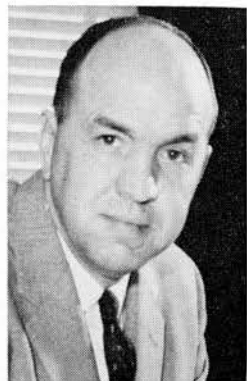
HOMECOMING

Among colleges of a comparable size, Morningside College ranks in the 82nd percentile nationally in the production of college professors on the basis of a survey for 1956-57.

An even more gratifying discovery is that among all colleges and universities, we rank in the 71st percentile in this matter.

The survey giving this information was conducted by the Association of



American Colleges. The results were published only recently and reached my desk last week. The purpose of the survey was to discover from what source our college teachers received their undergraduate training.

In the United States we are facing a crisis because of a shortage of college teachers. It is good to know Morningside has done so well in years past to inspire students to go on into graduate school and enter the college teaching field.

A special convocation was held this month to which we invited all students we feel are capable of going on into a graduate program. The purpose was to explain sources of help available and to counsel them to the best of our ability in order that many worthy and capable students may consider college teaching as a profession.

Homecoming Lures Many to Campus

An innovation in Morningside homecomings was successful in 1959.

The traditional Saturday morning parade was eliminated by the students and a campus open house and display contest put in its place. College organizations and living centers constructed displays on campus and in front of the residence halls in lieu of the traditional floats.

The men's dormitory, with a huge tepee in front of the door, an Iowa Teachers Panther hanging by the heels from two saplings nearby and a gigantic paper mache chief overseeing the proceedings took first place in the competition.

Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity was runner-up and the independent students group third.

Miss Morningside of 1959, Miss Mary Louise Lundquist of Aurelia, was crowned at intermission of the homecoming dance in Allee gymnasium by President Palmer. Miss Lundquist and her attendants were presented at halftime of the football game.

The attendants were Miss Mary Stachour of Sibley, Miss Nancy Birkbeck of Mason City, Miss Sharon Swanson of Merrill and Miss Christy Mathiasen of Onawa.

The campus open house Saturday was well attended and many students' parents met with instructors in the buildings on campus. A tea for all homecomers at Dimmitt hall Saturday afternoon and a concert by the Munster German choir highlighted the pre-game festivities.

The German musicians, a well-known touring unit, thrilled a standing room-only crowd at Klinger forum and then attended the football game as part of their two-day stay at Morningside.

Chiefs Bow to Tutors

The only dismal note in the three-day celebration was the 22 to 14 loss to Iowa State Teachers college on the gridiron.

Coach Dewey Halford's men ran into the proverbial buzz saw in a Panther team that evidently remembered last year when the Marcons played stellar ball to ruin Tutor homecoming at Cedar Falls.

ALUMNI ACTIVITIES

Form National Concept for Alumni

Plans and methods for setting up a truly national alumni organization were discussed at the second annual alumni workshop Friday afternoon of Homecoming weekend.

Alumni secretary Louis Croston explained that the alumni association has been, in effect, a national organization, but in name only.

"To remain effective and to give the moral and financial support Morningside needs in its expanding program, we must expand our official body and make it national in every sense of the word," Croston pointed out.

In order to accomplish the shift, the college alumni personnel have established 20 new alumni clubs and expect to organize at least that many more. The Sioux City club will become a local, and national officers will be nominated and chosen on a national basis rather than on the basis of proximity to Sioux City.

It is hoped the changeover will be accomplished by Homecoming 1960 and that representatives from as many of the nearly 50 local clubs as possible will attend the third annual workshop.

This year's workshop was attended by the new officers and officers elect of the Alumni association. A dinner in the evening at Dimmitt hall climaxed the workshop.

Recent Morningside Clubs Organized

Louis Croston '30, alumni director and Walter Olsen '38, assistant to the president, attended alumni meetings in seven Iowa cities in the past month and organized clubs in six. Des Moines was already organized, hence seven meetings and six clubs.

MISS DIMMITT SUFFERS FRACTURED HIP IN FALL

Miss Lillian E. Dimmitt, dean of women emeritus, suffered a fractured hip in a fall at her home October 16. Miss Dimmitt, 92, was taken to Methodist hospital and underwent surgery for the injury.

Dr. C. F. Berkstresser, college physician, reported that Miss Dimmitt is getting along well and that she may be released from the hospital by the time this issue of the Morningsider is circulated if her present rate of progress continues.

It is expected that Miss Dimmitt will recover completely from the injury.

