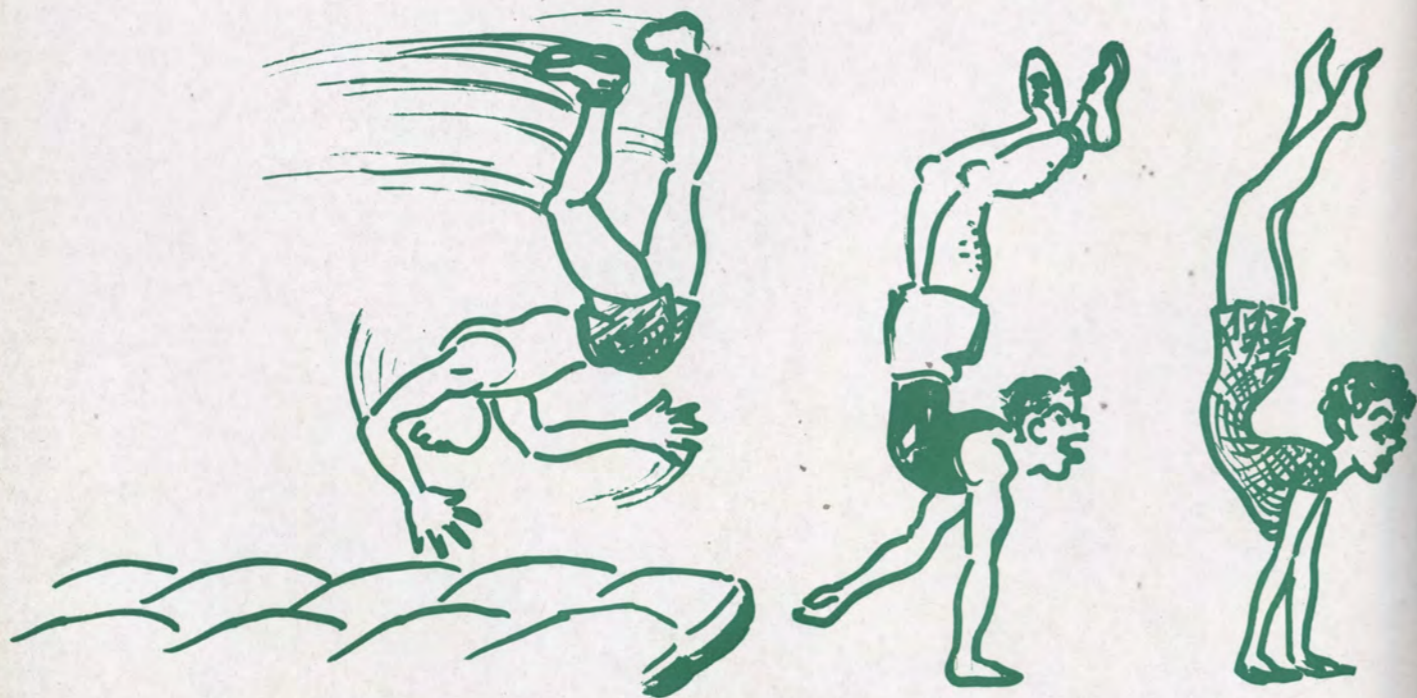
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