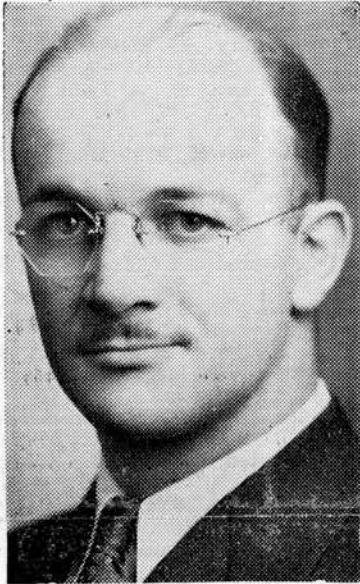

## Education Head to Tulsa University

Dr. J. E. Kirkpatrick, head of the education department at Morningside College since February, 1936, has accepted a position as associate professor of education at the University of Tulsa, at Tulsa, Okla.

homa. He left for the new position at the close of the 1947 summer session.

At Morningside Dr. Kirkpatrick has been chairman of the teacher placement bureau and professor of education. During the war period he was administrator of the high ranking instructional work of the C.T.D. at the college. He also developed a program of audio-visual education which ranks high among liberal arts colleges. At the University of Tulsa he is teaching courses in techniques of research and tests and measurements in the graduate school and regular education courses in the undergraduate school. The University of Tulsa has an enrollment approximating 5,000 students and is recognized as being the home of the greatest petroleum engineering school in the nation.

In addition to his duties on the campus, Dr. Kirkpatrick gave unstinted service in many ways to Grace Methodist Church and to the community.

The educational developments in the state of Iowa were a constant source of interest and effort on his part. He was an active worker in the Woodbury County Council. Legislators sought his opinion in analysis of laws up for passage. He was vice-president of the Northwest Iowa Teachers association for three and a half years and president and vice-president of the Iowa Institutional Teacher Placement Association. He has been state chairman of the Iowa Commission on Teacher Education and Professional Standards since its establishment in January, 1946.

## Annual Homecoming Set for November 8

In June, 1946, he attended the National Emergency Conference on teacher supply and demand at Chautauqua, N. Y. This summer he attended the National conference on Improvement in Teaching at Oxford, Ohio. In both instances he was a member of a delegation of six educators from Iowa, and he served as chairman of one section at the latter meeting. He also attended the National clinic on teacher education at Atlanta, Georgia, last November.

His quiet but faithful and vital service to the college and to the state is greatly appreciated both by the college and by many throughout the state. The college wishes him well in his new location with its possibilities of continued outstanding service to education. His schedule at the University is adjusted so that he may render similar service in the development of education in the state of Oklahoma.

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## Alumni! Special Notice!

Morningside College is planning to participate in the statewide program of this year emphasizing the 100th anniversary of Iowa statehood. The official national exhibit of Iowans opened last December in the Library of Congress in Washington, D. C. The Centennial committee is appealing to the college alumni to support this effort by helping provide materials and articles for the exhibition that are connected with Iowa in general, with northwestern Iowa, Woodbury County, Sioux City, and Morningside College in particular.

Anything in the line of historical materials, maps, books, letters, diaries, pictures, public documents, paintings, artifacts, etc., can be used. Further publicity will be given this as soon as the project has taken shape. Alumni, remember this celebration in your Homecoming plans. 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## Fall Enrollment to Hit 1,125

Morningside wound up its official registration last Thursday, Sept. 18, with 1,097 fulltime students enrolled and late arrivals expected to boost the final figure to about 1,125. New students and transfers total around 400.

New Student Days began September 15 with new student and transfer registration and freshman examinations, the college beginning in full session on September 19.

The evening division of the college is under the direction of Sidney A. Collins, professor in the department of economics and business administration. Members of the regular faculty will teach classes in English, sociology and physical education, and the faculty will be supplemented by business and professional people.

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## Summer Commencement Held August 22nd

Twenty-one seniors were awarded bachelor's degrees and three two-year elementary school teacher's certificates were presented at the 1947 Summer Commencement held at 8 P. M. Friday evening, August 22, at Grace Methodist church. Professor John B. Magee, philosophy instructor, delivered the address, "The Failure of Nerve."

Joseph E. Jeffery, graduate of the class of 1910 and superintendent of schools in Bridgeport, Conn., was presented the degree of Doctor of Pedagogy. Because Mr. Jeffery was unable to be present at the exercises, H. Clifford Harper, '11, accepted the degree for him.

## Faculty Retirement Plan

The following report which was drawn up by the trustee committee on retirement of faculty was accepted by the Board of Trustees at the annual spring meeting of the Board.

Report from Committee on Retirement:

1. For faculty members who have reached the age of 70 but are not included in the Teachers' Annuity Association Plan, we recommend an annuity based on the Northwest Iowa Conference allowance for retired Methodist ministers, viz., \$21.00 per year for each year of service. For example, faculty members with 40 years of continuous service would receive \$840.00 per annum payable monthly. However, the \$21.00 basis is to be fixed and not variable as in the case of the Conference. Retirement is to be complete at the end of the current school year, and the annuity is to be paid regardless of additional income from other sources. The Administration is not prohibited from employing members of the over-age group for all or part time on a "new business" basis but any such arrangement shall be disassociated from full retirement under this annuity plan. Faculty members' widows shall receive two-thirds of the amount paid their husbands, computed for the number of years of their married life together in residence at the College.

2. The above \$21.00 per year basis shall also be applied to other faculty members now included in the Teachers' Annuity Plan, when they attain the age of 70, provided the amount they would receive under the Teachers' Plan is less than the amount they would receive on the \$21.00 per year basis above outlined. However, the accumulated credit under the Teacher's Annuity Plan shall be deducted from the amount paid under the \$21.00 per year Conference Plan.

Under this plan Dr. T. C. Stephens, Prof. J. A. Coss, Dr. R. N. Van Horne, Prof. Henry F. Kanthleiner and Miss Laura Fischer are being retired this fall.

Many high school standouts from the Sioux City territory are in the freshman group.

Material for the line positions is plentiful with the exception of the center slot. The quarterback position poses the only problem in the backfield for Coach Davis at the present time, and much work is being put in to develop a smooth working combination.

The drills have consisted mostly of loosening up work and conditioning exercises under the direction of assistant Coach "Chuck" Obye. Plays have been introduced and offensive work has started. Line Coach Al Buckingham has commended Bob Gregorvich, a mainstay of last year, who is showing up very well in tough blocking practice. Forrest Wynkoop, letterwinner of last year, has shifted from the tackle position to center to strengthen the middle of the line.

Howard Peterson, tackle, was out of action for the major portion of this week's scrimmages because of a minor operation on his neck.