Miss Dimmitt's most recent honor was a telegram from President Eisenhower last June congratulating her on 65 years as an active college teacher.

Maroon Chiefs Victorious At Vermillion

Morningside's "tough 25" ground the alleged Dakota day jinx deep into the muddy turf of Inman field at Vermillion with a spectacular 9 to 8 victory in the final game of the 1959 football campaign.

The depth-shy Maroon Chiefs, who numbered only 25 in fairly good health at the close of the season, lost three North Central conference games, but more than made up for it with the final win—the first time in 25 years that a Morningside team has won on the Vermillion gridiron.

Coach Dewey Halford's squad—one of the smallest in terms of numbers to compete in the North Central in many years—finished the season with a 5 and 4 record. Included were wins over Central Missouri State, Omaha university, North Dakota university, South Dakota State and South Dakota U., and losses to Missouri Valley college, North Dakota State, Augustana and Iowa State Teachers college.

Advance prospects for next year indicate Coach Halford will have fewer depth problems with a strong 37-man frosh squad expected to graduate a number of men to the varsity. The outlook for the backfield is bright with this year's starting unit expected to return intact bolstered by a number of experienced upperclassmen and any frosh who may make the grade.

In the line, only one regular will return, but replacements are available.

BASKETBALL CHIEFS SET TO OPEN DECEMBER 1

Coach Chuck Obye's basketball Maroons, who began working out October 15, will be bent on improving last year's second place North Central finish.

Returning to help out the cause are 6-6 Jerry Block and guards Ken Stripling and Gary Kolbeck, all seniors. Bob Garretson, 6-5, is expected to furnish good help in the rebound department and will team with Block to give the Maroon Chiefs more height than they have had for several seasons.

The 19-game schedule will get under way December 1 at LeMars with the Maroons challenging Westmar.

College, Church Plan MacCollin Memorial

The memory of Dr. and Mrs. Paul MacCollin, who were an integral part of Morningside life from 1913 until their deaths in 1958 and 1959, will be perpetuated by a pipe organ to be placed in the newly-constructed Grace Methodist church.

President J. Richard Palmer said the instrument will be called the MacCollin Memorial Organ and its purchase is a joint project of the college and the church that Mr. and Mrs. Mac served so long and so faithfully.



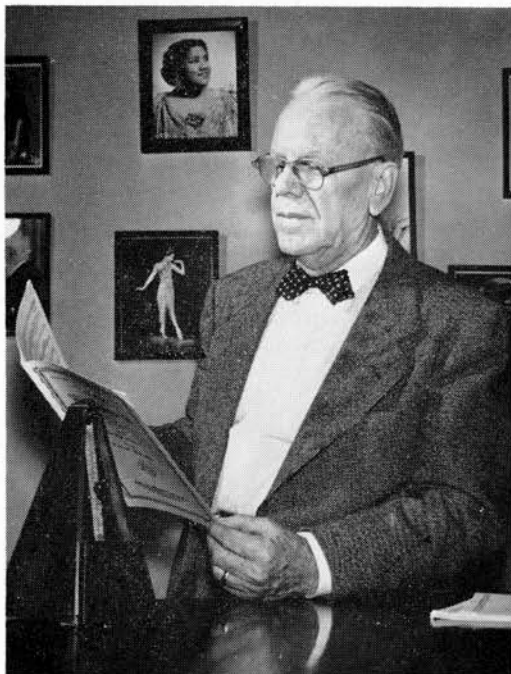
President Palmer pointed out that Mr. and Mrs. MacCollins served a total of 91 years as teachers at Morningside and that possibly a pipe organ is the most fitting memorial that could be designated for them.

The approximate installed cost of the organ will be \$38,000 and it will be manufactured by the Casavant Co. of Canada. The instrument will have three manuals, 30 stops, 42 ranks, 2,209 pipes and chimes.

It is thought the characteristics of the instrument make it one of the finest organs in this area for church, recital and instructional purposes.

In addition to its use during church services in the new Grace building, the organ will be used for concerts by college personnel and by some college organ students. It will, of course, be utilized when the college chapel services are returned to Grace church.

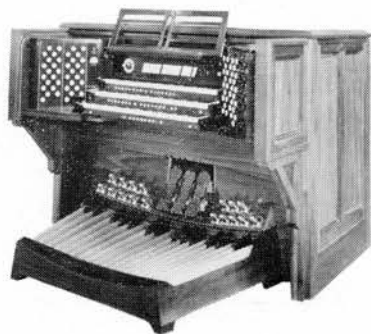
Part of the cost of the organ will be assumed by former students and college friends of the MacCollins.
