When Ira Gwinn was interviewed



by Professor Van Horne for a position in the mathematics department of this college he was told, "Don't accept this position unless you plan to come and stay—to bury your bones on this hill."

Ira came and Ira stayed; forty years he has stayed. He has been here through approximately two-thirds of the life of this college as an instructor in mathematics and physics, as Registrar, and as an administrative assistant to the President. Many years of useful service are ahead.

Ira married one of Morningside's lovely young instructors, and their children, Thomas and Jean, are both outstanding students now attending Morningside. They built their home and have lived their lives on Peters Avenue, in the midst of campus life and activities. Few people have ever so completely given their lives to an institution.

Ira has been faithful and prominent in his local church. He has been a leader in the Boy Scout movement for many years. The Civil Defense organization leans heavily upon him. He and his wife have been generous supporters of the cultural life of this city.

When the Committee on Degrees of the Board of Trustees considered last winter who would be honored this year, Ira Gwinn's name was enthusiastically adopted. None is more deserving.

Someone has said that a man's life is largely measured by the institutions or causes in which he invests himself. In this sense, Ira Gwinn's life has grown in greatness through the years, for a large part of Morningside College today bears the mark of his dedication and devotion.

Alumna To Study In Mexico

Mary Lou Lembke Speckhart '48, South Sioux City High School faculty member, is one of 52 spanish teachers chosen from nearly 200 applicants throughout the United States, who will participate in the National Defense Education Act Institute for Secondary School Teachers of Spanish to be held for two weeks on the campus of the University of Wichita, Wichita, Kansas.

While at the University of Wichita, Mrs. Speckhart will take part in an orientation program which will prepare the group for the seven weeks of residence in Mexico. During their stay in Mexico, institute participants will live part-time in a private home and part-time in a hotel, since one of the main objectives of the summer program is to give first hand knowledge of the Mexican people and their way of life.

Morningsiders Named Sioux City Principals

Three Morningsiders have been named school principals in the Sioux City Public School system.

Walter R. Olsen '38, has been named principal of Riverside High School. He has been a teacher and counselor at East High School the past two years. Before that, he spent two years at Morningside College as an Assistant to the President. Before coming to Sioux City, Olsen was Dean of Men and Athletic Director of the Faribault Minnesota High School.

Conrad Cameron '50, will be principal at an elementary school. He taught mathematics and science for two years at Little Rock, Iowa, moved to a similar position at Akron, Iowa and from 1955-57 was a field man in Cherokee County for the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation. He has taught at East Junior School since 1957.

Berten E. Tagg '47, will also be principal at an elementary school. He was coach and taught mathematics and science at Westfield, Iowa, for three years and at Ute, Iowa, for one year before moving to Leeds where he has been teaching for eleven years.

Honorary Degrees Bestowed to Three

Two alumni and a Methodist bishop were the recipients of honorary degrees at the commencement, June 2.

Ira J. Gwinn '22, associate professor of physics and registrar at Morningside received an honorary Doctor of Science degree. Professor Gwinn has been with the college since 1922. He obtained his master of science degree from the State University of Iowa, and has attend the University of Minnesota, Wisconsin State College, and Iowa State University since that time.

Thomas Gwinn, a son of Ira and Mrs. Gwinn, was a member of the 1963 graduating class. Jean Gwinn, a daughter, will be a junior at Morningside next fall. Mrs. Gwinn, the former Winifred Withers, was a member of the college faculty in the 30's.

Mr. Gwinn received a standing ovation from the faculty and audience when the degree was conferred. Dr. Robert W. Green '43, a former student of Professor Gwinn, presented him for the degree.

Dr. William E. Sanders, who has been a physician in Iowa for some 50 years, received an honorary Doctor of Science degree. A 1904 graduate of Morningside College, Dr. Sanders received his master of arts degree at South Dakota University and has studied in Berlin and Munich, Germany, as well as at the Johns Hopkins Medical School and Hospital in Baltimore, Maryland. While in Berlin at the Pathological Institute, Dr. Sanders studied under Rudolph Virchow, now known as the "Father of Pathology." He received his M.D. degree from St. Louis University. Dr. Sanders worked as a family physician in Alta and Des Moines, Iowa and later in Long Beach, California, during World War II. Dr. and Mrs. Sanders currently reside in Tucson, Arizona. Dr. Harold Rundell, associate professor of biology at Morningside presented Dr. Sanders with his degree.

