
For some, it was a year of discovering-each other.








We wanted to belong, to be united in a crowd and cheer for Morningside. But our interests were as divided as the buildings that separated science from music from liberal arts.

The library was symbol of the academic life, the long hours of concentration. Work was inescapable, whether it was in music or livestock marketing or student teaching.



We worked for them, liked them personally, argued with them about their fields.











As we learned from the professors we came to appreciate the dedication which scarcely allowed them a few minutes relaxation in the faculty lounge.

Some of us would remember this most from our college year 1961—the name of one teacher whose scholarship and teaching had given meaning to a college education.







"The Insect Comedy," by Joseph and Karel Capek, directed by Mr. Robert Quinn, was a flight into the world of fantasy, where insects took on the characteristics, chiefly the weaknesses, of man. The first act centered on "social butterflies" with their endless round of flirtation and jealousy. The second act exposed the essential selfishness of the family and society by the miserly beetles, the wasp who killed to feed his larva "only the softest parts," and the innocently self-centered crickets. Act three was an exploration of the meaninglessness of war.





The Morningside College Maroon Chiefs closed the 1960-61 Basketball season in the cellar of the North Central Conference. They compiled a conference record of two wins and ten losses and an over-all record of seven and seventeen. The season, however, did provide many thrills, especially in individual games such as the home game against North Dakota University or the one against Augustana. One individual highlight was Paul Te Stroete's record .960 percetage in Free-throw shooting.

Morningside opened the season by dumping the Eagles of Westmar 76 to 66. However, it wasn't until the final two or three minutes that the Chiefs were out of trouble. Bob Garretson dropped in ten field goals and four of seven free throws to lead scoring with 24 points.


The second encounter saw the Morningsiders squeezing past Cornell 74 to 72. The winning margin came in the free throw department where the Chiefs dumped in 20 of 27 compared with 18 out of 34 for Cornell. Garretson again led scoring with 23 points, while Jim Anfinson dumped in 21 for a close second.

The Chiefs picked up their third win in a row by outlasting Nebraska Wesleyan 74 to 67. The Morningsiders were in charge for the whole game except for a brief period midway in the second half when Wesleyan pulled within six points. Garretson's 19 points again topped the scoring.

The Morningsiders suffered their first loss at the hands of Midland College, 70 to 63. The Midland Warriors grabbed a 10 to 0 lead and never lost control in the game in which the Chiefs were able to connect with only 28 percent of their shots. Garretson was again on top with 20 points.


Augustana College spilled the Chiefs in their North Central Conference opener 60 to 52. The Vikings pulled ahead for good ahead early in the second half following a seesaw first half. Jim Anfinson led Morningside scorers with 11 points.








