "make strange" the actions it presents. One avenue to strangeness lies in historicification. Ordinarily this means using material drawn from other times or places. But Brecht chose to combine contemporary subject matter of his 1928 Germany with the 1837 coronation of Queen Victoria — in an adaptation of the 1727 THE BEGGAR'S OPERA by John Gay. By emphasizing the "pastness" Brecht hoped to arouse in the spectator the feeling that if he had been living under the conditions shown in the play, he would have taken some positive action against those conditions. The audience could then go on to see that, since things have changed (in the past) it is possible to bring about desirable social changes in the present.

In our visualization of the Brecht text, we have chosen scenic and costuming elements which we hope will increase that sense of "pastness" as well as make further comment, not only on character, but on the character or essence of the production. A constructivistic setting has been used to rip aside the facade of illusion and facilitate the flow of action from one place to another. In costuming we have borrowed from many periods, selecting those elements which will make a broader statement about the character, theme, and situation. Ergo, Polly's bustled bridal gown is waltz-length to show the "trimmest ankles in the city." And Macheath's gang is dressed like a bunch of musical comedians, which is one of their major functions in the piece.

THE THREEPENNY OPERA has been described as "the weightiest possible lowbrow opera for highbrows and the most full-blooded highbrow musical for lowbrows." Brecht's original intention was to write a kind of report on what the spectator likes to see of life." Whatever the case may be, the musical was an instant success in its original 1928 Berlin showing, played for 14 years off-Broadway in the fifties (breaking the long-run record at that time), and finds a voice and listeners in the seventies — where sadly the state of man is still sometimes uncouth.

THE EFFECT OF GAMMA RAYS ON MAN-IN-THE-MOON MARIGOLDS by Paul Zindel was the winner of the Pulitzer Prize, the Obie Award, and the New York Drama Critics Circle Award as Best American play of the season. Quite an impressive list of high ranking awards for one play.

The play centers around Beatrice Hunsdorfer, a frowzy and acid-tongued widow who is supporting herself and her two daughters by taking in a decrepit old boarder. One daughter, Ruth, is a highly-strung girl subject to tantrums and convulsions, while the younger daughter, Tillie, is almost pathologically shy but who has an intuitive gift for science. Encouraged by her teacher, Mr. Goodman, Tillie has undertaken a gamma ray experiment with marigolds which wins a prize at her high school and brings on the shattering climax of the play. Beatrice is torn between emotions of pride and jealousy. Beatrice can only maim when she wants to love and destroy when she wants to praise. Tortured, bitter, slovenly, she is as much a victim of her own nature as of the cruel lot which has been hers. And yet, as Tillie's experiment proves, something beautiful and full of promise can emerge even from the most barren, afflicted soil. This is the timeliness of the play, and the root of its moving power and truth.

CHEKOV'S "THE CHERRY ORCHARD"

Opinions vary on the proper interpretation of THE CHERRY ORCHARD. On the one hand we have the original Stanislavsky production which emphasized the poignant departure of the old life — the Russian aristocracy; and on the other hand we have the Russian critic Yermilov who argues that THE CHERRY ORCHARD was quite clearly satirizing the old regime — laughing it out of existence — and that the play looks forward optimistically to a brighter future. In the first production then we have a tragedy and in Yermilov's mind we have a comedy, which was the stated intent of playwright Chekov.

One thing this company has found in working with the script is that it most definitely has a will of its own. As we approached the production we wanted to achieve Chekov's "hilarious comedy" but it soon became apparent that the characters had lives of their own: they refused to become ludicrous, they refused to become maudlin. Instead of lying down hopelessly in the path of life or running recklessly off chasing will-o'-the-wisps, these characters wanted to take life in their stride. They seem unable to prevent unfortunate happenings and yet they have the ability to go on living despite the misfortune.

Doomed to an early death from tuberculosis, Chekov had no patience with moodiness or despair. Relentlessly energetic, he embraced life — as his characters do. Harold Clurman writes that all of Chekov's work tells us "humanity's greatest attribute lies in its ability to endure the hardships of fortune . . ." Perhaps what we have here is a hymn of praise — to the frailty of man, to the dignity of man.





The man imprisoned in our play belongs more to the 1970s than to the age in which he lived.

For more than a century, Henry David Thoreau was dismissed as a gifted weirdo. Only a rebel like Emerson's handyman would dare to question the benefits of technology! Why, it is obvious to any educated mind that technological advancement and progress are synonymous. To create a better world, all we have to do is make things bigger, faster, stronger, or cheaper.

But materialism is not the way.
THOREAU KNEW THAT.

He smelled the smog before we saw it.
It smarted his soul before it smarted our eyes.

He spoke out; but in those television-less days men were slow to listen. He sang out in nonviolent defiance, but how few men since could carry the tune: Ghandi, Count Tolstoi, Martin Luther King.

It was the material-mindedness of his government which drove the mystic Thoreau to the shores of Walden. His outrage is closely akin to the anger of many young people today. Young Thoreau was disgusted by the lies and confusion which clouded the bloody conflict with a smaller nation, Mexico.

Time is awash in this jail cell. We are not trapped in happenings past, but are concerned about THE NOW THOREAU — the explosive spirit who addressed himself to the perils of our time with more power and clarity than most angry young men writing now about now.

Thoreau is a fascinating paradox:

A man who was — and is.

A self-effacing giant.

A wit who rarely laughed.

A man who loved so deeply and completely that he seemed, sometimes, not to have loved at all.