Bishop Everett W. Palmer, bishop of the Seattle Area of the Methodist Church, received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree, presented by Mr. Leon Hickman, president of the Morningside College Board of Trustees. Commencement speaker at Morningside, Bishop Palmer received

his bachelor of arts degree from Dakota Wesleyan University, his bachelor of divinity from Drew Theological Seminary, his doctor of divinity from Dakota Wesleyan University, and received a doctor of Sacred Theology degree from the University of Puget Sound. In 1960, he was elected bishop of the Sixth Western Jurisdictional Conference of the Methodist Church, consisting of some 280 churches in Washington and northern Idaho.

Ed Haakinson '25 Speaks to Alumni

Ed Haakinson '25 spoke to 415 alumni at the annual alumni dinner, June 1, in the main dining room of the Commons.

As he started to speak, he was greeted by a shower of beans. (See the cover story).

It was significant that the bean shower should happen to be reenacted at the celebration by the Class of 1913 of their 50th Anniversary. The first bean shower took place in 1913 and it is highly probable that some of those present this spring were involved as culprits 50 years ago.

Haakinson has been an Associated Press Staff Correspondent at the United States Senate since 1935, after working at the old Sioux City Tribune for 13 years.

He told of life among the senators and in Washington. He said 100 newsmen cover Washington at all times with as many photographers and other related workers, plus the same number of writers working for the government. "I was awed by all the national figures when I went to Washington as an Iowa country boy," he said, but he soon found out that politicians are friendly with newsmen. "Especially the representatives of the big wire service," he added.

Ground Broken for Klinger-Neal Theater

Ground was broken June 1 for the Klinger-Neal theater on the campus. Excavation for the building is expected to start July 1.

In a 30 minute program on the building site, President Palmer indicated the Eugene C. Eppley auditorium and classroom building would be placed in the square block area bounded by Garretson street, Sioux Trail, Newton and Bass Field.

Bishop Ensley, Iowa Area Bishop of the Methodist church gave the

address at the ceremonies. He said, "It is a good thing that the theater is being built on the campus so that art never is separated from life, so students realize that art must express itself within the context of life as a whole."

William Klinger and George Neal, the men for whom the theater is named, David W. Stewart, past president of the college board of trustees; Ira Gwinn '22; Dr. William Sanders '04; Dr. Earl A. Roadman, former president; and President Palmer participated in the actual ground breaking.

Leon Hickman '22, president of the board of trustees; Rev. Geo. W. Dunn, '21, assistant to the president; Dr. James Wood, music faculty, and Richard Zweifel, president of the 1963-64 student body also participated in the ceremony.

Nineteen members of the Class of 1913 returned to the campus to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the graduation of their class from Morningside. With husbands and wives included, the party numbered 28.

They travelled approximately 20 000 miles to be here, round trip, literally coming from the North, South, East, and West.

Rev. Mr. John W. Payne was graduated from Morningside in 1943 and went on to Garrett Seminary in Chicago to receive his bachelor of divinity degree.

In 1949, Rev. Mr. Payne became chaplain and associate director of the Philadelphia Goodwill Industries and in 1951 he moved to Baltimore to take over the executive directorship of the Goodwill Industries in that city. He left Baltimore in 1962 to become executive director of the Goodwill Industries at Denver.

Rev Mr. Payne is a member of the National Board of Directors of Goodwill Industries of America, of the Department of Goodwill Industries Committee Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Methodist Church, and serves on the National Executive Directors Council of the Goodwill Organization. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge and Rotary Club and while in Baltimore, served as president of the Morning-side Alumni Club for that area.

George M. Paradise came to Sioux City from the Island of Crete in 1915. He enrolled in the Morning-side Academy and went from there to the college. He attended Morning-side College for three years before transferring to the law school of the University of Minnesota in 1924. He was granted his degree from Morningside after one year at Minnesota and completed his law work there.

Judge Paradise has served as Municipal Court Judge and District Judge for a total of 25 years. He has been department commander of Monahan Post 64, American Legion, and has served on a number of state and national committees. He was honored by Sioux City Sertoma Cluo as the outstanding foreign born citizen in 1960, and has been invited by the National Bar Association to attend a Peace Through Law Conference to be held June 30 through July 7 in Athens, Greece.

Raymond A. Olson '24 was graduated from Morningside in 1924. He was formerly night editor of the Sioux City Tribune. He is president of Dakota News, Inc., of Sioux Falls; Rushmore News, Inc., of Rapid City, and Olson News in Sioux City.

Olson was elected to the South Dakota State legislature in 1962 as representative from Minnehaha County. A member of the board of Rotary International in Sioux Falls, Mr. Olson also serves on the national affairs committee of the Chamber of Commerce and on the board of the Knife and Fork Club in Sioux Falls. He assisted in organizing the Sioux Falls Morningside Alumni Club and served as its first president.