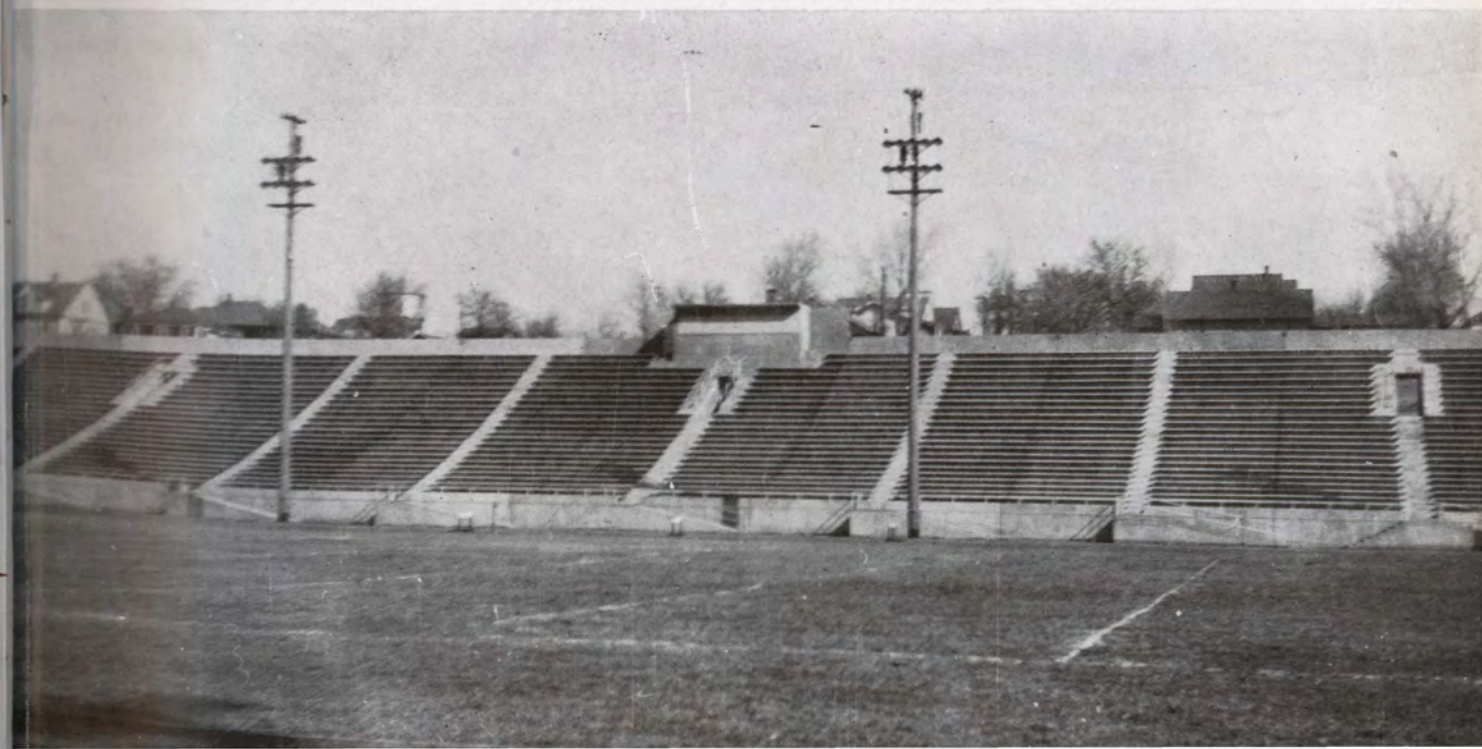
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THE STADIUM

