New Library Assured

Remodeling of Alumni Gymnasium to provide new library facilities is assured. A total project costing \$250,000 includes first, the remodeling of the gym, second, redoing the space in the main building now occupied by the library and repairs for the conservatory of music. \$190,000 has been pledged. Work on the first phase will begin at once.

Very little structural change is required in the alumni gym building. Many people have remarked that it looks like a Carnegie Library as it has stood through the years. The architectural plans indicate a beautiful, efficient and modern library which has been made imperative by the increasing enrollments. A continued search will be made for the necessary funds to complete the total program.

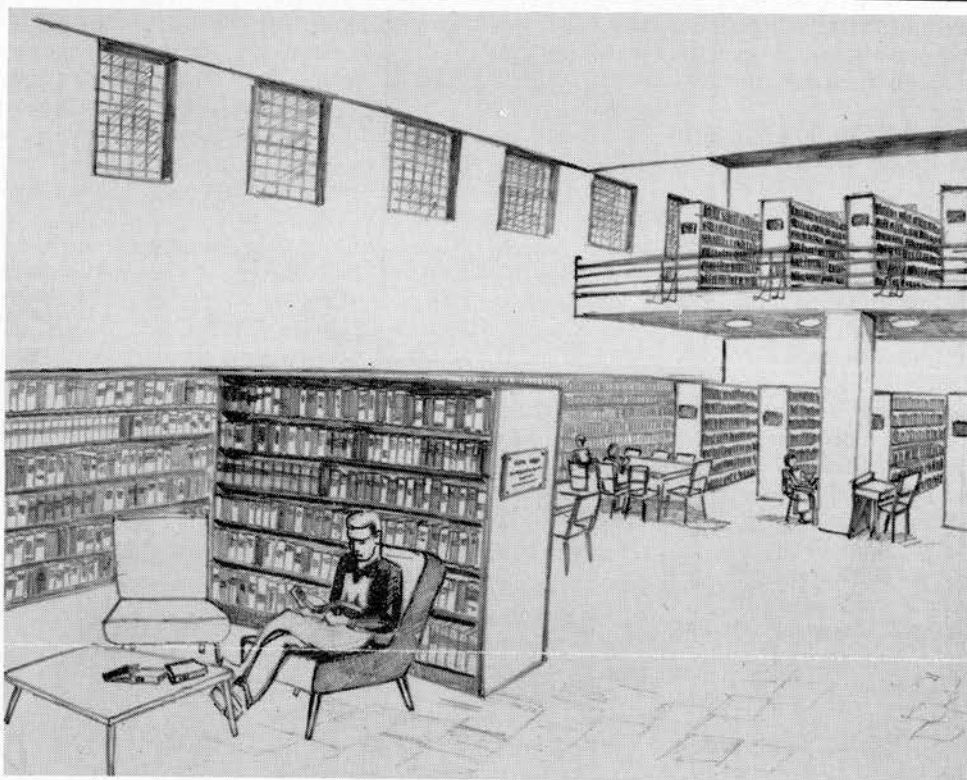

At the dinner in May 1955 the second annual Awards were given to Professor Robert Van Horne '00, Mr. William C. Wolle '20, Mr. Lester Benz '25 and Mr. Louis Crosston '30.

Living Endowment in Fifteenth Year

In 1939 a committee consisting of Leon Hickman, Harry Benz, Bessie Reed Walton, David Wickens and Nellie Carpenter Winter was appointed to study and formulate a plan to be used in the development of a program of giving for the Alumni of Morningside College. Meetings, discussion and letters ensued and from these the committee recommended the plan we know as Living Endowment.

It is common knowledge that colleges and universities do not have sufficient income from tuition to meet their operating costs. The resulting deficit may be made up by income from endowments, by gifts, or, in the case of state schools, by taxes.

\$10,000 of income requires \$250,000 of endowment computed at 4%. Obtaining \$250,000 for every \$10,000 of income (other than fees) for the college presented a tough problem for the planning committee. They wanted a plan in which every alumnus could participate and whereby the college would benefit both financially and in the renewed loyalty of its alumni.

Living Endowment met these requirements.

The plan enables every Morningsider to endow the college according to his or her means by annual giving. Alumni of a school are a most logical source of income. Giving varies according to the participants ability to give. Gifts have ranged from \$1.00 to \$800. Giving each year is, of course, a desirable thing, but giving one year in no way obligates the participant to give the following year.

Morningside does not stand alone in this type of program. More than 300 colleges and universities (some state supported) have similar funds. I suppose most of

us, when we were in school, thought that when we had paid our tuition we had paid for our education. Actually some person or persons, philanthropic and farseeing, paid for a part of education. National figures show that tuition fees pay approximately 60 to 70% of the cost of educating a college student. 30 to 40% of that cost must come from other source. LIVING ENDOWMENT is Morningside's plan for another source.

Leon Hickman, vice-president and general Council of the Aluminum Corporation of America, served as the first chairman of the

Living Endowment Committee. He was followed by Harold Winter, assistant vice-president of the Union Life Insurance Company. Earl Barks, Nebraska banker, succeeded Mr. Winter which brings us up to date. Many loyal Morningsiders have served on the committee and a great many others have participated, some from the beginning of the program in 1941. Living Endowment is a growing Program.

The final hopes for a second consecutive North Central title died when at Cedar Falls the Iowa State Teachers eked out a one point victory-13 to 12.