John S. Bottom was graduated from Morningside in 1932. After graduation, he affiliated with the Cudahy Packing Co. and is now general sales manager and assistant general manager.

His area of responsibility includes central, eastern and southeastern United States. Mr. Bottom has been active in community and church affairs and is chairman of his company's savings bond program, for which he was recognized recently. Mrs. Bottom is the former Lois Schamp '31. They have been married 28 years and have three daughters; Janice, 23; Gretchen, 21; and Margaret Ann, 15.

Baseball Ends Successful Season

The Morningside College baseball team ended the 1963 season with a 12-8 record, putting on a spurt at the end of the schedule to win six of the last seven games.

Rich Vanderloo, sophomore shortstop from Lemars, Ia., won the team batting crown with a .359 average for the 20-game schedule. Vanderloo collected 28 hits in 78 times at bat and led the club in extra-base hits with 13 - 3 doubles, 6 triples, and 4 home runs. He also led the team in runs-batted-in with 19. In the Chiefs' five conference games Vanderloo hit an even .500 to earn a spot on the all-conference team. The only other Maroon Chief regular over the .300 mark was junior left fielder Chuck Dickens, Sioux City, with a .349 average for all games and a .400 mark in conference action.

In the pitching department, junior southpaw Roger Van Bergen won exactly half of the Chiefs total of 12 wins, while losing just once. The 6-4 Granville, Ia., ace got credit for all three of the Chiefs conference victories. In the 66 innings Van Bergen worked, the lefthander gave up just 16 earned runs for a 2.18 earned-run average. He struck out 63 opposing batsmen and issued only 2 walks.

Bob Wiarda, junior righthander from Edgerton, Minn., was second in total innings pitched. Wiarda ended the season with a 3-1 record. In 36 1/3 innings, Wiarda allowed 14 earned runs for an E. R. A. of 3.47 and had 33 strikeouts. He was hampered the latter part of the season with a stretched back muscle.

Head Coach Don Protexter has expressed optimism for next year's campaign. "We had a young ball club this year and still ended the season with a respectable 12-8 record, despite this year being considerd as one for rebuilding. We lose only two seniors from the club, so we will have a fine nucleus of returning lettermen next year."

The Maroon Chiefs 3-2 record in the North Central Conference earned them third place behind State College of Iowa and North Dakota University.

Scholarship Fund Is Increased

Mr. A. R. Van Wyngarden '32, president of the Color-Craft Corporation of Indianapolis, Indiana, recently added \$2,000 to the endowment fund he and Mrs. Van Wyngarden (Nellie Chilton '31) have established for an annual athletic scholarship. The scholarship is known as the Van Wyngarden Athletic Scholarship, and its first recipient was Jim Swanson, a member of the Class of 1963. The value of the award in its first year was approximately one-third tuition. The plan is to add to the endowment

until income from it is sufficient to support full tuition.

Mr. Van Wyngarden excelled in track while at Morningside, setting long standing records in both high and low hurdle competition.

Celebrities on Campus

DR. JAMES AVERY JOYCE, internationally known British author and lecturer, was on the Morning-side campus in March

Dr. Joyce, who has made many visits to the United States to lecture on world problems, British affairs, and legal education topics, spoke to a humanities class in the morning on the subject; "How can the United Nations be Strengthened?" He was the featured speaker at the regular session of Contoversy, where he discussed "The East-West Struggle in West Africa." The same evening in Grace church, Dr. Joyce addressed a public meeting on the topic: "Is Disarmament Possible?"

Dr. Joyce was formerly a special correspondent at the League of Nations Assemblies at Geneva and since the war has attended most of the United Nations sessions in New York City. He has served on the staff of the International Labor Office in Geneva and as consultant at the United Nations Economic and Social Council.

Dr. Joyce was presented on the campus by the Iowa Methodist Student Movement as their spring project.

INGER WIKSTROM, brilliant young Swedish pianist presented a concert in Klinger Forum at Morningside in March.

Miss Wikstrom was making her first appearance in the United States after a tour of ten cities in Italy under the sponsorship of UNESCO. She had previously, following her debut in Stockholm in 1959 at the age of 19, performed in several European countries. Since being at Morningside, she has appeared and performed on the "TONIGHT SHOW" on NBC.

DR. EMIL KROHER, Chief of the State Agency for Political Education in Bavaria, spoke in Klinger Forum in March.

