## Football Season of 1932

Outweighted in every game and outfought in none, is the record of Morningside's 1932 football team, which went through a gruelling schedule with only two victories to brighten the record. The outstanding feature of this, the hard luck team of the North Central Conference, was the defensive play of the line, which held the strongest opponents scoreless until weakened by enemy replacements which they weren't able to match from their own bench.

The highlights of the season came in the middle of a tough campaign when the touted South Dakota State eleven was held for three quarters only to score via the air in the final period, and when the hapless Sioux Falls College crew took an unmerciful beating from the Sioux who had been battering against teams backed by superior man power through the season.

The Coyotes took a close 6 to 0 victory in Inman field in Vermillion on Dakota Day after three scoreless quarters had kept a maniacal crowd on its feet from the opening whistle. This victory was the hardest for the Maroons to lose as it broke a four-game winning streak held over the traditional rivals from up the river.

Of this team, which merited the praises of grid experts throughout the loop, Coach Saunderson loses the most important men. The most serious losses come in the fullback, center, and tackle posts where Haenfler, Asmussen, Wyant, and Bollman played sensational ball throughout the season. Bones, a sturdy guard, Sherwood, triple threat halfback, and Strom and Perry, ends, will also be lost and their places will be hard to fill.

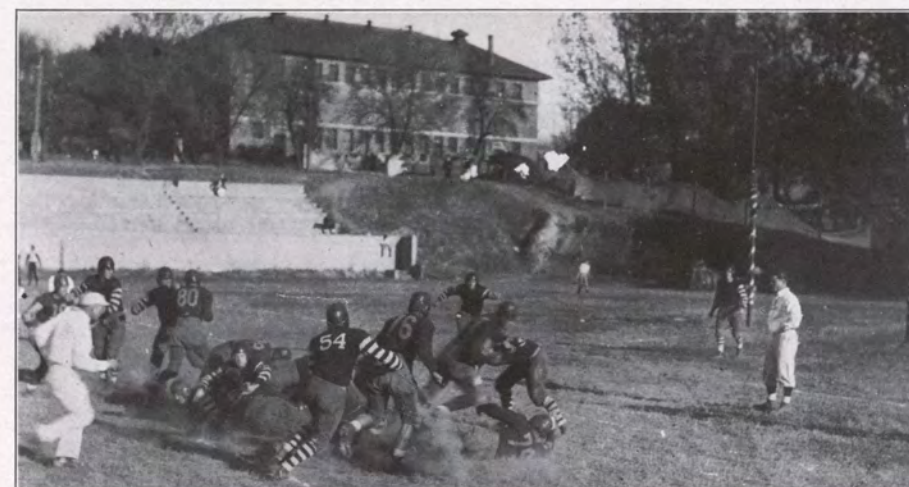

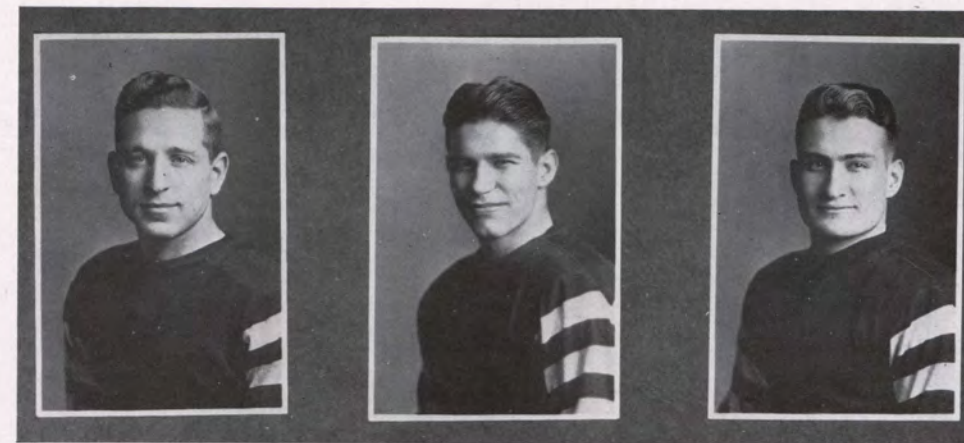
A sophomore back whose vicious blocking and tackling were combined with canny generalship is Gurney Day, who has two more years to command Maroon and White grid hosts.