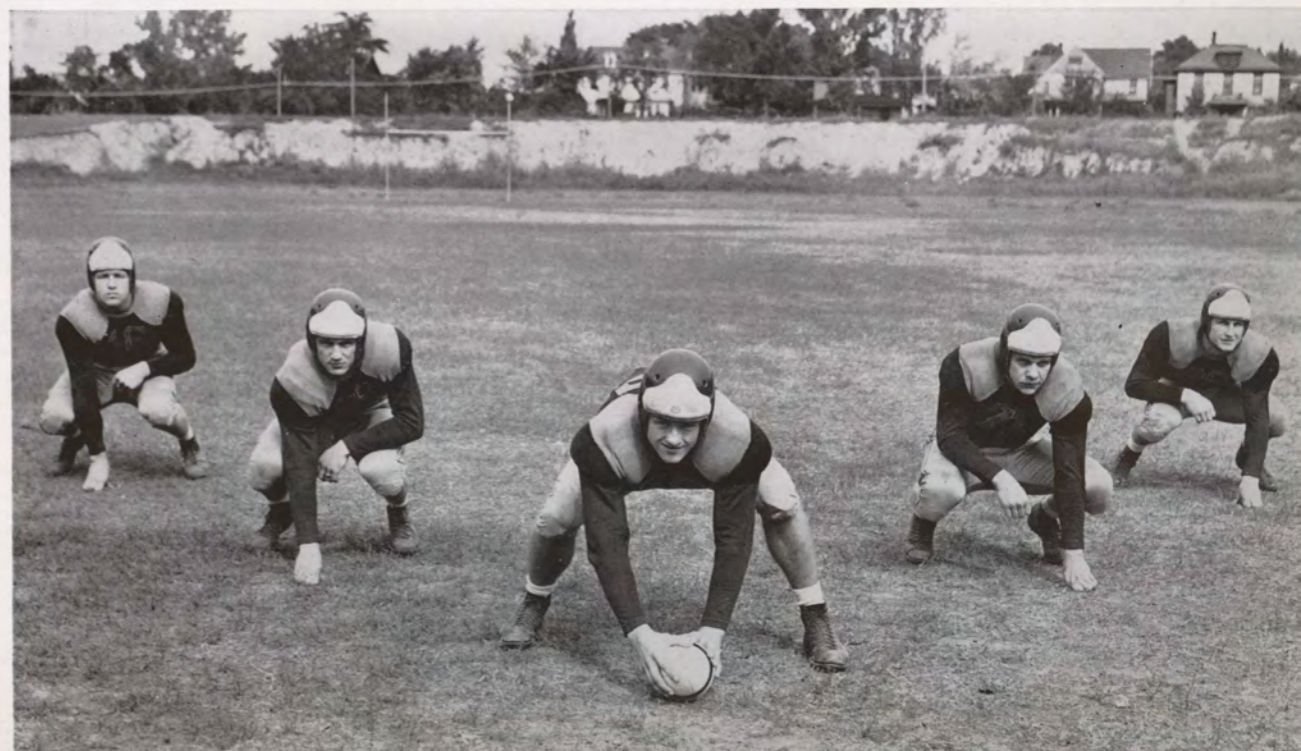
THE SEASON

The 1942 edition of the Maroons with Staff Cassell at the helm, opened with an impressive win over Southern Normal of Springfield, South Dakota, 59-6. The Maroons with their new "V" formation couldn't be stopped. The scoring for Morningside was divided evenly as the whole squad saw plenty of action.

Traveling to Grand Forks, the Maroons suffered their first defeat at the hands of the North Dakota University Sioux, 7-6. Gene Asprey scored the Maroon touchdown on a screen pass, scampering forty yards to score. The try for the extra point was wide. The Sioux struck back with a tricky reverse to tie the score and take the lead with a perfect placement. The Maroons threatened the rest of the game, but were still ten yards short of the pay dirt as the final gun went off.

The Maroons entertained the South Dakota State Bunnies on Homecoming, but came out second on a 3-0 score. This was a repeat of last year's game with the same Bunny kicking a field goal to win the game. The Maroons marched up and down the field, but lacked the scoring punch.

"V" FORMATION



The traditional battle between South Dakota University and Morningside played at Vermillion ended with the Coyotes on the heavy end of the score, 26-6. Chuck Dirr ran the opening kickoff to the Dakota 20, but on the next play the Maroons fumbled and Dakota recovered. The untimely fumbles of the Maroons set up the scoring opportunities for South Dakota. The lone Maroon score came on a screen pass from Obye to Asprey who drove fifty yards for a touchdown. The Maroons battled the Coyotes on fairly even terms with "tiny" Tommy Green leading the way.

The steam rolling Iowa State Teachers' perennial football champs rolled over Morningside, 26-6. The powerful Panthers were in the groove as Curly Steinkamp and Company did some fancy turf cutting to retain the Conference lead. "Wacky" Buchmiller, Maroon speedster, scored late in the third quarter on a long pass.

The invading Omaha Indians didn't have a chance as the much chagrined Maroons set their sights and let fly with both barrels to win, 49-13. The Maroons were on the beam and completely outclassed the Indians. Smith, a Maroon end, broke into the scoring column with two touchdowns, while Logue softened the opposition with powerful line smashes.