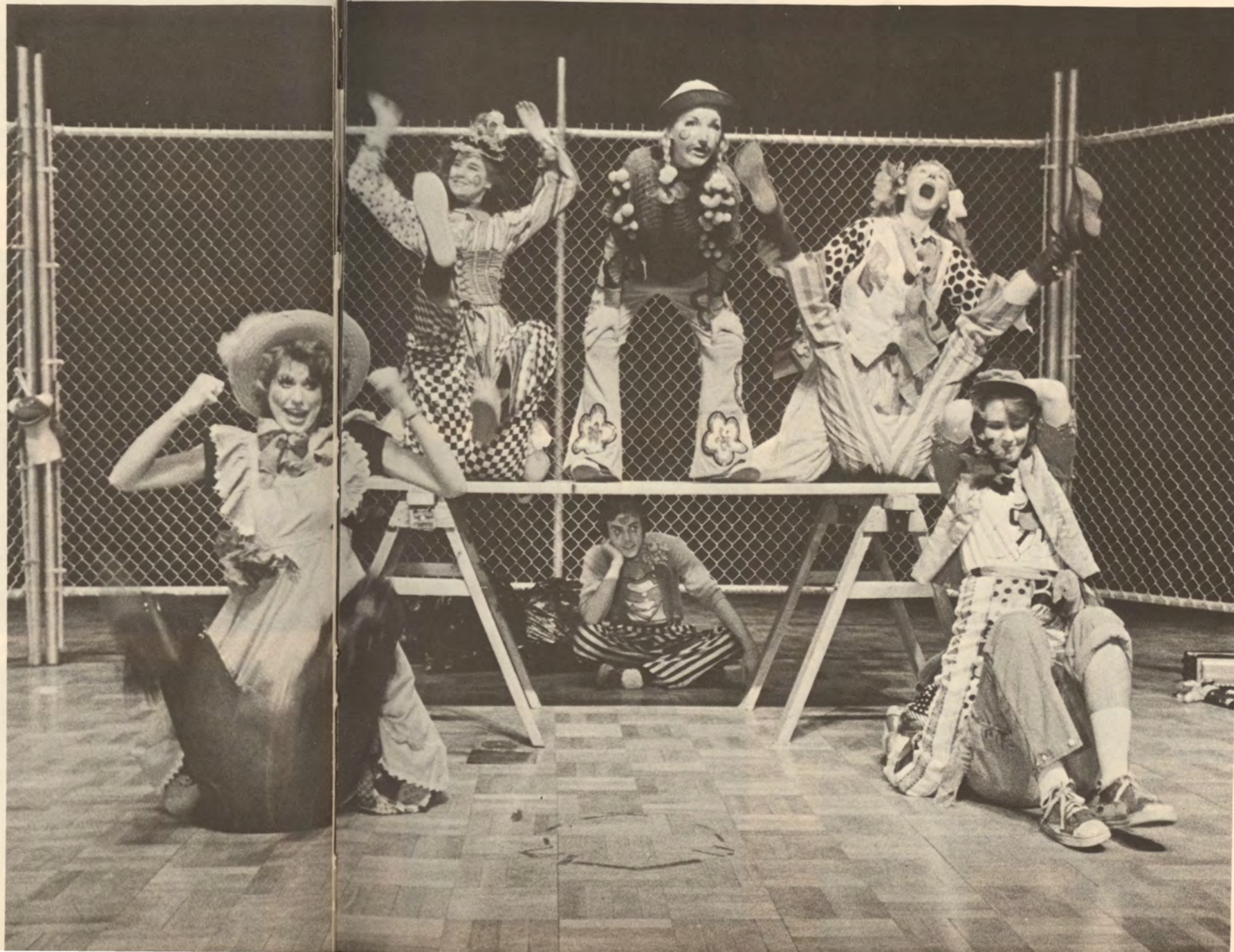

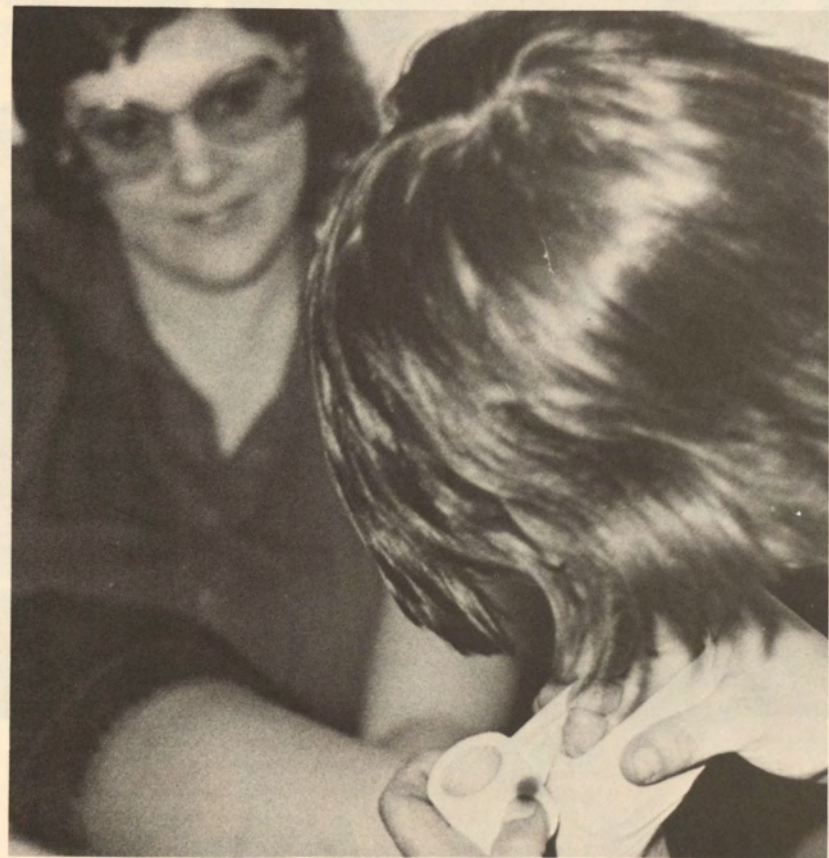


LINCOLN CENTER DEDICATION

The Morningside Maroon Chiefs suffered through their second consecutive winless season in 1974, finishing at 0-9. The Chiefs' losing streak was extended to 19 in a row with a year-ending loss to Augustana.

After 1973's 0-9 campaign, Coach Dewey Halford was reassigned to non-coaching duties and the highly-successful John Dornon, a Morningside alumnus, was hired away from Ellsworth Junior College to change the Chiefs' gridiron fortunes. Dornon brought with him a new coaching staff. He also recruited players heavily from the junior college ranks. With so many new, optimistic faces surrounding the Morningside football program, 1974 was christened the year of "The Whole New Ballgame."

The "Whole New Ballgame" got off to a rocky start as the Chiefs were shut out in their season opener by Wisconsin-Stevens Point, 1973's NAIA passing statistical champion, 30-0. After that, the Chiefs faced two rugged opponents on the road. Playing well, the Maroons took both Nebraska-Omaha, a non-conference foe, and NCC-title contender North Dakota State down to the wire before falling 31-21 and 15-7. Then came lopsided losses to powerful North Dakota and Mankato State.

A highlight of the season was the homecoming game against eventual conference champion South Dakota in which the Chiefs outgained the Coyotes in total yards. However, although they won the statistical battle, the Chiefs lost the game 49-21.

Morningside finished the season with three losses to Northern Iowa, South Dakota State, and Augustana.