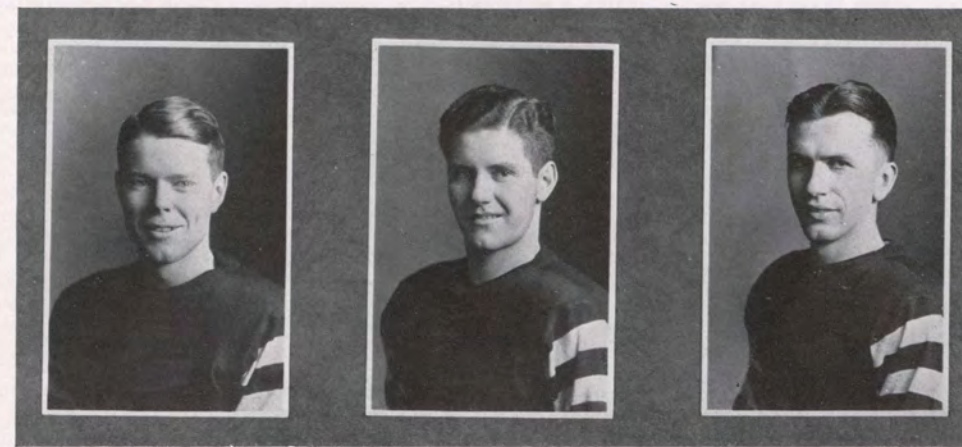
An accident in the last conference game of the year kept Paul Perry from concluding his college grid career in action, but his work during his three seasons of play marked him as a valuable end.

Basketball Season

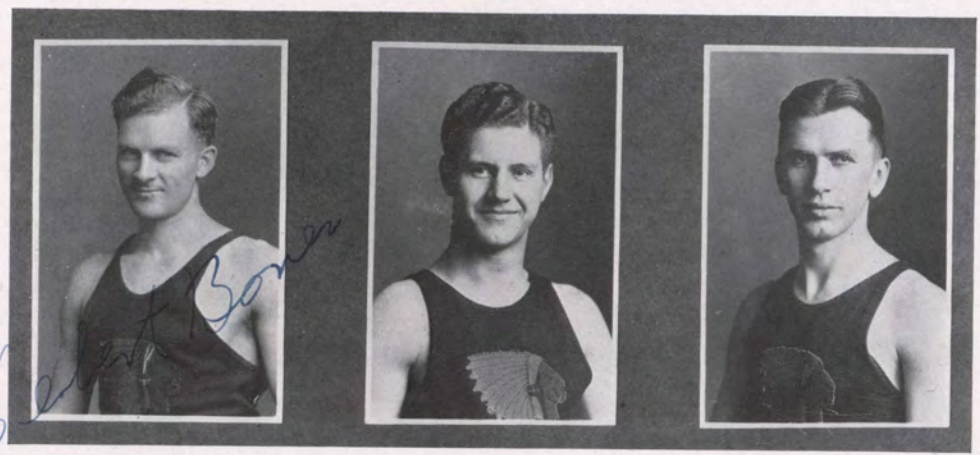
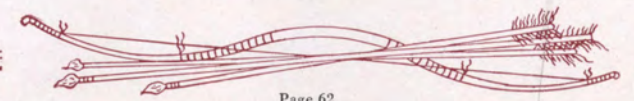

## Track Season

What bid fair to be a drab track season turned into one of the most prosperous in years. A quartet of crack hurdlers placed consistently in meets; field men were regular in their performances as they contributed points, and recognition was earned at various meets under heavy competition.

