Dear Morningsider:

For as long as many of us can remember, the Alumni Association of Morningside College has been soliciting annual dues to finance its various activities. The Board of Directors of your Association, after many long sessions of weighing various possibilities, decided to do away with the "dues" this past spring. This decision came about basically for two reasons:

- 1) A "dual solicitation" problem has developed concerning the Alumni Association dues and the Annual Alumni Fund. It became apparent that many people felt that the Alumni dues which they paid each year were going to the Alumni Fund to be used directly by the College. Printed lists of alumni giving



included **only** those persons who contributed to the Alumni Fund, leaving some doubts in the minds of those who were dues-payers.

- 2) When the College calls on corporations and foundations for financial support, one of the first questions asked relates to the percentage of alumni involved in annual giving. Alumni Association dues cannot be counted as direct contributions because they do not come to the College. Therefore, the percentage of alumni involved in giving is lower than it could be.

Will this end the Morningside College Alumni Association as an active and driving force behind the College? Certainly not! We have the pledge of the College administration to back our activities financially, so that we may continue to work toward the betterment of Morningside and become an even stronger body.

To put the whole situation in a nutshell, we are simply asking all Alumni Association members who have paid dues in the past to continue their support of the College through a gift or pledge to the Alumni Fund. Remember, participation is the important thing! We should all help, even in a small way!

It's A Very Good Year!

The prevailing spirit was one of optimism as Morningside's faculty and students met for workshops preceding the start of the 1971-72 academic year—the faculty gathering on campus for their sessions and the students meeting at the New Inn on the shores of Lake Okoboji.

In his report to the faculty, President Thomas S. Thompson spoke of the challenge faced by both professors and students in making the new curriculum the driving force for a greater Morningside.

"We have singled out objectives and incorporated them into our

academic structure," Dr. Thompson said. "We have identified. We have programmed. We have planned a real thrust. The challenge is now upon us to move forward positively, soundly, and through professional competence accomplish that which we have set out to do."

Dr. Thompson reported to the faculty that the College had ended its budget year in the black — a rather rare occurrence among private colleges this year. In detailing this year's budget of over \$3.5 million, he said that the flow of private gifts to the College would have much to say about a continu-

ance of a balanced budget. "This gift need is over \$264,000 not including moneys regularly received from the United Methodist Church and from the joint efforts of Iowa's private colleges," Dr. Thompson said.

In his remarks, President Thompson emphasized these points:

- * *Morningside's faculty is young (average age is 40 years), well-prepared (42% now hold earned doctorates), and highly regarded by students.*
- * *The College will not practice a policy of open admissions, but will continue to admit students of demonstrated ability.*
- * *Campus improvements will be built into the budget on a continuing basis with carefully determined priorities.*
- * *Academic policies will be decided in the light of what is best for Morningside's students consistent with its goals as a Christian, liberal arts college. There will be no fads or gimmicks.*

The emphasis during the faculty workshop was on academic counseling — one of the keys to the workability of the new curriculum. An address on effective counseling was given by Dr. Waller B. Wiser, Dean of Simpson College, who said: "Whatever our academic systems are, they should not be punitive. They should be therapeutic. They should facilitate the accomplishing of students' goals."

Meanwhile, at Okoboji student leaders were setting goals relating to the extra-curricular life of the College at the retreat sponsored by student government.

Members of the faculty and administration joined the students in this informal setting in which there was a lively interchange of ideas.

The moderator of the retreat sessions was student body president Ed Johnson, a junior from Storm Lake, Iowa.

Enrollment Report . . .

The initial enrollment report from the office of Registrar Walter von Klein shows an increase of 51 full-time students compared to the start of the 1970-71 academic year. The enrollment of full-time students is 1309—the highest in four years. The full-time equated enrollment (total full-time academic hours equated to a 15-hour load) stands at 1347—an increase of 70 over last year. Figures on Evening Division and part-time day school enrollment were not available at press time.

Morningside's increase comes at a time when most area private colleges are experiencing a drop in enrollment.

Miss Iowa — Judy Stephens

"I wouldn't trade one minute of being Miss Iowa for anything—it's wonderful." These are the words of Judy Stephens, Miss Iowa of 1971 and honor graduate of Morningside College in May of this year.

A little more than a month after receiving her bachelor of science degree Summa Cum Laude, Judy was crowned Miss Iowa at Davenport. She first won the pageant held in her hometown of Clarinda, and entered the state competition as Miss Southwest Iowa. She was chosen over 21 other candidates for the Miss Iowa title.