Statistically, the Chiefs were led in passing by Tom Janssen (38 of 106), and Chuck Buesing (38 of 101). Joe Longo led the receivers with 17 grabs, 3 for touchdowns. The top team rusher was Randy Diehl with 459 yards. Brad Engle, the Chiefs punter finished fourth in the NCC in punting with a 37 yard-per-kick average. Mark Aeilts led the defense with 5 interceptions.

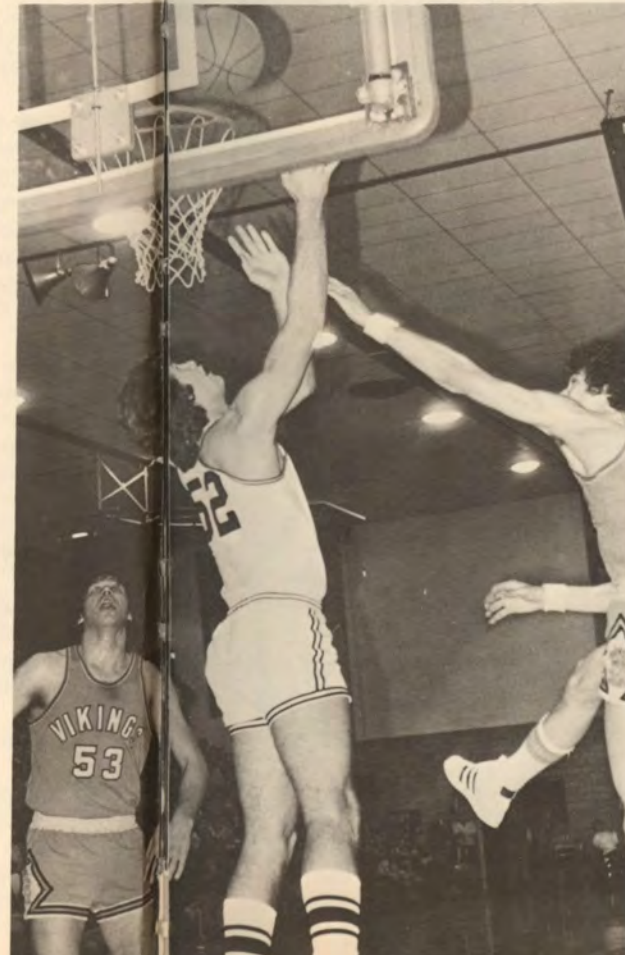

The excitement generated by a winning team pumped life throughout the campus and the Sioux City community. More than 300 fans followed the squad to Kansas City. Although the Chiefs dropped a 57-54 decision to Wisconsin-Parkside in the Tournament's first round, no one was disappointed in their effort.

It had been a remarkable season for Morningside. In North Central Conference play, the Chiefs compiled a 9-5 record, good for a second place tie. That was their best finish in 24 years. Statistically, they dominated league offensive categories, leading in scoring, field goal accuracy, rebounding, and assists.

"The key to our success," remarked Callahan, "was our unselfishness. Our assist total illustrates that."

The '74-'75 team broke three school records en route to a 17-12 mark: most points, most rebounds, and best field goal percentage.

But the man who made the Chiefs what they were was the 6-11 Schlessner. Named the squad's Most Valuable Player, he broke four individual Morningside records: most points and most rebounds in a season, most free throws made in a game, and best field goal shooting percentage. In just two years of play, he became the second player ever to score 1000 points in a Maroon uniform, finishing with 1970.