At the Drake Relays, Herb Gottlob threw the discus and put the shot, but was unable to place in the finals after qualifying tosses. Arthur Van Wyngarden blazed his way through a brilliant season in the hurdle events, and climaxed it with his entry in the national collegiate meet in Chicago. He won his qualifying race in the low hurdles, but was forced to be content with a low place in the finals which were won by an Olympic champion. Van Wyngarden broke a conference record that had stood since 1911, and then broke his own record twice. His time in the low barriers placed him sixth in the nation in 1931, but barely kept him out of the first ten for 1932.

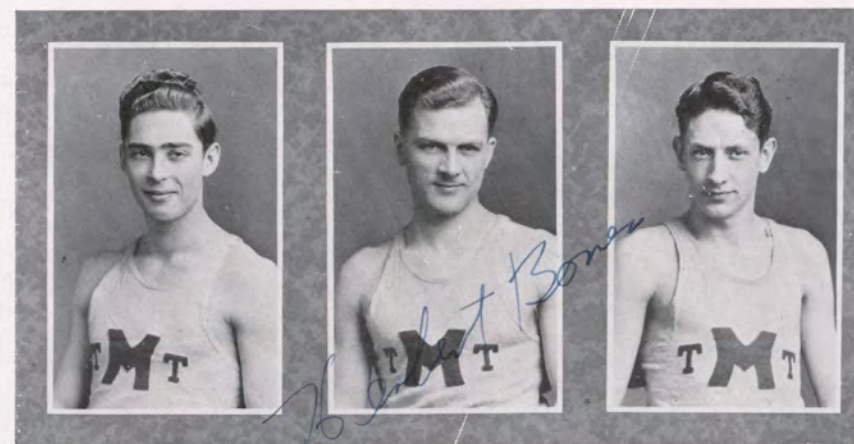
In the Dakota and North Central conference carnivals, the Sioux placed men in all events, and made creditable showings despite their lack of man power. Garber in the pole vault and high jump consistently contributed points; Smith as a hurdler and javelin thrower, Van Wyngarden as a hurdler and sprinter, Gottlob as a weight man, and Taylor and Barker as hurdlers were able to place in all of the meets. The outstanding performances of the field men came in the South Dakota dual when all three Morningside shot putters broke the school mark when they swept the event.

