## NEW FACULTY MEMBERS

Seven new members joined the Morningside faculty this fall.

Taking over as director of the Conservatory is Dr. Robert M. Larson. He is a native of Iowa, received his bachelor of arts and bachelor of music degrees at St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minn., and his master of music and Ph. D. degrees from Northwestern University. Prof. Larson was co-director of the Bluejacket chorus at Great Lakes Naval Training Station during world war 2. He comes to Morningside from the faculty of Pacific Lutheran College, Parkland, Washington.

Dr. A. J. Fyfe has been appointed head of the English department. Prof. Fyfe received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Toronto, and his Ph. D. from the University of Chicago. He has served on the faculties of New Mexico College, and Rocky Mountain College at Billings, Montana, and the University of British Columbia.

Also appointed to the department of English are Dr. Hazel Batzer of Ann Arbor, Mich., and James R. Davidson of Imperial, Nebraska. Miss Batzer received her bachelor of arts degree from Central Michigan College, her master's and her Ph. D. from the University of Michigan. For the past three years she has been an instructor at the University of Michigan.

Mr. Davidson was graduated from the University of Nebraska with a master's degree in 1951. He has since taught in Nebraska high schools.

The new head of the department of religion is Dr. J. Carleton Green. Dr. Green has a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Southern California, an S.T.B. degree from Boston University School of Theology, and a Ph. D. degree from the graduate school of Boston University. He has served churches in California, Massachusetts, and New York, and was a world war 2 chaplain. His most recent work has been as research associate with the character research project of Union College, Schenectady, N. Y.

Dr. W. N. Moulton has been appointed head of the chemistry department. He is a native of South Dakota. He received his master's and Ph. D. degrees in science at the University of Minnesota. He has taught (Continued on page 3)

# Choir Reunion Concert



### 60th ANNIVERSARY COMMENCEMENT

Harmony was the keynote of the 60th Anniversary Commencement. With more former Conservatory students and choir members on the campus than for many years music took the spotlight for the three days festivities which began with Alumni Day on Saturday, May 29.

The class reunion luncheon was held on that day at noon in Dimmitt Hall. The five year classes from '49 to '04 were grouped at tables where they could reminisce during the luncheon. Later in the drawing room Merle Kingsbury, president-elect of the Alumni Association, presided at an informal program and presented honor guests and class members.

Over three hundred alumni, faculty, and seniors filled the dining room of Dimmitt Hall on Saturday evening for the annual alumni dinner. It was a tuneful, happy occasion this year featuring singing and the presentation of awards to outstanding alumni.

Edgar McCracken '38, president of the Alumni Association, presided.

Dr. Earl A. Roadman in behalf of the Living Endowment Committee presented the first annual awards to alumni to four members of this year's reunion classes. The college president gave the brass lettered plaques to the four chosen by their classmates as "Morningsiders who best personify the ideals of their college in their respective communities." Those so honored were Miss Ethel Murray '09, Francis Kingsbury '19, the Rev. Robert Dolliver '24 and Hal H. Buntley '29.

Harold Decker '34, head of the voice and choral department of the University of Wichita presented to Professor and Mrs. Paul MacCollin, the alumni appreciation gift, a silver serving tray.

Instead of a banquet speaker this year a quartet of alumni, Jack Halloran '38, choral group director of Chicago, Paul Snyder '35 of Sioux City, Harold Decker and George Iseminger '40 of Sioux City delighted the audience with a group of songs. Then, with Prof. "Mac" leading, the assembled Morningsiders sang college songs which had been composed by Professor and Mrs. MacCollin.

The initiation of the seniors of 1954 into the Tribe of the Sioux closed the day's program.

### Baccalaureate

The Rev. Laird V. Loveland '35, pastor of the Grand Avenue Methodist Church at Denver, was the speaker at the 60th Anniversary baccalaureate service in Grace Methodist Church on May 30th.

After graduation from Morningside Rev. Loveland took his Master of Theology degree from Iliff School of Theology in Denver. He has studied at the Boston School of Theology and in the summer of 1953 he served as exchange pastor at Cleethorpe's, England.

To the graduates Rev. Loveland spoke on the subject, 'Your Signature', the imprint each one leaves upon his associates. Referring to the 60th anniversary of the college, he paid tribute to early faculty members, and said, "At this 60th anniversary we would do well to pause and give thanks for those who have written their signatures in blazing light on Morningside College and on those of us who graduate."

The college choir under the direction of Prof. Paul MacCollin and Leo Juffer with organ selections, furnished the music.

#### **Reunion Choir Concert**

On the evening of Baccalaureate Sunday the Reunion Choir concert honoring Prof. MacCollin, who is retiring as director of the Conservatory, was held in Grace Church. Alumni of many generations from all parts of the country returned to the campus to sing once again under the baton of Mr. "Mac".

Two groups of songs were sung by the combined choirs, and one group by the college choir. It was a never to be forgotten evening, enjoyed by both listeners and performers. Comments from alumni are coming back to the college such as: "The Alumni Choir concert this spring was a wonderful idea. I don't think I've ever enjoyed anything more."

The fourth annual Band Day will be on October 2, when bands from high schools in the surrounding territory will parade and perform in the stadium at the Morningside-North Dakota University game.


