Buckingham New Athletic Director

Les Davis Resigns to Take Radio Post

Leslie H. Davis, '24, veteran of three decades of sports activity in Sioux City, has resigned as director of athletics at Morningside College. He is succeeded by his understudy, Al Buckingham, '39, present basketball coach of the Maroons. Coach Davis is leaving Morningside to become sports director for radio station WNAX at Yankton. The appointment was announced August 31 at a buffet supper at the Martin Hotel at which the station was host to a number of Sioux City athletic figures and sports enthusiasts.

Les joined the Morningside staff January 31, 1946, as athletic director and football coach. He guided the Maroons through the 1946 and 1947 gridiron campaigns and last spring retired from his football activities to give all his time to supervision of the college athletic program.

Already at work with the 1948 squad is George Allen, brought here from Michigan last spring to take over Davis' job as head football coach. Allen will continue to give most of his time to the gridiron sport.

Al Buckingham will continue to coach the basketball team and in addition next year will take over the track squad. Bill Pritula, former Michigan tackle named recently as line coach and physical education instructor, will coach the baseball team which Davis formerly handled.

Dr. Roadman said the assignment of a coach for the golf and tennis teams had not been made. Those sports, as well as track, were directed last spring by Chuck Obye, '46, who has resigned to work on his master's degree at the University of Iowa.

The registration of genial, graying Les Davis takes him from active participation in school sports in Sioux City for the first time since 1927. In the fall of that year he began as a coach at East high school where he piled up an enviable record through 20 seasons.

CLASS OF '43

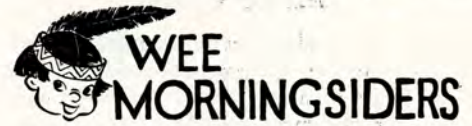

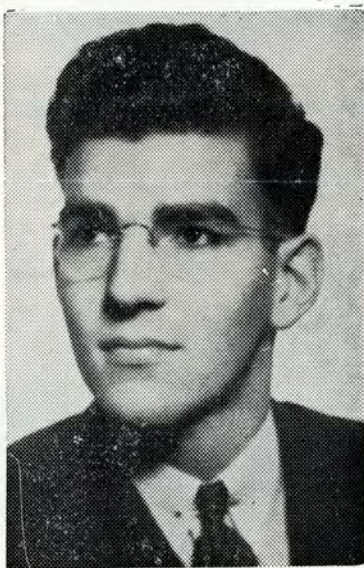