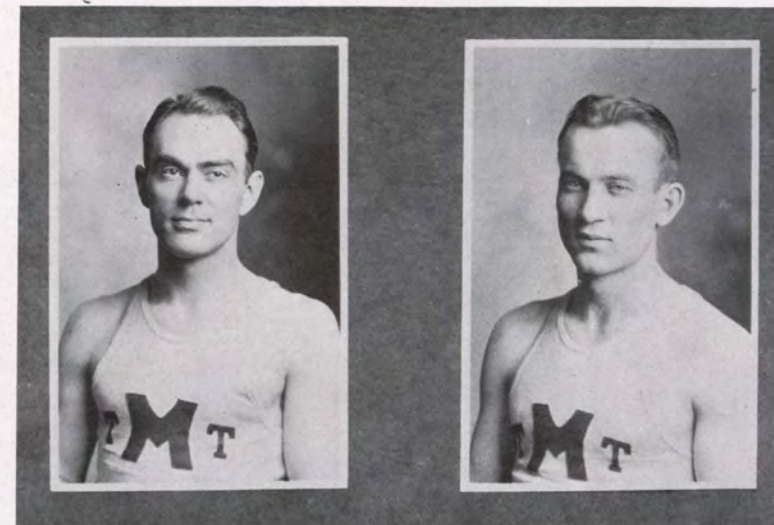

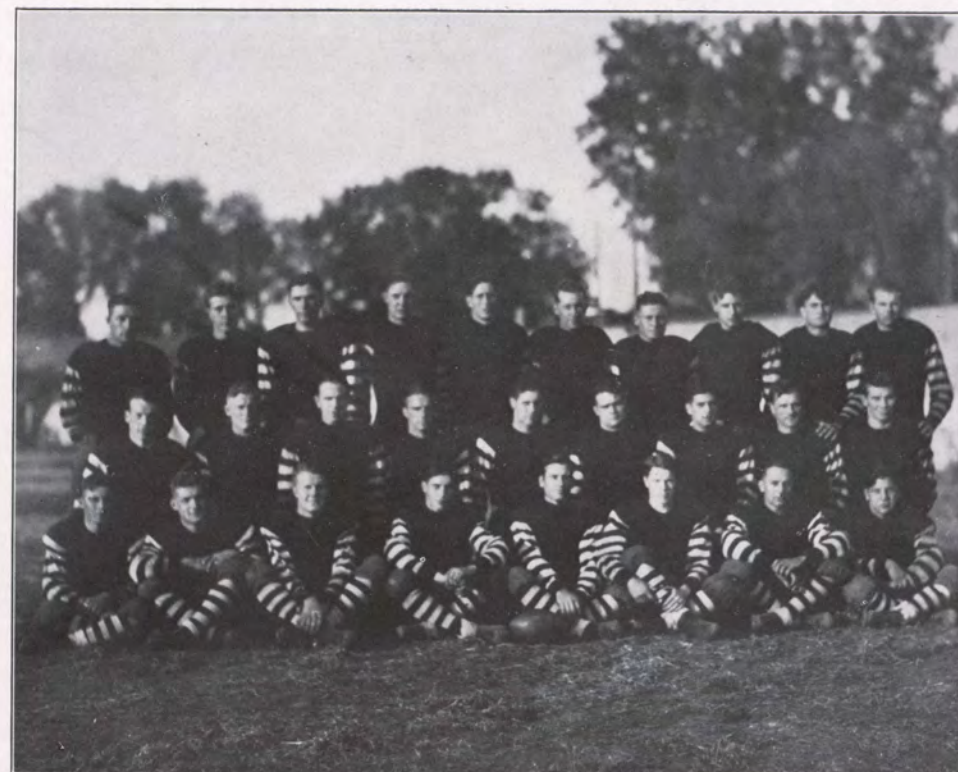

"Van" takes a place among the track immortals of Morningside College by virtue of his performance on the cinder path last spring where he concluded a collegiate track career of record breaking in the high and low hurdles. During the course of the season this fleet timber topper from Manson broke a mark that had stood since 1911, and then broke his own mark twice after that. He went to the national collegiate meet in Chicago last spring, hitch-hiking his way and being trainer, coach, and athlete all in one, and after winning his preliminary race to qualify for the final heat, was edged out of a place by hurdlers who later in the summer placed in Olympic competition. Track was the only sport in which he participated seriously, but his specialization was justified by the dazzling performances he was able to turn in consistently in heavy competition.

#### FRESHMAN FOOTBALL

Breaking the four-year hold of the University of South Dakota Coyote Pups on victories in the annual grid clash of the two yearling squads was probably the most outstanding achievement of the 1932 plebe football team. This eleven, composed of experienced prep school players in all berths, provided competition for the varsity in scrimmages, and Coach J. M. Saunderson fell heir to a wealth of talented material at the close of the season.

The front line, although it contained few really heavy men who could be looked on as first rate varsity material from this standpoint, was a canny combination, combining a wide knowledge of the game with a fighting spirit which, in turn, was tempered by good judgment. At center, Doug Reeder held his post in the face of determined opposition by Meredith, and was flanked by Goldberg, Hubbs, Tremaine, or James, in the guard spots. Outside of this trio came Roach, Walden, and Docken, tackles, and the wall was completed by Fellwock, Peterson, Hedum, and Crawford, ends. Plenty of reserve material backed this line, and most of it was given a chance to see service during the year.

