LISTEN ALUMNI!

Something new has happened; A vital alumni assistance for Morningside College has started. An alumnus offered \$1500 if others would join him. His class has taken up his challenge and is securing pledges to match his offer. Two classes of an earlier date have together secured pledges amounting to \$1065. They will, without doubt, match the donor's total. Some classes, of course, have not been so fully cultivated. The class of 1915 has \$70 pledged in three gifts with promise of much more to come, 1934 has one gift of \$50, 1936 has one of \$15, and 1932 one of \$10. A recent Sioux City Alumni meeting was called to give impetus, organization, and form to this new alumni movement. Class letters are going out from commit-tees formed within the Sioux City residents of the various classes. It was decided that former students should be included in the classes with which they would have graduated.

The eager interest upon the part of former students was well illustrated by the recent meeting of President Roadman and Alex W. Adams of Los Angeles. Mr. Adams was compelled through the illness and death of his father to leave college in the summer of 1905. Although his residence for the past twenty-five years in Los Angeles has brought him few contacts with Morningside people, three most delightful hours were spent in reviewing the earlier history and present interests and work of Mr. Adams' former friends.

This new movement of alumni hope is destined to bring a union of the forces of Sioux City and the Northwest Iowa Conference in laying the perfect foundation for Morningside's future. President Roadman has been working with super-human energy to bring this to pass. Sioux City has responded with fine enthusiasm and with above \$75,000 of assistance. The Northwest Iowa Conference is moving up with new outlook and assurance. All alumni and former students will happily join with the one who has led by his offer of \$1500 when he said that his first lovalty was to his family, his second to his church, and his third to Morningside College. The stimulus of that type of loyalty will make the Fiftieth year a truly Golden Anniversary and promises a new impetus for the beginning of the second half century of Morningside history.

DEATH CALLS DR. BUSHNELL

The death of Dr. J. J. Bushnell at Ames, Saturday, April 22, marked the loss of a kind, sincere, and jovial friend of the faculty, students, and alumni. No member of the faculty had such wide acquaintance with Northwest Iowa and Sioux City.

Dr. Bushnell has been on the Morningside staff for the past eleven years. He was Dean of Extension for two years and Professior of Bible and Religion for nine years.

The memorial to Dr. Bushnell prepared by Dr. M. E. Graber, Dean of Men, for the Rotary Club of Sioux City is such a fitting tribute that it is given here in full.

As Rotarians we sustain a serious personal loss in the passing of our loyal friend and brother, Doctor John J. Bushnell, for few of us have been as friendly, as cordial, and as devotedly loyal to the ideals of Rotary International as he. Possessed of a jovial nature and a compelling sense of humor John J. chuckled with appreciation of another's joke and was seldom lacking in retaliating with some original humor of his own. John J. was truly and religiously a friend of man. He was deeply loved and revered by his students, his associates on the faculty of Morningside College, and a host of friends through Northwest Iowa. As District Superintendent, minister, and professor his contacts were myriad leaving their impress upon him through the years. Time and again as it was my privilege to visit with him on our way from Rotary he would hail his friends on the street until it seemed that his acquaintances were legion. No one was too inconsequential and no one too self-important to merit his greeting. Then, too, John J. was ever aspiring and studious in his endeavor to

COACHING SCHOOL

Morningside College's Seventh Annual Coaching School will be held at Spirit Lake, Iowa, during the week of August 14-20, 1939, according to Director J. M. Saunderson. This school has become one of the largest of its nature, because of its well-chosen location in the popular lake region.

Dr. Eddie Anderson, newly elected Iowa University football coach, heads the list of grid instructors to be present at the coaching school. Coach Anderson is a graduate of Notre Dame and for the past six years has been coaching at Holy Cross where he has developed many outstanding teams. He will act as head football instructor during the entire coaching session.

To assist Dr. Anderson with football, Jim Harris and Frank Leahy will be in charge of line play. Harris is also new on the coaching staff at Iowa University, having formerly coached under Anderson at Holy Cross College. Leahy is head coach at Boston College.

Coach Dave MacMillan of the University of Minnesota, will head the basketball sessions. He has been at the University since 1927 and has developed some of the most brilliant passing teams in the Western Conference. Assisting Coach MacMillan is Art Schabinger, formerly of Creighton University and also Past President of the American Basketball Coaches.

Frank Cramer, noted authority on athletic linaments and their uses, will also be on the coaching staff.

The second annual Conference on Educational Problems held Saturday, April 2, at the Women's Residence Halls and devoted principally to problems in the small high schools, was reported to have been very successful.

Two principal lecturers were Dr. K. O. Broady, professor of School Administration at the University of Nebraska, who talked on "Repairing and Modernizing the School Plant", and on "Meeting Curriculum Problems", and Dr. Ruben T. Shaw, president of the National Education Association, who discussed "The Place of the Small School in American Democracy".

ROADMAN DELEGATE TO UNITING CONFERENCE

President Roadman spent two weeks in Kansas City attending the Uniting Conference of the Methodist Churches. His seat assignment was section C, row 14, seat 4. He was appointed to the Education Committee which was one of the eight Uniting Conference Committees concerned with writing the new Discipline. In the Education Committee he was assigned to the chairmanship of a committee to work on harmonizing the program of the new church in the adjustment and cooperation of the Board of Education and Board of Missions in religious education on the mission field and on mission education in the home field.
