




























































# -Orientation '90














































# Homecoming 90 Diamonds in the rough


Many students agree that this Homcoming was the best in years and we can be assured that because of the enthusiasm of the student body next year's will be even better. O
















# Residence Halls

Posters, lofts, carpet and beanbags are only a few of the things students use to make the four-walled space a little more cozy. It is in the residence halls that students prove to be most resourceful as a stack of stolen milk crates serve as steps up to a loft, bed sheets become drapes, or the window sill is used as a makeshift refrigerator in winter.






























# Lady Chief Volleyball

The Lady Chiefs volleyball squad ended their season with an overall record of 18-22. Their conference record ended with a mark of 1-8 which ranked them ninth for the 1990 season.

The Lady Chiefs were lead by new head-coach Joan McDermott. McDermott spent the last two years coaching at Metro State in Denver, Colorado before coming to Morningside. She led the MS Roadrunners to a 69-22 record with two appearances in the NCAA Division II playoffs.

Although the squad was young, with only six returning letter-winners, he team was full of potential. Morningside's strong defense was sparked by returning players Raylee Goodburn and Melanie Prince. Also assisting with defense is transfer student, Sara Bailey from Northwest Community College in Wyoming. Other major players are freshman Jill Jackes and Kristen Kofoed. Jackes and Kofoed provided the team the extra strength for the needed sideouts. Kofoed, an All-Stater in Colorado, missed the beginning of the season due to a shoulder injury.

The Lady Chiefs wound up their home games by taking on the two teams from North Dakota, the University of and State.


Morningside went the full five games, but lost the deciding game

15-4 to UND.



# Chief's shine in '90

The best season in years

Exploding into the season with four straight wins, the Chiefs finished 1990 with a winning record of 7-4.

The Chiefs managed to stay ranked in the NCAA Division II top 20 poll for three weeks and setting numerous school records. Two in rushing with 2577 total yards and an average of 234.3 yards per game. Jorge Diaz helped put a new school record of field goals at 5 for a single game and 15 for the season.

The 1990 players of the year included senior offensive tackle Marcus Williams, senior linebacker Brain McCabe, and junior kicker Bill Kennedy.

Morningside had four Chiefs named to the All-NCC first team. They included senior offensive tackle John Boll, senior halfback Jeff Smith, sophomore cornerback Brent Olson and senior McCabe.



Coach Dolch is looking at a very competitive team for '91 ad will be ready to challenge the top NCAA Division II schools.







The Morningside Lady Chiefs completed their 1990-91 season with a 5-23 record overall.

Taking on the head coach

duties for Morningside is Rhonda Penquite. Penquite comes from Oral Roberts University, where she served as head coach of the NCAA Division I program for three seasons (1986-89).

In her first season as a coach of ORU she lead them to a second place finish in the Midwestern City Collegiate Conference en route to a 16-12 overall record.

Also joining the Lady Chiefs for the first time are six freshman. Three of these were from the Minneapolis/St. Paul area (Holly Clark; Blaine, Colleen Holland; St. Paul, Sarah Rolloff; Bloomington.) The other three

freshmen were: Nicole Newberg from Hinton, Michelle Krough of Van Horne, and Debi Runde from Benton, Wisconsin.

Returning to play again for the Lady Chiefs were: Melinda Howard from Estherville, senior Monica Durkee from Blue Earth, Minnesota, Lisa Bandy a 5-9 forward from Denison, sophomore Sloane Rolloff from Bloomington

Minnesota, forward Donalee Johnson from Hudson, Wisconsin, Sue Selland a 5-11 forward from Letcher, South Dakota, and Shawna Paskert a 6-2 center from Emmetsburg.


Injuries and personal problems depleted the team to excess. Although the remaining team members tried hard to support the rather handicapped team, the Lady Chiefs could not hold back the other teams and finished conference with a record of 2-16.

In the spring of 1991 head coach Penquite resigned after a disargeement of policy with the Women's Athletic Administration.

"I wasn't able to do the things I thought were necessary to build the program and do them in a way I felt they needed to be done," said Penquite.

Bill Enockson, Morningside's athletic director, said that "a search for a new head coach is being led by Roberta Boothby and we hope to have a coach in place by May 1st."







## Chief Basketball

Morningside wins big under Schmutte

Morningside's basketball program experienced a new face to the coaching staff. Jerry Schmutte assumed the head coach position of the Chief's basketball squad for 1990-91.

Schmutte comes from Nebraska-Wesleyan University in Lincoln, NE, where he transformed the Plainsmen into national NCAA Division III prominence. Schmutte has established a track record of turning basketball programs into winners and Morningside is confident he can carry on that tradition with the Chiefs.

The Chiefs played many sensational games but the one that stands out is win over UNI at the Dome in Cedar Falls. Leading the Chiefs against the Panthers were Chris Kuhlman with 26 points, and Jason Siemon and Jeff Birchard both had 19. Birchard also managed to grab 10

rebounds and Terrance Green had 6. Coach Schmutte called it one of the greatest wins of his career.


Over Christmas break the Chiefs had the chance to play in Hawaii. Morningside lost to BYU, 101-100. Siemon and Kuhlman both had 19 pts. Danny Beaird pulled a careerhigh of 16, while sophomores Jason Huff and Dave Vaandrager had 14 and 11 respectively. Before returning home the Chiefs managed to down the Hawaii-Hilo squad with a score of 87 to their 60.

In February senior center Jeff Birchard suffered a torn ligament after coming down from a rebound against Augustana. Birchard was one of Morningside's best-ever centers and ended his career just shy of the 1000 point barrier. Only nine other Chiefs hold that title.

With the lose of Birchard the Chiefs still managed to defeat second ranked Mankato State, 89-87. Crowd pleasers Cory Hogue and Joel Juelsgaard both saw play in the win. Kuhlman had 22 points, Green ended

with 18, Huff had 12, and Siemon added 10. Freshman center Chad Mercer led in rebounds with nine.

The Chiefs ended the season with a record of 12-8 and tied Mankato State for second in the NCC.

















































































































































### Phone • A • Rama


The pledges recieved from the two week period totaled more than \$117,000.



he said. He then added with a laugh, "And since I'm an actor, let's face it, I need the attention." And as far as




advice for students, Woody said that if he could do it all over again he would spend more time reading, especially for the sciences.


















### AOII Alpha Omicron Pi

November brought the initiation of four additional members. New initiates included Kim Lennon, Corena Wallery, Lynda Walter, and Laurie Whitfield.






#### The International Club

During the spring semester the Art gallery is reserved for senior shows. All art majors and minors are required to put up an exhibition to show their work they've completed throughout their college years.























Salmon took the MSC stage for the second time, this time playing Touchstone, the obligitory Shakespearian fool, using his talents as ameteur magician and stunt man. Hoefert played the part of the exiled princess passing as a shepard boy which required her to play an actor within and actress. Another actor who showed real versitility was Chrisatopher Belt who played both the unfeeling and cruel Duke Fredrick and the brother he exiled, the kind and understanding Duke Senior.









