The President's Pen

During the two-day fall faculty workshop, it was my opportunity to speak to the entire faculty with their spouses assembled for a dinner meeting after the first day of the workshop. I am taking some statements from that presentation, and I am having them printed exactly as they were given to the faculty, in order that you might get some indication of the direction of our thinking.

"Just what do we expect of our faculty persons on a Methodist church-related college campus?

1. We expect you to be academically well prepared and capable of doing an effective job as a classroom instructor. We do not consider piety as a substitute for true scholarship.
2. We expect you to take every opportunity to continue in your academic preparation in order to become an even more effective classroom teacher.
3. We expect you to maintain integrity in the classroom as it applies to the teaching of your subject material. Dr. Fred Holloway, president of Drew University, puts it this way: "If we argue that religion is not an addendum to the curriculum, we agree that it is something which permeates all we do. It is reflected in the quality of our administration and our teaching. The honesty and sincerity with which we lead our colleges is for the Christian a religious matter."
4. We expect you to be active in your church and participate in community affairs, thus setting a worthy example of Christian citizenship for our students.

"If there is a difference between the church-related college and the secular institutions of higher education, I would say it is basically in you, the teacher. It is true, we provide regular weekly worship experiences for our students in chapel, we require our students to take at least six hours in the field of religion, and we provide a comprehensive program and adequate facilities for nearly a score of religious activities weekly, but the most important element in our whole program is the Christian teacher. This is the deciding element.

"If a permeating atmosphere of the Christian way is to predominate all other influences on the campus, it must come from you. We must provide men and women of intelligence

and thorough preparation with a Christian stewardship of life if this world is to find itself and change the direction it is taking toward destructive wars and secular controls. The Christian college is one place where all the elements so necessary to balanced growth can be provided. We cannot

coerce, we cannot force our youth to accept the Christian attitude or philosophy, but we can provide the necessary soil in which youth may be nurtured and encouraged to grow into Christian manhood and womanhood."

"This is our job as I see it, and in this sense we are all ministers. Not that there should be any indoctrination of our youth by you, but that your lives should be so truly a reflection of the spirit of Christ in your search for truth, your explanation of it and your concern for the students' understanding of it, that they shall see in you the image of that which always challenges man to his best efforts his most noble dreams, and his most kindly thoughts and deeds."

ALUMNI ACTIVITIES

Alum Support Increases; Need To Rise Sharply in Few Years

A total of 847 alumni or approximately 13 per cent of the 6,000-plus who are on the roll gave \$19,001 to Morningside college during the last (August 1 to July 31) fiscal year.

Of the grand total, 732 alumni contributed \$8,546.67 to the living endowment fund—an increase of 177 contributors and \$1,038.22 over last year's total which was the previous all-time high in both contributors and dollars.

The living endowment fund for the year just closed was equivalent to the interest at 5 per cent of \$170,933.40 of endowment.

In addition to the living endowment total, 145 alumni gave \$8,700 as members of the Morningside Development council—a group designed to give continuing annual support of a fixed amount to the college. Seventy others gave \$1,755 toward general college operations.

What do these figures mean?

They mean that Morningside alumni support, after rising almost imperceptibly for many years, has risen sharply in the last several years.

When compared to national figures for alumni support, they mean that Morningside alumni giving should rise even more sharply in the years immediately ahead. On the national average a contribution of 40 per cent of the alumni of a given college is considered good. Some colleges receive the direct yearly financial support from 60 to 70 per cent of their alumni.

When seen in the light of the program Morningside has set for itself in the next decade, these figures indicate what Morningside alumni can and must begin to do during that period.

In the next several years plans call for a women's dorm and an addition to the men's

dormitory; construction of student union and fine arts buildings. These structures are seen as necessary if the program of the college is to have room to expand in scope and grow in excellence. (see campus news)

Each year salaries of faculty and salary rise as competition for their services increases. As the number of college-age young people increases, as it will in earnest beginning in 1960, this competition grows keener.

To provide the basic undergirding for this program, Morningside will conduct a two-part campaign in 1960 and 1961.

The success of this campaign and ultimately the success of the college program in the next 10 years could well depend on the response of Morningside alumni for two reasons.

(1) More than one-third of Morningside's alumni live in Sioux City and in the area served by the North Iowa conference of the Methodist church.

(2) Money can and will be gotten from corporations and other sources besides alumni. But it cannot be gotten in sufficient amounts from these outside sources unless alumni support is solid indicating the basic strength and health of the college.

All factors point to the conclusion that with the continued faithful support of veteran alumni and the increasing support of more recent graduates, Morningside alumni giving can achieve the most spectacular upsurge it has known.

Names of those Morningside alumni who contributed to the various phases of the college program during the last year are listed at the back of the magazine.

CAMPUS NEWS

Emphasis On Academic Standard Renewed; 14 New Faculty Arrive

The opening of the fall term September 14 saw the beginning of the second year of a renewed emphasis on academic excellence.

