#### August Graduation

Sixty graduates received bachelor's degrees in arts, science and music education at the summer commencement exercises on Friday morning, August 11 in Grace Methodist Church.

The commencement address was given by Lillian G. Portenier, professor of psychology in the liberal arts college of the University of Wyoming who spoke on The Supreme Test of Education. Her discourse was a practical analysis of the causes of the confusion of the present day.

Dr. Roadman conferred the degrees upon the graduates on their presentation by Dean Thomas Tweito. Ira Gwinn announced that Robert Lincoln attained membership in Zeta Sigma and Jerry Green and Beulah Griffith graduated with cum laude honors.

# Morningside Begins New Fall Semester

With registration of two hundred and seventy-five freshmen and upper classmen, completed Wednesday afternoon, September 3, Morningside College opened its business of regular classes on Thursday, September 4, with a total enrollment of approximately eight hundred students.

During the academic year 1949-1950 the total enrollment, including evening and summer course students, was one thousand five hundred and fifty-four. These included nine hundred and fifty-one men and six hundred and three women students. During the same period the veteran enrollment was four hundred seventy-seven.

Two principal reasons for the drop in attendance are the facts that the G. I. "bulge" has pretty well worked its way through the college and that many young men of draft age are uncertain as to their future. The peak G. I. enrollment was seven hundred veterans several years ago. More than sixty per cent of the 1950 June graduating class were veterans.

The college faculty numbers 70 with a total of administrative, secretarial and service personnel of 140. About 17 per cent of the faculty members are listed in Who's Who in America.

It has been announced that next year's issue of Lovejoy's Complete guide to American Colleges and Universities will give Morningside College a class 1 rating. Many of Morningside's graduates have entered the ministry and other phases of fulltime religious work.

The modern and recently established A. W. Jones Hall of Science on the college campus provides improved facilities for training in biology, chemistry, physics and home economics. The equipment is adequate for an enrollment of 2,000 students. The facilities will be expanded by the erection of the Dr. James H. O'Donoghue observatory, which will be erected by Dr. Arch O'Donoghue. It will provide the largest and most powerful telescope in the state.

Other important campus buildings are the recently completed George M. Allee gymnasium, for intramural and physical education programs, which has a seating capacity of 5,000 and is equipped with classrooms and other physical education facilities including an Olympic sized swimming pool; the Lillian E. Dimmitt Hall, a dormitory with accommodations for 185 women; a radio studio; a special building for music practice, a "meeting house," which has become the center of religious life on the campus, and a social center known as "the Barn."

Approximately 250 of Morningside's students are in training for public school work and use the facilities of the Sioux City public school system in practice teaching.

The first game will be a warm up for conference competition but may prove to be tough. According to Coach George Allen, it is the best first-game-team the Maroons have faced in three years.

# September 23

Morningside Vs. South Dakota State

The Allen men have an extra tough toughie facing them when they trek to Brookings to open loop competition. The Bunnies were co-champions of the North Central Conference for the 1949 season and have a good chance to repeat. They slipped past the Maroons 27-20 at Sioux City last year.

Mrs. E. C. Brill (Gwynne Morris) who attended Morningside in 1938-39, died of a heart condition on June 23 in Hartford, Conn. She had taught school in Latimer, Boxholm and State Center, Ia. until her marriage in 1945. The Brills then made their home in Granby, Conn. Funeral services were held at the Linn Grove Presbyterian church on June 30. Her husband and a three year old daughter, Helen, survive.