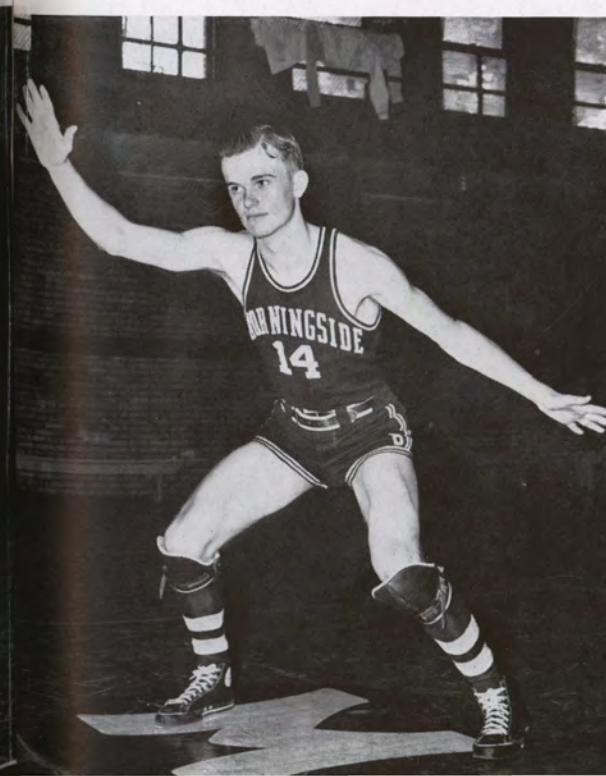
The Morningside Maroons' basketball season was off to a flying start when they defeated three teams in succession, Western Union, Yankton, and the Sioux City Air Base by large margin scores. In these first three games the Maroons made a 53 point average per game while their opponents were held to 32 tallies per contest. In the next game the Maroons toppled Wayne Teachers when "Dusty" Rhoades, during the last minute of play, dropped in his gift shot for the extra point and the game. During the entire game not more than four points separated the two teams. The return engagement found the Maroons winning from the "Wildcats" by a larger margin.

The coming of the New Year found a change in the coaching staff of Morningside. Staff Cassell left for the Navy, where he is continuing his coaching, and Don Snyder took over the duties of athletic director at Morningside. In the first game after the holidays the Maroons were downed by South Dakota U, at Vermillion, which ended the winning streak of the Maroons and was the first defeat in six games. The highlight of the year was the winning of the South Dakota State game by twenty points, and this swung the local boys back in the winning again. The Maroons were never threatened during the entire game. Bob Held tipped in 32 points, setting a new individual scoring record.

Iowa State Teachers lost a thriller to the local boys and put the Maroons in high hopes of being among the top teams of the North Central Conference. Morningside's title hopes were smashed on their week-end journey to North Dakota. The Maroons were defeated by North Dakota U in a tight contest and the following night were trounced by North Dakota State. In the second quarter the Bison hit a "hot" streak which the Maroons could not overcome.

At second semester the Maroons were hit by the withdrawals from school of Johnny Helm, Duane Logue, and Joe Gillham who left for farm work. Western Union gained revenge when the Eagles built up a large first quarter margin of 17 to 6, although the Maroons were only six points behind when the final whistle blew. Johnny Helm, regular center, was replaced by Bill Briggs. The next two games were walk-aways for the Maroons when they downed Omaha by a large score and defeated South Dakota U in a rough and tumble game in which the Maroons avenged the former win the Coyotes had at Vermillion earlier in the season.

Again the Maroon team suffered loss of players when Loren "Tut" Clark and Don "Dusty" Rhoades answered the service call of the Army Air Corps on February twentieth. The South Dakota U game was the last home game for these two boys. "Tut" and "Dusty" played in the Augustana game in which the Maroons lost by a charity toss

in the last few seconds of play. After the Augustana game Coach Don Snyder had only eight cagers available for action, the remnants of the twenty-nine man squad that reported in December. Without the help of Clark and Rhoades the Maroons were defeated by Iowa State Teachers who built up a large margin and coasted to a win. The last two basketball games of the season were with Augustana, who dumped the Maroons in a ten-point lead, and with Omaha who was downed in a dull tilt.