Two areas tabbed for material strengthening in the next year are psychology and foreign language.

Dr. J. Clifford Holmes, dean of the college, called the process a continuance and possible improvement of the fine academic level that has been maintained at Morningside over the years.

"We hope our efforts in this direction will show a good result during the coming year when we will launch some type of self study in conjunction with the regularly-scheduled accrediting examination by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools," Dr. Holmes said.

14 New Faces

In order to bolster present course offerings and add some new ones, fourteen new faculty persons have been signed to contracts since the beginning of the 1958-59 school year.

Of the 14, six hold the doctor of philosophy degree, and another, Prof. Robert Green, expects to receive that degree during the coming semester at Iowa State university.

Prof. Green, '43, will not join the Morningside staff until the second semester. Bob and Ruth ('47) Green are returning to the Morningside campus where Bob taught physics before moving to Ames for work on his doctorate.

Another alumnus who is back on the campus as an instructor is Stanley Greigg, '54. Stan joined the Morningside staff for the second semester of 1958-59 and this year will be acting dean of men, head resident in the men's dormitory and instructor of history (see separate story).

Heading the department of philosophy will be Dr. Joseph N. Uemura. Dr. Uemura holds the Ph. D. degree from Columbia university and a degree in theology from Iliff School of Theology. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and is the author of numerous publications.

A Major Change

A major curriculum alteration involves the reinstatement of a full psychology major. The psychology major program was discontinued some time ago.

Dr. Lyle K. Henry will head the psychology department. Dr. Henry recently retired from the military service where he had extensive experience in guidance, counseling and administration. His Ph. D. is from the State University of Iowa.

The foreign language department will be expanded with the addition to the staff of Dr. Richard Olmsted. Dr. Olmsted holds the Ph. D. degree from the University of Minnesota and has had extensive college teaching experience.

By vote of the faculty last spring, foreign language will be required for both bachelor of arts and bachelor of science degrees beginning in the fall of 1960.

Add Concert Pianist

Prof. Aldo Mancinelli, international known concert pianist has been named assistant professor of piano and artist in residence. Prof. Mancinelli has done extensive concert work in Europe and was on a concert tour of South America late in August. He will play several concert engagements during the school year.

Other additions to the staff include Dr. Harold Rundell, head of the biology department, Dr. Ronald Tyree, instructor in woodwind instruments; Laurel Pease, business administration; Fred Lee, speech and forensics; Wade Raridon, voice and music theory; Miss Nita Harris, women's physical education, and Miss Lorraine Marquardt, home economics.

Virgil Wynne, formerly of Mankato, Minn., State college, will be head librarian and instructor in library science.

After his graduation he attended the University of Wyoming, University of Southern California, the University of Minnesota and Colorado State College of Education where he obtained his master of arts degree.

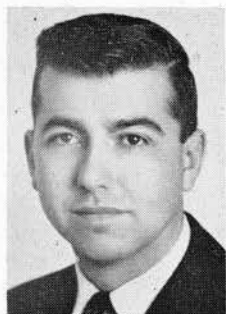

Gridmen Open 9-Game Campaign

Playing for the first time under the banner of the Maroon Chiefs (see story), the 1959 Morningside football squad opened the season September 12 at home against Central Missouri.

It was the first of nine games for the grid Chiefs. Six conference contests—three of them at home—are on the docket. The last game of the season will be against South Dakota university at Vermillion, November 7.

Coach Dewey Halford called 30 men to practice August 31. Two-a-day sessions were held until the first game of the season.

Eleven Lettermen

Eleven lettermen—six of them regulars—were among the 30 squad members. The squad appears to have good first line men, but may be a little short on bench strength. Barring injuries, a good season is in prospect, however.

Leading the backfield returnees are regular quarterback Jerry Ehwegen of Terril, Ia., and Elmer Menage, right halfback from Rock Rapids. Menage, a speed merchant, was the team's leading scorer last season. Both men

are juniors and played extensively in all eight games last season.

Up front, Coach Halford will lean heavily on 240-pound Jerry Magill, senior, at tackle, and Gary Johnson, senior center and Line-backer. Johnson, a 5-feet, 8-inch 195 pounder was an all-conference selection last season.

Vets At End

Rounding out the veteran regulars are Jerry Block, 6-feet, 6-inch, 215-pound end, who will be playing his third varsity season for the Maroon Chiefs, and Dick Slater, junior end from Ottumwa. Block could develop into a pass-snagging terror.

Teaming with him will be Slater, a 6-foot hustler who scales 185 pounds.

Chiefs Make Bow In First Grid Test

When the Morningside gridders took the field for the first game of the season, they battled for the first time under the banner of the Maroon Chiefs.

The Chief (Indian in headdress) has been chosen as a mascot for Morningside athletic teams. The selection was made in a student body contest last spring.
