




Reaching For The Future








There are many events students can get involved in that provide both entertainment and educational value.




Reaching for the gold


















Getting Involved





The RAs help the dorms run smoothly, and they're doing a great job.





THEATRE A SERIE





While the national media pondered the impeachment of a president, Morningside's media had more than enough news to go around in 1998–99.

With the resignation of Jerry Israel in late spring of 1998, the staff of *The Collegian Reporter* was assured coverage of the search for Morningside's next president.

As the year progressed the newspaper and Editor—in–Chief Dan Ryan covered campus visits by three presidential candidates as well as the resignation of Dean Bari Watkins.

The visit of Lech Walesa, ex-president of Poland, made February all that much more interesting for CR reporters, editors and photographers.










