Hazel Surber Croston: Sioux City. Housewife, teacher, mother of two sons, Don, a student at Morningside and Craig in high school.

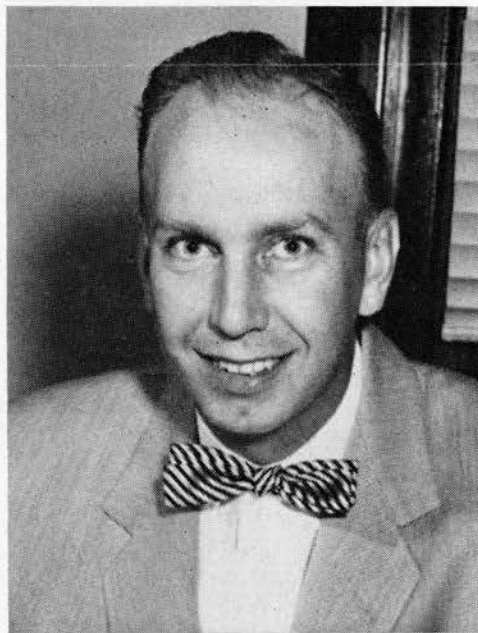
Gordon Metcalf: Downers Grove, Illinois. Group manager of Sears Roebuck's Chicago area retail stores.