He also broke two NCC records, scoring more points and shooting from the floor better than anyone before. For the second consecutive year, Schlessner's demonstrated leadership earned him the honor of being voted the NCC's Most Valuable Performer.

On March 5, 1975, the Morningside Maroon Chiefs defeated Iowa Wesleyan 70-69 to win the NAIA District 15 Basketball Championship and a trip to the NAIA National Basketball Tournament in Kansas City. In just two years, Coach Dan Callahan had brought the Chiefs out of the cellar of an 9-24 '72-'73 record to the petnhouse of the best 32 teams in the nation.

At season's end, by a vote of squad members, senior center Dave Schlessner was named the team's Most Valuable Player. Senior guard Dan Pomeranke was voted Morningside's best defensive player and sophomore Joe Longo was named the player who gave the most of himself for the good of the team. Owen Lomax and John Held showed the Most Improved Player award.

BASEBALL



It was a happy bunch of Maroon Chiefs that walked off the diamond on the final day of the 1975 season. Coach Don Protexter's club had just shut out Northern Iowa 3-0 and thereby earned a second place finish in the North Central

Conference, their best showing since 1966.

The Chiefs' final league record of 6-5 put them right behind South Dakota State on the NCC ladder. Overall, they compiled a 10-16 mark.



The season opened with a difficult test against three university division foes at the Citrus Tournament in Edinburg, Texas. The Chiefs finished last in the four team field, but won two games and threw a scare into tenth-ranked Pan American before falling 1-0.

As a result of their outstanding play, five Morningsiders were awarded All-Citrus Tournament honors: third baseman Tom Eckert, catcher Steve Zediker, first baseman Rodd Nordstrom, and pitcher Lee Quade.

When the squad returned north, they were plagued by cold and snow. In all, ten games were lost to the weather. But when the sun did come out, the Chiefs were able to put together three consecutive victories, two over South Dakota, and one over Mankato State, to put them among the leaders in the conference race. Two season-ending wins over UNI nailed down the second place spot.

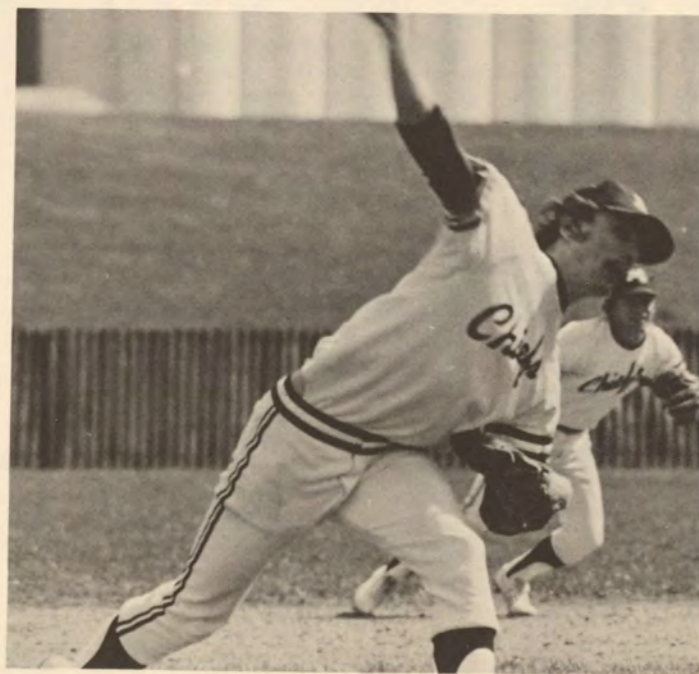
Morningside's strength lay with a fine pitching staff which held NCC opponents to 2.5 earned runs per contest. Bill Birk (2-5), Bob Faber (2-2), Quade (2-2), Tom McWilliams (1-3), and Bruce Lubach (1-2) were the pacesetters.

At the plate, centerfielder Ron Washburn led with Jim Lynch, shortstop, and outfielders Curt White and Frank Tirado providing good support. Second baseman Jim Miller anchored the defense.

A fine performance at the Drake Relays again highlighted the track season for the Maroon and White runners in 1975.

After dominating the 440 and mile relays in the Iowa College Division for four consecutive years at Drake, the Chiefs were dethroned as kings in '75, but still made an impressive showing. The 440 team of Henry Duffy, Dave Honeck, Greg Askland and Dennis Bogenrief took third, and Duffy, Honeck, Bob Larson, and John Held placed second in the mile event.

Overall, first-year coach Mick Everett was extremely pleased with the progress of his young squad. The indoor season saw the Chiefs having difficulty

placing against tough competition, finishing eighth in the conference meet in Fargo, North Dakota. But outdoors, the team improved rapidly, taking a third in the Knight Relays.

Duffy in the sprints, Larson in the 880, Delbert Christensen in the mile, Ron Heaton in the hurdles, and Duane Rees in the intermediate hurdles were the squad leaders.

The year closed with the Chiefs' Larson capturing the NCC championship in the half mile, clocking a 1:53.4 at the league outdoor meet in Brookings, South Dakota. As a team, the Maroons placed eighth in the loop field.