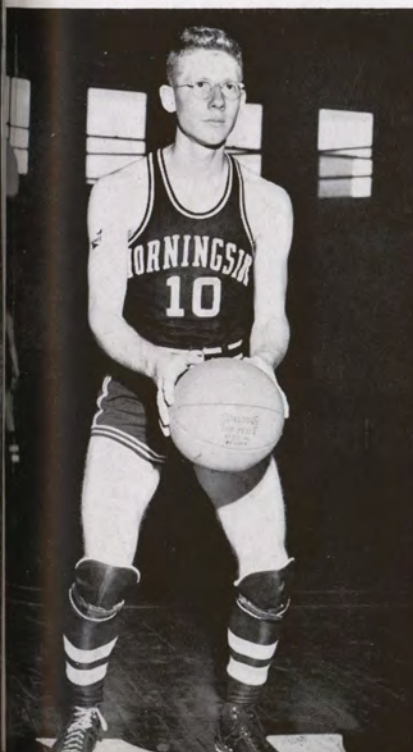
In the last game Bob Held poured in 27 points which put him out in front in the individual scoring championship of the North Central Conference. During the season Held connected on 104 field goals and 33 free throws for a total of 241 points. Bill Briggs, freshman basketeer, finished in eighth place in the conference with 139 tallies, in spite of the fact that he did not play regular until late in January. The Maroons averaged 48 points per game and registered 822 points during the entire season against opponents' 697 total points or 41 counters per game.

The highest number of tallies scored in a game was against South Dakota State when the Maroon quint gathered 62 points. Lowest number was in the 36-33 win over Iowa State Teachers. Best defensive performance was against Omaha who was stopped with 21 tallies. In the seventeen tilts the Maroons won ten, while in league competition the Maroons won five and lost six, which put them in fifth place in the North Central Conference standing.