Judy impressed the judges not only with her beauty but with her talent as a pianist. She won preliminary honors in both the swimsuit and talent competition. Her talent presentation is a condensed version of "Rhapsody in Blue."

As the *Morningsider* goes to press, Judy is competing in the Miss America pageant in Atlantic City where the best wishes of Morningsiders from around the country accompany her.

Judy is one of the five children of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Stephens who farm north of Clarinda. Although definitely not a tomboy, Judy didn't mind farm chores, and even her brothers admit that she is a good cook.

The honey blond Miss Stephens did not expect to win the Miss Iowa title. "I entered the Miss Southwest Iowa pageant to gain poise and experience in meeting people," she says.

A graduate of Clarinda High School, Judy attended Western Community College at Clarinda before transferring to Morningside in the fall of 1969. A history major, she has completed her practice teaching but plans to study for her master's degree in preparation for college-level teaching.

Judy will have no problems in picking a graduate school. Her grade average for her four undergraduate years was 3.985 on a scale where 4.0 is perfect.



Until the next Miss Iowa is crowned, Judy Stephens will devote most of her time to the rigorous chores that come with her title. "I have found that being Miss Iowa is actually an occupation," she says. "It seems to require full time in order to do the kind of job I feel the people of Iowa would expect of me." Shortly before leaving for Atlantic City, she had spent all but seven days of the summer traveling around Iowa to make personal appearances.

About the Miss America pageant, she had this to say: "I am certain that I'll come home with 49 friends that I didn't have when I arrived there."

What about Judy's plans after the hectic one year as Miss Iowa (and maybe another as Miss America)? There are those graduate hours to take and perhaps a trip to Spain and Portugal. Then there is also that special boy friend from her home town who has just graduated from Iowa State University.

But for now, Judy is concerned, above all else, with being the best Miss Iowa ever. Applying the same enthusiasm and determination that contributed to her outstanding success as a scholar, and combining it with a natural beauty, intelligence and genuine friendliness, Judy has brought honor to her state and her college.

Football Outlook: Improved

The 1971 football season opened on September 9 in Sioux City as the Morningside Chiefs thrashed the University of Nebraska — Omaha 39-14. It was the start of a season that could prove to be one of Morningside's best.

Ten offensive starters return from the 1970 squad including a pair of All-American Candidates. Quarterback Mike Junck (6-1, 190) was an honorable mention Little All-American in 1969 and could be just about the best in the nation this season if recovered from the shoulder injury he suffered in 1970. At tailback is Dave Bigler (6-0, 193) the senior from Dumont, who is on the verge of breaking the career rushing records at Morningside.

Bigler was All-North Central Conference last season and is regarded as one of the top backs in the Midwest.

The offensive line is a veteran one with big Ron O'Neal (255) at center, Doug Huitink (214), and Craig Gossard (212) at guards, Eric Blockhus (226) and Dean Davenport (220) at the tackles, Dan McClannahan (230) at the tight end, and Bill Asprey (191) and Mike Ghery (178) at the split end spot. All are two-year lettermen except Davenport.

The rest of the backfield will have power running Jim Harmsen (200) at fullback and either Steve Butters or Jim Schipull at the slotback position.

On the defense, the Chiefs have a mixture of youth and experience and the look is IMPROVED. Transfers Dan Buss (6-3, 210) and Steve Schmidt (6-0, 200) look good at the end positions. Jim Foley (6-6, 220), Dave Reeder (6-0, 220), and John Ross (6-0, 210) are lettermen at the defensive posts and present the Chiefs with an increase of speed and a better pass rush.

There is experience at the line-backing positions with All-NAIA District 15 player Mark Thiessen

keying the attack. Other vets include Rex Johnsrud, Brad Nordstrom, and Todd Asche. Those four plus freshman Howie Staber and junior Rick Hawley give the Chiefs a definite strong point.

The deep back situation should be improved with the switch of speedster Mickey Everett from offense. Everett will fight with transfer Jim McMahon and veterans Mark Brosamle and Bill Mathers for the three open spots.

It looks to be a tough conference race with North Dakota State University tabbed as the favorite. The University of North Dakota is picked second while most prognosticators are looking to Morningside for third. Whether or not the Chiefs can finish that high will depend on how injury free Coach Dewey Halford's team can stay. Heading into his 17th season at Morningside, Halford may have his best squad in years.