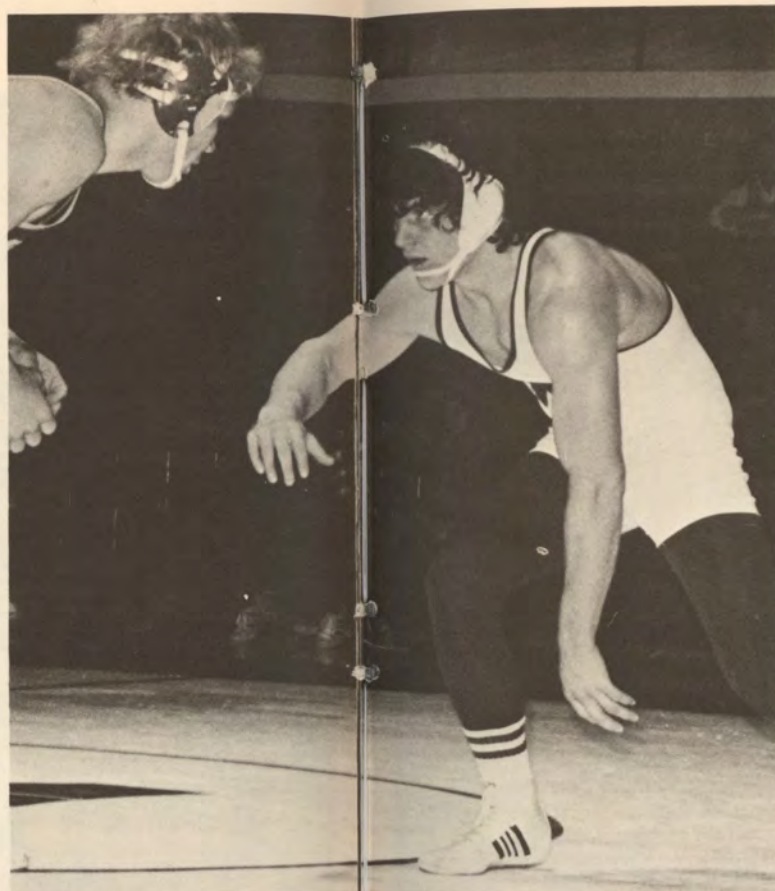
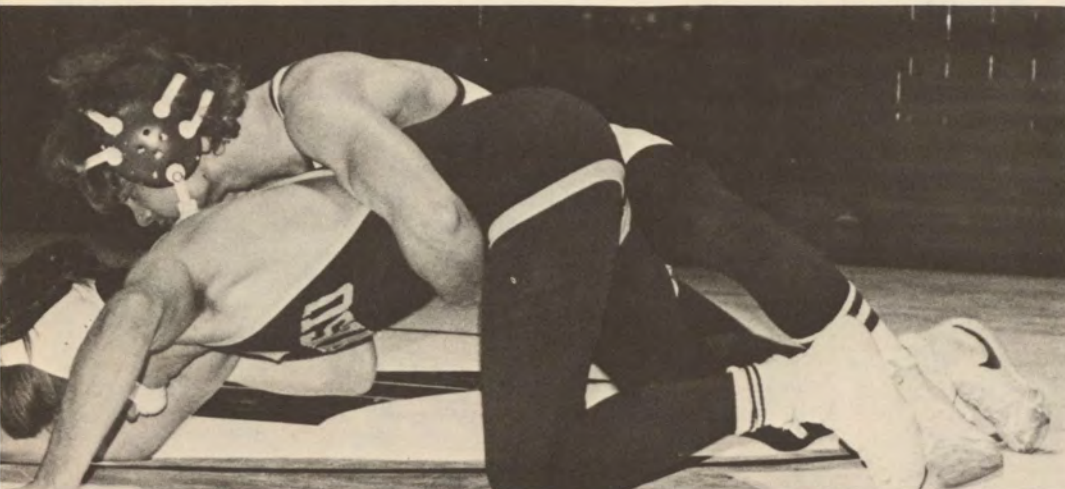

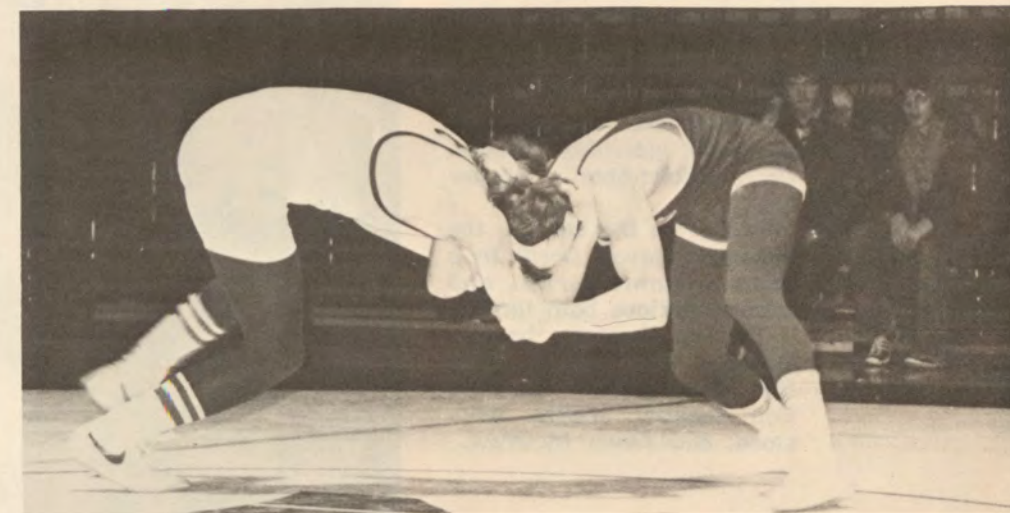

The 1974-75 mat season looked to be a strong year for Morningside when Coach Arnie Brandt and his wrestlers gathered together in November. Seven key lettermen were returning from the '73-'74 squad which had set a school record for most dual victories with 16. But the bright outlook was quickly turned to a picture of gloom when four of those veterans were lost for the season to injuries in the early going.

