

The class of 1953 will be guests at the dinner. Sharing honors with them will be members of 1903, the fifty year class.



MAN OF THE YEAR



Merle V. Shafenberg '21, superintendent of schools at Hinton, Iowa, was recently the recipient of two high honors.

On March 21 Mr. Shafenberg was presented the annual Morningside College "man of educational service" award at the 13th annual Conference on Educational Problems, which was held at the college.

The award certificate was presented by Dean Tweito to Mr. Shafenberg, who has been superintendent at Hinton for 29 years, and was honored for his fine service to young people.

The second honor came to him on March 24. It was the third annual Journal-Tribune publications' basketball "coach of the year" plaque.

The award was given by Alex Stoddard, Journal-Tribune sports editor, in a surprise presentation at the annual banquet honoring the Hinton high school team.

Mr. Shafenberg is the second Morningside graduate to receive this plaque. Francis Jones '42, Sioux Center coach, former Hinton star under Shafenberg and all North Central conference player, received it in 1951.

In the 30 seasons that Mr. Shafenberg has coached Hinton teams, they have won more than 80 percent of their games, and the 1952-53 squad had a 24 to 1 record. Three of his former Hinton players received all North Central conference recognition at Morningside. In addition to Jones, they were Bob Held '48 and John Helm ('45).

Former Morningsiders will remember Shafenberg as a member of the Morningside relay team that twice won Drake Relay championships.

Mrs. Shafenberg is a Morningside graduate, the former Marvel Evans '21.


Present Silver Service

Kirkegaard, a top blocker, never made a bad pass all season.

At tackle, Bob Motter, former Early star, will return for two more years of competition. Motter was an outstanding defensive guard last fall.

All four of these lads are noted for their scholastic records as well, with all of them having an average of B or better.
