A. W. JONES GIVES COLLEGE \$50,000

A. W. Jones, Cherokee banker, has turned over to Morningside College \$50,000 worth of northwest Iowa property holdings, to be converted into cash for the college's \$250,000 three-story science hall, scheduled to be completed in September,

Mr. Jones, a former Morningside College student, is chairman of the board of directors of the Central Trust and Savings Bank at Cherokee. In addition, he is president of the State Bank at Sac City, Ia., chairman of the board of the Citizens Savings Bank at Sac City; president of the Corn Belt State Bank at Correctionville, Ia., and president of the Peterson State Bank at Peterson, Ia.

Mr. Jones was a member of a popular quartet during his days as a student in the Morningside Conservatory.

Dr. Roadman, announcing Mr. Jones' gift after the annual meeting of the college board of trustees, said the science building would be named "The A. W. Jones Hall of Science." Construction of the hall was halted last fall by lack of materials, but was resumed recently.

The board also took action on a pension plan for faculty members, raised tuition rates, adopted a half-million dollar budget for the coming year and stressed the need for a new boys' dorimtory and a field house.

"Murder in the Cathedral" Well Received

T. S. Eliot's "Murder in the Cathedral," presented by the speech department, under the direction of Prof. Richard Flowers, Monday and Tuesday nights, April 21-22, at Grace Methodist church, was not the type of stage production which the average first nighter expects . To see the play was to experience a variety of emotions.

The plot centers about the murder of Thomas Becket, archbishop of Canterbury, on his return from France to England in the 12th centry. While not essential, knowledge of the historical background and the political implications of the time aids one

to appreciate the play.

Mr. Robert Tracy, as the archbishop, turned in a commendable performance. He genuinely portrayed the tired and troubled churchman from the arrival in England to the murder.