Freshmen were forced into action to fill the void. With first-year performers in seven of the ten weight divisions, the Chiefs' inexperience showed through the first half of the season. On January 30, when the Maroon grapplers returned from Mankato State, their record stood at a dismal 3-9.

But from that point on the young Chiefs turned the season around. Beginning with a January 31 meet at Buena Vista, they went on a rampage which won them six of their final eight outings to finish 9-11.

The Chiefs ended the year with a seventh place finish in the North Central Conference Championships at Cedar Falls. In that meet freshman John Snakenburg took third place honors at 158. Lynn Markert, another freshman was fourth at 126. Junior Dave Kobliska also won a fourth at 190.

Over the year, 177-pounder Mark Vogel led the team in dual wins with 12. Dave Edmonds (142) was second with 11. Edmonds also set a new team mark for match points with 143.

Upon the completion of the season, senior Dave Galler (142) was named '74-'75's honorary team captain by a vote of the wrestlers. Snakenburg was also honored as the team's outstanding performer.



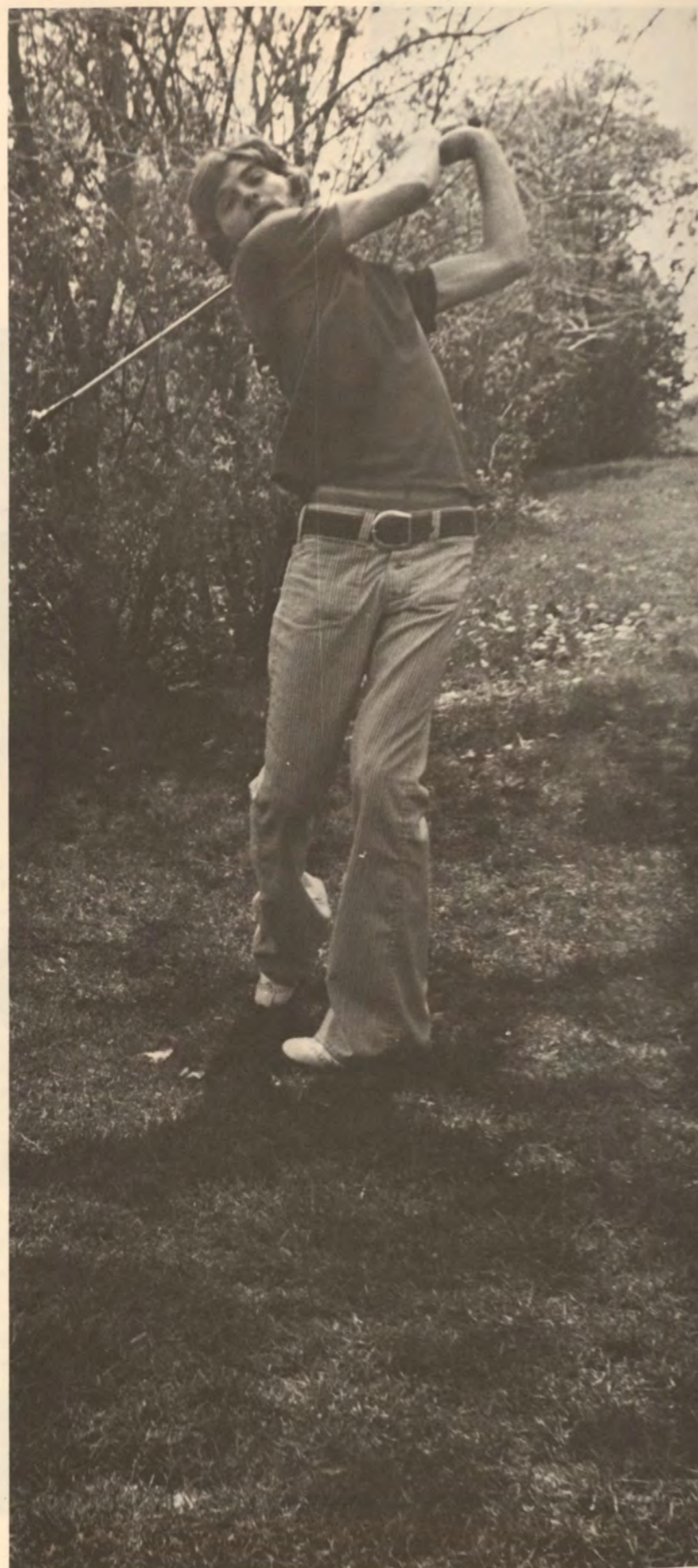
GOLF

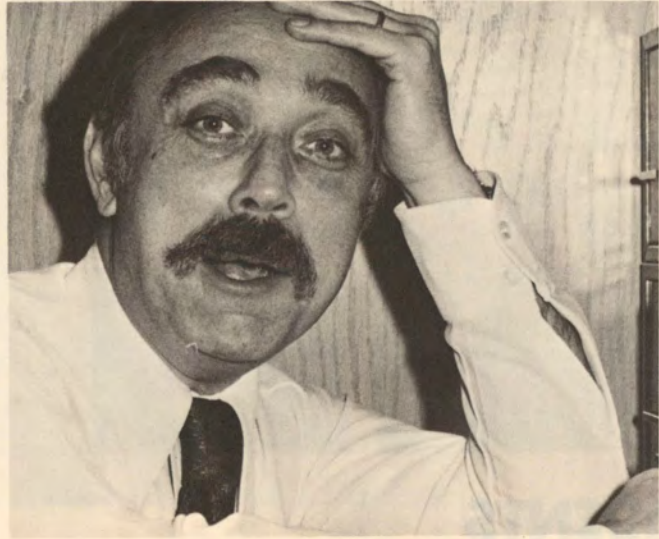

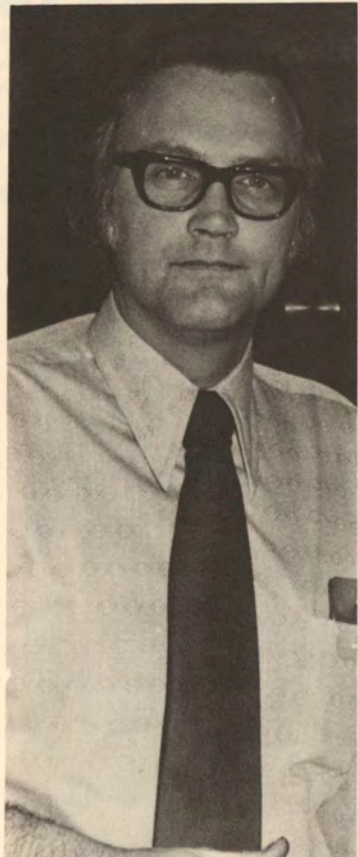

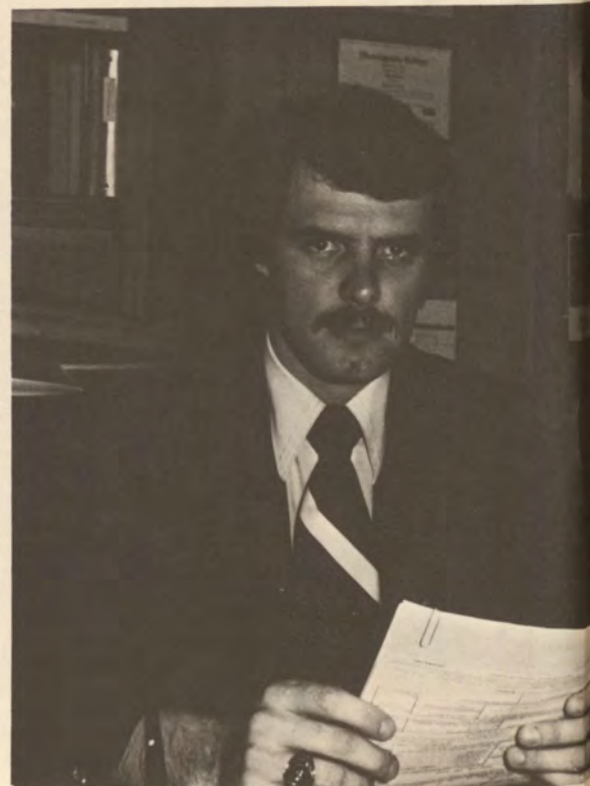

LONG RANGE PLANNING

"Colleges that don't have a sense of mission are not making it," notes Dr. Frank Terry, who is the director of the Long Range Planning effort at Morningside. It is the development of that "sense of mission" that is concerning the people working on the program now.