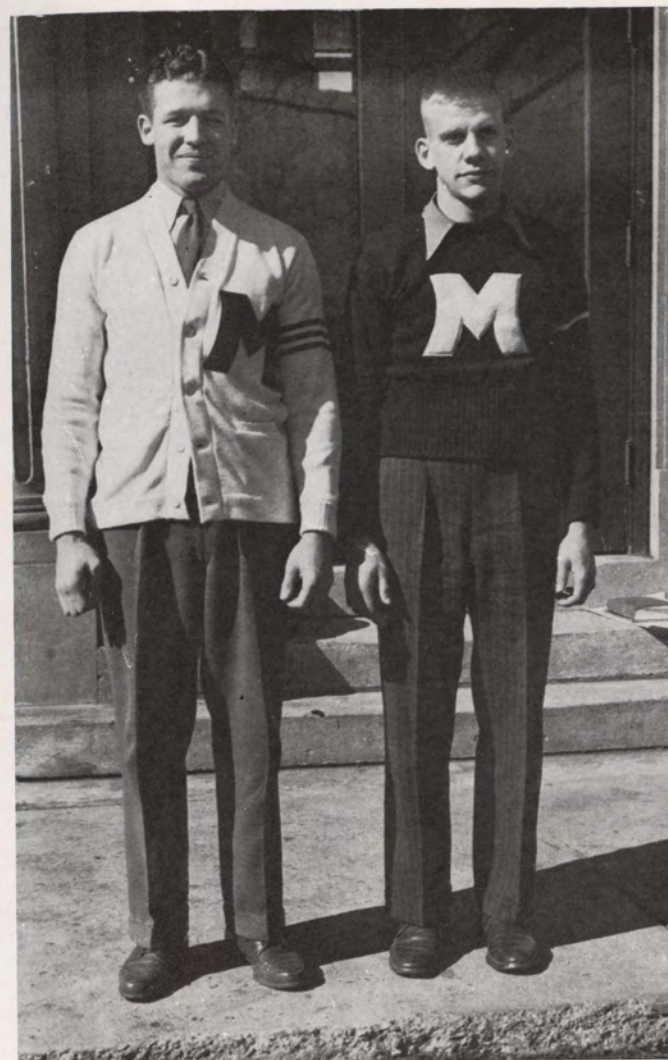

Cheer Leaders

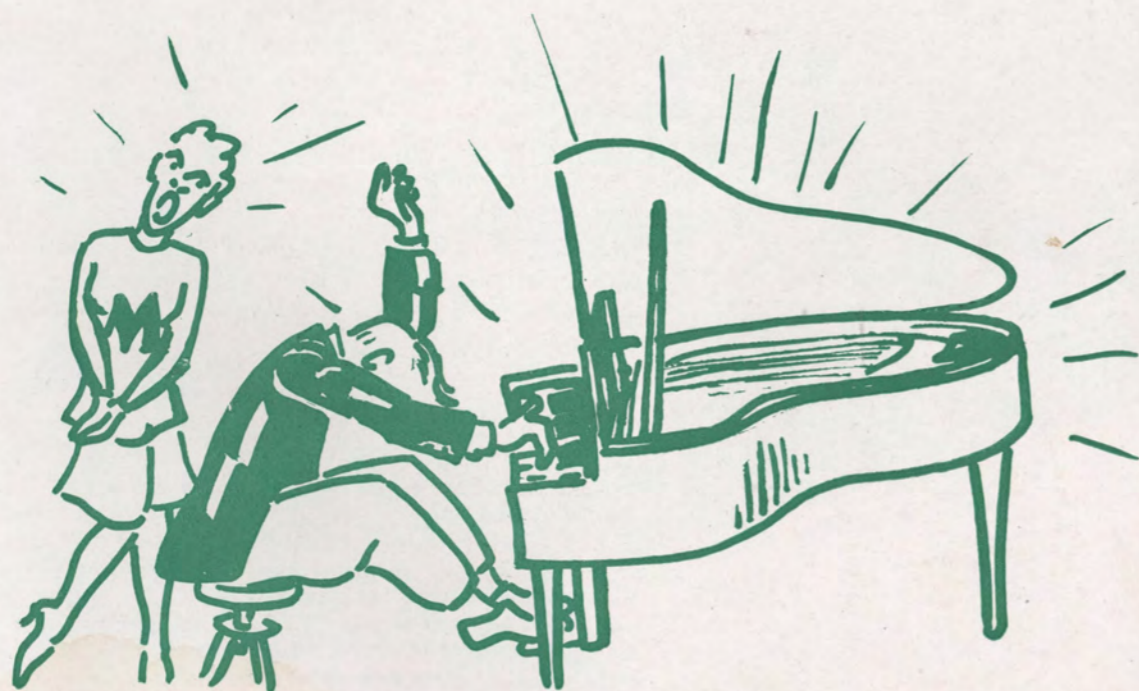

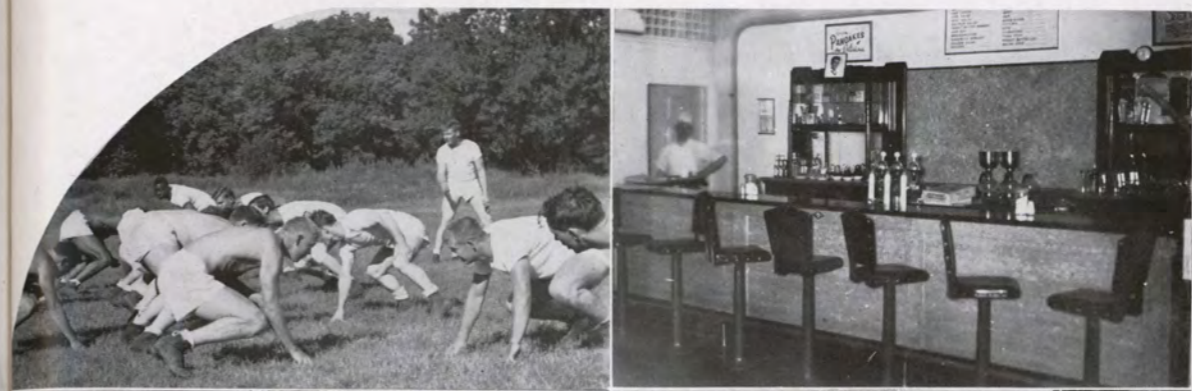