Dr. Kroher's Federal Service Center for Political Education in Bavaria has the task of inspiring, promoting and sponsoring the education of the German people to become responsible citizens of a democratic nation, both in the field of schools as well as in adult education. He is one of the outstanding personalities of the

younger generation in the Federal Republic of Germany in his field.

The REVEREND DR. GEORGE A. BUTTRICK, Danforth visting lecturer, presented the final Vesper Series Service for 1962-63 at Morningside.

Dr. Buttrick gave two lectures on the campus. The first, "Faith and Knowledge" and the second, "The Nature of Truth."

He has been guest preacher at several universities including Yale, Princeton, and Dartmouth. In 1951-52, Dr. Buttrick traveled around the world as a Joseph Cook Lecturer under the auspices of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church, visiting the Philippines, Japan, and Hong Kong.

Dr. Buttrick has written several books and is general editor of "The Interpreter's Bible," and of the "Interpreters Dictionary of the Bible."

DR. FREDERICK G. BROWN, Iowa State University psychologist, visited the Morningside College campus on Wednesday, April 17, under the auspices of the American Psychological Association visiting lecturer program.

He presented a lecture on "The Control of Behavior," in Klinger Korum at Morningside for students, faculty, and those interested in psychology. A noon luncheon was held with Dr. Brown, sponsored by the Sociology Club and Psi Chi, honorary fraternity in psychology. At the regular 4 p. m. faculty meeting, Dr. Brown spoke about student counseling services.

Dr. Brown is currently assistant professor of psychology and senior counselor in the student counseling service at Iowa State University. At Iowa State, Dr. Brown teaches in the fields of tests and measurements and in individual testing and coordinates research at the Student Counseling Service. His present research areas include factors in academic achievement, the high-ability students, and personality testing.

PROFESSOR E. N. MOULTEN, of the theatre arts department of the University of Minnesota, was on the Morningside College campus in April.

Professor Moulten worked with students in the dance and theatre departments at Morningside. The highlight of his stay was a recital in Klinger Forum; at which time, Professor Moulten presented a lecture-demonstration in theatre and dance, with Morningside students participating in the demonstration. All material used in the recital consisted of original work.

PROFESSOR KIRIL MILJOVSKI, rector magnificus, University of Skopje, Skopje, Yugoslavia, was on campus Thursday, March 14. Professor Miljovski was in Sioux City in connection with the program of the Mayor's Committee for International Visitors. He had a luncheon conference with Morningside division heads at noon on Thursday in the Commons.

As rector of a rapidly growing university with a student population of 16,000, Professor Miljovski was naturally interested in the wide variety of administrative and other problems confronting educators. He is recognized as one of his country's experts in economic development.

Eva Wilson Randolph Scholarship Established

Miss Edna E. Randolph '11 of Sioux City has endowed a scholarship in the name of her deceased sister, Eva Wilson Randolph, a member of the Class of 1913.

The scholarship which will be worth \$200 a year to the recipient after 1963, will be awarded to a qualified candidate, preferably in the field of Library Science.

Eva Wilson Randolph was a libarian in the Sioux City Public Library for many years until illness forced her retirement. She died in 1950

Edna E. Randolph is a retired teacher, having taught in the Sioux City Public Schools.

Margaret Coleman Crary Agora Woman of the Year

Margaret Coleman Crary '26 was chosen by the Agora Club as their WOMAN OF THE YEAR. Recognition was given Mrs. Crary at the 20th Annual Leadership Banquet in March.

A member and past president of the Sioux Writer's Club, Mrs. Crary has been writing and selling books for the last 15 years. Her book, The Calico Ball won the Junior Literary Guild Award in 1962. She has also been active in A. A. U. W., the Women's Club, Girl Scout work, and her church.

Roger Neumann '62, former director and tenor sax man in the Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Band at Morningside, was the guest artist at the third annual jazz concert.

Alum's Band On Morningside Campus

Darwyn Snyder '48, brought his Westside High School Warrior Band from Omaha, Nebraska, to the campus for a concert in Allee Gymnasium in March.

The Warrior Band has achieved the reputation of being one of the finest high school bands in the midwest. The concert band has received Division I ratings at District Music contests for the past six years. The 1958 Warrior Band attended the 25th Anniverary New Year's Festivities at the Orange Bowl, and as a part of that trip performed before fifty thousand spectators at the Fire Pageant in Miami.

The band is directed by Darwyn Snyder, a 1948 graduate of Morning-side College. Mr. Snyder played cello in the Sioux City Symphony and saxophone in the Monahan Post Band before moving to Omaha.