Long Range Planning (LRP) became an institutionalized program after April, 1972 when the Board of Directors established the foundation on which initial studies would be conducted. Those first fact-finding investigations were undertaken by six broad-reaching committees that looked into campus life on the fronts of: Finance, Academic Program, Student Life, Plant and Facilities. Community Relations and Structure and Process (Governance).

Today the structure of LRP is primarily one committee studying the reports made in the preliminary investigations.

In the statement of aims and goals of LRP denoted in the Potthoff Document, Dr. Harvey Potthoff, member of the Board of Directors and first overall coordinator of the program, talks about the attitudes and values of one who is "liberally educated." In concluding, the statement notes that Morningside College seeks to be a community in which life is being lived significantly and in which the desire for life-long education is inspired. It seeks to be a community lifting up standards of excellence and visions of greatness. It seeks to be a community whose guiding truth is that "the glory of God is man fully alive."

The statement is fine, explains Terry, but, "programs must reflect your purpose, Objectives are the concrete plans moving toward these purposes."

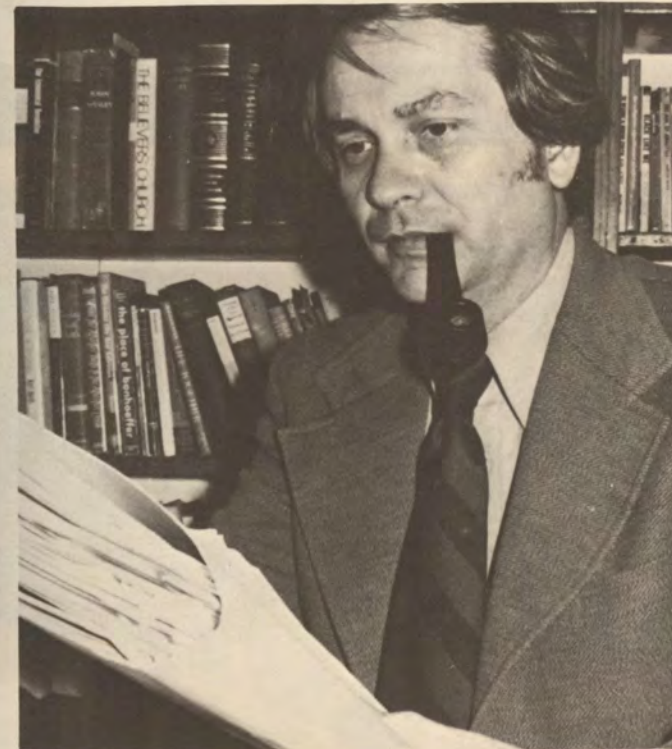
A key point in the role of developing objectives is the creation of identity. This to most people is the distinguishing factor(s), that makes the institution unique in its own and others viewpoints.

