




GRACE METHODIST CHURCH


# THE DORM

Just west of the Grace Methodist Church lies the gracious home of the President. The "latch-string" is out to all who come, and the welcome extended to all callers is most cordial.






# THE BARN

Also successfully carried out by the Council were the traditional spring events of Walkout Day, Sadie Hawkins Day, and Spring Formal.

Looking back on the academic year 45-46, Morningsiders can see that it was a year of great change, of constant surprise, but most of all, of a successful and well-balanced program of activities, headed by the Student Council.

## DEBATE

In Morningside's first year of intercollegiate forensic competition since 1942, the squad, consisting of Earl Pollock and Jack Howe, coached by Dr. Thomas E. Tweito, participated in numerous events in this section of the country.

Debating both sides of the question, "Resolved: That the policy of the United States should be directed toward the establishment of free trade among nations of the world," the team commenced their season with a first place, winning all their debates, at a tournament held at Wayne State Teachers College in December. This was followed by a non-decision meet at Doane College, Crete, Nebraska, and then, in late February, by a tournament at the University of Nebraska, where the team was one of ten from among seventy-two participating which received a certificate for superior work, while Earl received individual honors in debate and discussion. As the climax of the season, the team journeyed to St. Paul for the Northwest Debate Tournament, where they placed second, losing to Marquette in the finals. Thence to Cedar Rapids for the Iowa Intercollegiate Tournament, where they were one of three teams securing superior ratings. Here both Earl and Jack received individual awards as debaters, and, in addition, Earl was given recognition for superior work in newscasting and poetry reading. The team also participated in individual debates with the University of South Dakota at Morningside, and with the University of Omaha at Omaha, and finished the year by attending the Provincial Tournament of Pi Kappa Delta, national speech fraternity, held this year at Yankton, where they were tied for first place.

In all, the team accumulated four firsts and one second place for debate in the five decision tournaments it attended.

Another new member of the Physical Education Department is Albert Buckingham, '39. Upon his discharge from the Navy, November 7, "Buck" assumed his duties as basketball mentor. Under his guidance, the Maroon quint built up a fine won-lost record.

After his graduation from Morningside, Al coached two years at Sergeant Bluffs High School, where his basketball team went to the state tournament.

#### RUSSELL HUGHES

Returning to his alma mater to take over the reins of the 1945 Maroon football squad is Coach Russell B. Hughes. The team, under Russ's tutelage, improved steadily and played their best game in upsetting a highly rated Dakota Wesleyan team. Coach Hughes also assisted Al Buckingham in directing the fortunes of the 1945 basketball team.

Graduating in the class of '37, he has had previous coaching experience in the Akron and Woodbine high schools.



JACK BRAKE—Jack, a Sioux City freshman, played a lot of guard for the Maroons, and more will be heard of him next year.

DICK FORBES—Dick played quarterback and was the best blocker on the squad. He proved a valuable ball-carrier in his own right, being particularly effective on reverse plays.

BOB GILLESPIE—Winning fame for his accurate passes from center and his line backing, Bob will be missed next year on the Maroon eleven line-up. South Dakota University gained second semester upon his transfer from Morningside.

ORIN GOODRICH—"Goody" was without doubt the star of the squad. He was the leading ground gainer, possessed an accurate passing eye and did the team's kicking. Orin, a junior, will be heard from in the 1946 season.

WILL KAUFMAN—Another former Maroon squadman. Will was always good for a first down or a few needed yards from his fullback position.

NORM MUTCHLER—Norm, though handicapped by an injured ankle. played a lot of halfback. He proved a good pass receiver in the Augustana game, and his extra point against Dakota Wesleyan proved the margin of difference between the two teams.

In their first football game since 1942, the Maroons fought the Wayne State Teacher Wildcats to a 0-0 standstill. The team's initial encounter showed several expected early game weaknesses which rose to mar the action of the contest. Playing an outstanding game for Morningside where Goodrich and Will Kaufman, backs; and Bert Nixon in the line.

Russ Hughes took the helm for game number two. October 4 found the Maroon eleven invading Augustana College of Sioux Falls at their homecoming. After battling on even grounds for the first half, 7 to 7, the Sioux Falls aggregation took advantage of several Morningside fumbles to push over two more scores. The Sioux squad was able to tally only once in the last half, the final score being 20--14. Goodrich scored both touchdowns for Morningside, with Paul Zeman and Will Kaufman making the conversions. In the line, Warner, starting his first game at guard, and Bert Nixon starred.