In the backfield the greatest talent of the squad came. To general the team from the quarterback post was Baumsten, Rasmussen, McArthur, or Johnson, all good field generals, and all capable of assuming the blocking and ball carrying duties of the quarterback. For half-backs, Coach "Honie" Rogers could pick a pair from Dean, Babcock, Brubaker, Baumstein, or Johnson, and have two triple threat men on the field. This quartet was rounded by either Childers or Yount at fullback.

### *Sioux City Symphony Orchestra*

The Sioux City Symphony, sponsored by the Sioux City Music Association, is to be highly complimented for its exceptionally fine concerts which have been given during this year. Mr. Leo Kucinski, head of the violin department of Morningside College, is the director, and he is to be congratulated for his success as conductor of the Symphony. Through his efforts, the organization has gained the wide-spread approval and enthusiasm of all music lovers who have heard the Symphony. There are seventy-five members of the orchestra, including professional musicians, and talented students from the Conservatory and from Sioux City. Various noted soloists have appeared as guest soloists with the Symphony. This season has been a very successful one, and most assuredly one worthy of favorable commendation in every respect.

### *Sioux City Concert Course, 1932-33*

The Concert Course was presented under the auspices of the Sioux City Civic Music Association. Seven concerts were presented. The first concert, November 2, included the Sioux City Symphony and Sascha Gorodnitzki, pianist. The second concert was on November 29, with Poldi Mildner, pianist. The fifteenth annual presentation of the Messiah was offered as the third concert of the series on December 14, with guest soloists, chorus, orchestra; Professor Paul MacCollin conducting. On January 13, Heinrich Schlusnus appeared as baritone soloist, and on January 19, Benno Rabinof, violinist, played as soloist for the Sioux City Symphony. The sixth concert of the season, February 10, presented the Casadesus Ensemble of ancient stringed instruments. The final concert on March 2, with the Sioux City Symphony presenting a complete program of Wagner, completed the concert season.

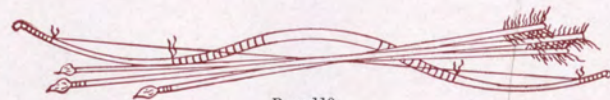


DR. WILTON W. COOK

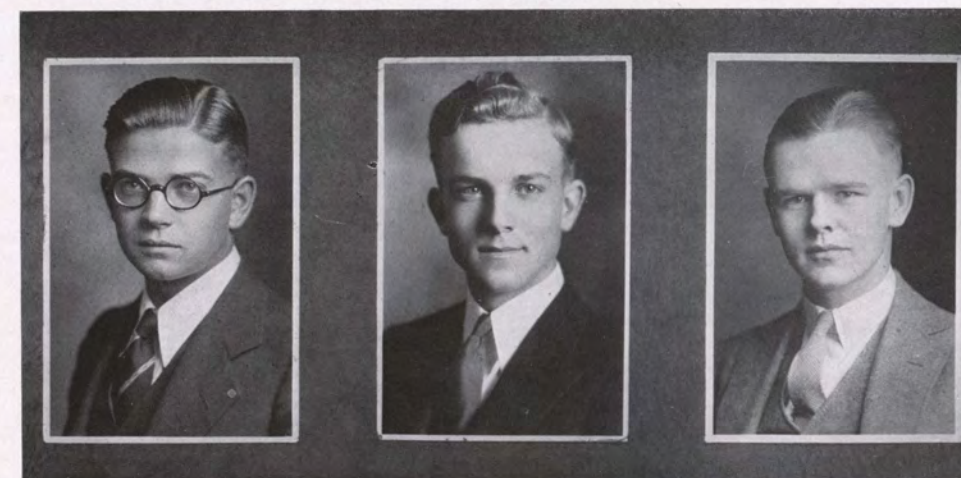

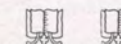

The excellent acting of Roene Brooks and John Peterson in "Cloudburst," and that of Janice Hagy in "Tombs," deserves recognition.



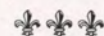