A student committee, headed by junior Nancy Monter of Oakland, N.J., has planned a varied schedule of events with the help of the Alumni Association and the office of Alumni Relations director Bob Miller.

The annual Alumni Dinner, sponsored by the Alumni Association, will be enhanced this year by the appearance of the Homecoming Queen and her court, student body president Ed Johnson and "The New Day," a popular singing group made up of Morningside students. The dinner will be held at 5 p.m. on the day of the game.

In an effort to present entertainment that will be appealing to students, alumni and the Sioux City community, the Homecoming Committee has engaged singer Mac Davis for the Homecoming Concert to be held in the Eppley Auditorium at 8 p.m. on October 15. The Homecoming Queen will be revealed during the intermission of the concert.

The vice-president had just delivered a chapel address. The procession was to take him to lunch at the dormitory.

The annual walk-out day was initiated the day prior to the vice-president's visit when students left the campus to practice yells they were to use in greeting Mr. Fairbanks.

Potpourri / A Summary of Campus News ...

NEW FACULTY MEMBERS ...

Morningside begins the 1971-72 academic year with eight new faces on the full-time faculty roster. Two of the new faculty members taught on a part-time basis last year. The following brief profiles give an indication of the excellent preparation these new teachers bring to Morningside ...

DR. LARRY W. EDWARDS has been named an assistant professor of music replacing Prof. Lois Grammer who has retired. Dr. Edwards received his Ph.D. this year from the University of Michigan and holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Northwestern University. He was director of vocal music for four years at Joliet Township High School of Joliet, Ill., and was a teaching fellow at the University of Michigan while completing his doctorate. Dr. Edwards has been organist and choir director of several United Methodist Churches.

DR. RICHARD M. EVANS, a 1959 graduate of Morningside and native Iowan, has been named an assistant professor of education. For the past two years Dr. Evans has taught in the graduate school of the University of Houston. Prior to that he was an assistant professor of education at Northern Illinois University where he studied for his doctorate under an NDEA fellowship. Mrs. Evans, the former Marilee Haddock, is also a Morningside graduate.

MRS. BEVERLY FISHER, a part-time instructor at Morningside last year, has been named to a full-time position as instructor in the department of speech and drama. Mrs. Fisher, wife of drama professor Lyle Fisher, is a graduate of the University of Northern Iowa and has completed graduate work at Indiana University, the University of South Dakota and the University of Northern Iowa. She has several years of high school teaching experience and was a part-time instructor for four years at Ferris State College of Big Rapids, Mich.

DR. MARGARET A. HUTCHISON has been appointed to an assistant professorship in the education department. She received her Ed.D. degree from Northern Illinois University this summer after earlier earning her master's degree at the same institution and her undergraduate degree at Marian College in Wisconsin. Dr. Hutchison was a parochial school teacher in New York, Wisconsin and Illinois from 1952 to 1967 and taught public school in Palatine, Ill., from 1967 to 1969.

RICHARD L. JENNINGS, a native of Waterloo, Iowa, has been named instructor in speech and drama. Mr. Jennings received his master's degree this year from the University of Northern Iowa where he also took his undergraduate work. He was president for one year of the University Players of UNI. He will specialize in play production at Morningside.

MRS. CAROL OLESON, a part-time instructor for the past two academic years, has been named an assistant professor of

English. A 1960 graduate of Morningside, she earned her master's degree in 1970 from the University of South Dakota. She has taught at Briar Cliff College of Sioux City and was a junior high school French teacher.

GARY SLECHTA, a 1964 graduate of Morningside, joins the music department as an assistant professor specializing in instrumental music. He earned his master's degree in 1970 from Drake University. He has been a high school band instructor for the past eight years, spending the last six years in the Odebolt-Arthur Community Schools system where his bands won many honors.

VERNON TREVELLYAN has been named an assistant professor in the art department. He is a recent graduate of the University of Oregon, earning an MFA degree. STATE GRANT FOR PROJECT AWARENESS . . .

Project Awareness, the student-operated drug information program at Morningside College, has received an \$1800 grant from the Iowa Drug Abuse Authority for use during the 1971-72 academic year.

The funds will be used to develop programs for presentation to clubs, service organizations, school and church groups, according to Dr. Earl Moore, chairman of Morningside's psychology department and faculty advisor to the project.

The project gained wide acceptance during the previous school year when students involved in the program made appearances before varied groups and on radio and television.

COMPUTER CONFERENCE IN 1973 . . .