The following week Morningside traveled to Lincoln, Nebraska, to play Nebraska Wesleyan College. Morningside was downed 21-0 in a heartbreaker, with the Plainsmen scoring on passes.

Again, the Homecoming jinx was overcome as the Sioux downed Augustana 26-20. The game was nip and tuck all the way, with Orin Goodrich proving to be the difference between the two teams. "Goody" heaved two touchdown passes to Zeman and Mutchler, and marked down the other two counters on short line plunges. The team, at times, showed defensive lapses, but Morningside, not to be denied this victory, tightened and held when the chips were down. Forbes, quarterback; Zeman and Nixon, ends; were other standouts in the game.

Ending their season on a victorious tone, the Maroons played their best game of the season downing a tough Dakota Wesleyan outfit. Wesleyan scored first but Dick Forbes plunged over for the Maroons to make the half time score 6-6. In the third quarter the Maroons took a lead they never relinquished as Norm Mutchler drove 13 yards for the touchdown and assured the Maroon victory by booting the extra point. Goodrich and Mutchler looked good in the backfield and the line played very well as a unit.

BERT NIXON—An East High graduate, Bert proved a very capable performer, shining particularly on defense. Few opposing teams called plays around right end.

FRED WARNER—Onawa's contribution to the 1945 Maroon football eleven was Fred Warner. Fred played a bang up game at guard and was always in the thick of action.

TOM WIKSTROM—Tom, lone senior of the team, hails from Sioux City. Being unusually fast for a lineman, Tom was at his best when the going was rough.

LEONARD WORDEN—"Len," another freshman, was an aggressive guard in the Morningside line. His best performance was in the Homecoming game, when he plugged up the left side.

The 1945 edition of the Morningside basketball squad welcomed the new season by trouncing the Wartburg five 58-33. In their next engagement the Maroons didn't fare as well, being dumped by a taller Creighton team, 41-32. Playing three more non-conference games, the Maroons handily defeated Northwestern Junior College 43-38; Western Union 44-36; Buena Vista 54-23.

The "Men of the M," drawing the Augustana Vikings for their first conference foe, downed them 50-38. In the return engagement at Sioux Falls, the Vikings retaliated, taking this contest 45-39.

The season was counted a complete success as South Dakota University was overcome twice, 53-41 and 50-44. In the first game at Vermillion, Uknes led the scoring with 15 points, while in the second encounter, Norm Mathers took honors with 16 markers.

After a several game road trip Morningside was downed 59-42 by the Jackrabbits of South Dakota State. This defeat was avenged in Sioux City, the Sioux squad coming out on the long end of a 65-54 score. Gale Stevens copped 26 points in the encounter.

Boosting their conference record the Maroon cagers scalped the Omaha Indians twice. 46-27 and 42-35. Iowa State Teachers were next to succumb to Morningside's high powered attack. The game proved to be a real thriller, with a final count of 49-47. With reserves playing most of the game, Western Union went down to defeat at the hands of the Maroon quintet 58-45.

In their last two regularly scheduled battles, Buckingham's men really hit their stride by vanquishing Northwestern J. C. 58-48; Buena Vista also fell 80-40 in a game that saw Stevens garner 25 points.


A post-season tussle was arranged with a strong Tulsa five of the Missouri Valley Conference. This game, played before a capacity crowd in the Morningside gym, was finally won by the home team in a thrilling overtime contest, 46-45. Obye, guard, closing his collegiate career, was outstanding on defense, while Mathers led the scoring column with 12 tallies.

The highlight of the campaign came next as Morningside was chosen to represent this area in the National Intercollegiate Tournament in Kansas City. The elation was short lived for the Maroon cagers lost out in the first round, going down 56-40 at the hands of the Nevada University Wolf Pack.

John, an able and smooth playing guard, proved to be especially effective on defense.


#### ROSAMOND WILSON

Bill was the youngest member of the squad. Showing himself to be a capable reserve, Bill used his height to a good advantage.





The Spring Festival, a tradition since the first May Fete in 1907, was presented again by the Physical Education Department under the sponsorship of the Physical Education Majors.

Roadman. Miss Johnson was attended by Miss Kaye Johnstone, who assisted in the coronation. A trio number of "Girl of My Dreams" again reminded those present that the May Queen was a vision in the imagination of a man drowsing on a park bench.