The issue of school-church relationship is one that has taken many opinions among those associated with Morningside. Commenting on that subject, Terry explains, "Over the last decade there has been an identity crisis in church-related liberal arts colleges." Reasoning seemingly points to the deemphasis of mandatory chapel and the developing of lighter core curriculums. Unlike the trend movement from about 1965-72, many schools now are moving back to these identification situations.

On the financial side, the role of federal funding has also changed from an earlier posture. "We see today that grants (federal) are going to schools with strong church relations, St. Olaf and Notre Dame are just a couple in this position."

"Methodist colleges generally have been known for their emphasis on quality liberal arts, John Wesley was himself committed to learning in the classics and has since reflected that belief in liberal arts," explains Dr. Terry.

"If people are not drawn for a purpose of identity, then they will not be held here for any." That in a nutshell might be why a "sense of mission" is so vital to the future role Morningside College will play in serving humanity.

"The Seasonings," an oratorio by the little-known composer P. D. Q. Bach was presented by the combined forces of Mu Phi and Phi Mu on November 12th. The oratorio featured soloists Cheryl Andrews, Connie Selk, Craig Welle, and Delwyn Olivier, accompanied by an orchestra, kazoo, and foghorn.

About "The Seasonings," Professor Peter Schickele of the University of Southern North Dakota at Hoople said this: "The oratorio was

written during the last of the composer's three creative periods — Contrition — when he gave up many, though not all, of the extravagances of the Soused Period, and the characteristically incompetent characteristics of the Initial Plunge."

P. D. Q. Bach did not, however, give up such characteristics as plagiarism, unusual instrumentation, and suggestive, not to mention dirty, lyrics. Thus, the oratorio had strong appeal for Morningside Students.

The Chamber Singers, under the direction of Miss Carolann Martin, changed their direction this year by performing operettas. On December 6th, the group performed "Amahl and the Night Visitors," by Gian-Carlo Menotti, and on March 20, audiences were given a chance to see both "Gallantry," and Kurt Weill's "Down in the Valley."

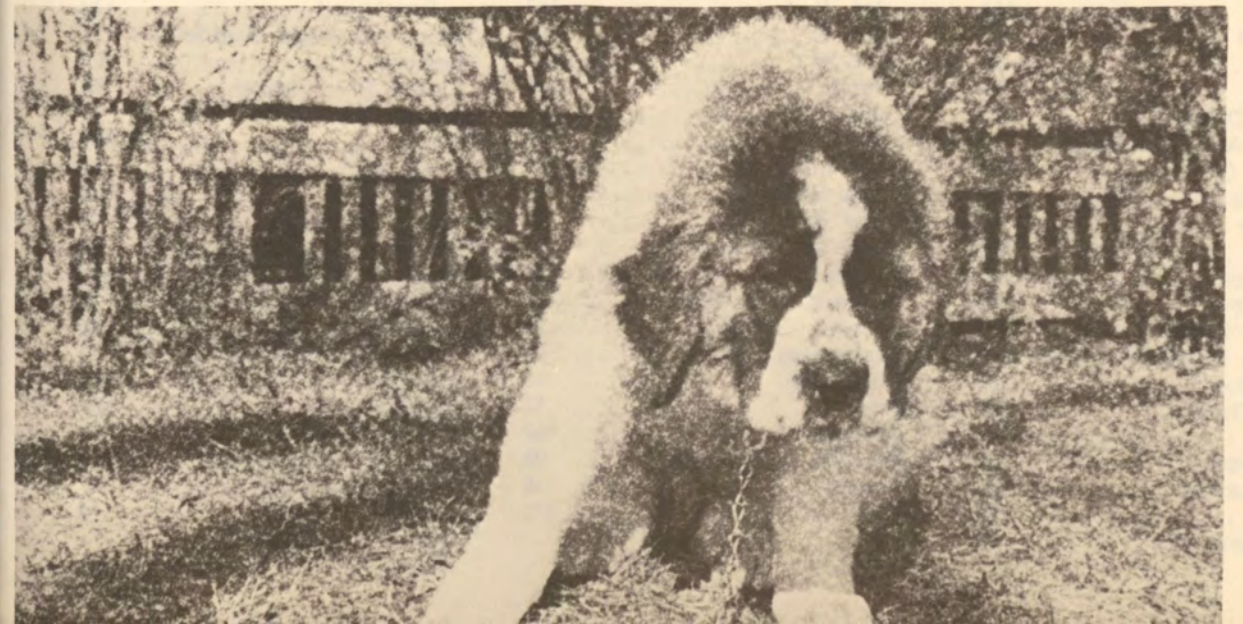
