From the President's Pen...

Mrs. Palmer and I have just returned from the annual meeting of the Association of American Colleges. We combined business with pleasure and made several Alumni visitations along the way. The experiences we shared as we worked with the leaders of some 755 colleges of liberal arts and sciences at the Association meetings, and as we fellowshipped with Morningsiders, new and old, across the country, left us with a renewed and enlarged enthusiasm both for our task in the general field of higher education and for Morningside College in particular.

First, let me urge all of you to support the proposal being offered by the Association for Congressional consideration. The need for increased support for higher education is universally recognized. The objective with us is to get that support for the private institutions in particular without the governmental controls which would place academic freedom in real jeopardy. Our proposal is that a method of tax credit be adopted as the means of assisting our institutions of higher education. A tax credit would be given, first, to families with students in college. This would encourage youth to attend colleges, either private or state. A tax credit is a deduction from the tax payment as distinguished from the usual income tax benefits which are deducted from taxable income.

This method of assistance would enable individuals and corporations to support institutions of private higher education with funds that would otherwise go to the government. This would mean that financial assistance which is now being considered could get to the colleges without passing through the agency of government, thus eliminating governmental controls and great administrative expense.

And, just for the record, the more Mrs. Palmer and I become acquainted with our wonderful Morningside family, the more proud we are to be a part of it.

LIBRARY RECEIVES GRANT

The newly remodeled Morningside College library has been given a \$400 sub-grant from the Association of College and Research Libraries from funds granted to it by United States Steel. Blanche V. Watts, '08, librarian, states that the grant will be used for the purchase of out-of-print books in the field of literature. Morningside's library is one of eighty-seven libraries to receive sub-grants in this program this year.

CHARLES CITY COLLEGE PROJECT

Arthur Bastian of the Charles City College graduating class of 1909, and owner of the Pine Hills Ranch of Miles City, Montana, has pledged ten thousand dollars toward placing upon the Morningside College campus a memorial of Charles City College, which was merged with Morningside in 1914.

A committee has been organized to plan and carry out the "Charles City College Project," which has been conceived as a remodeling and refurnishing of the Conservatory of Music. It is estimated that the cost will be approximately fifty thousand dollars.

Co-chairman of the committee are Fred K. Bruene, farmer and livestock man from Gladbrook, Ia., and an alumnus of Charles City College, who holds an honorary degree from Morningside; and Earl A. Roadman, former president of Morningside. Other committee members are: Rosa Dodge Gehring, '12, Howard, S. D.; Arthur Bastian, Charles City, '09, honorary degree from Morningside '55; Daniel Starch, Charles City '09, honorary degree from Morningside '55; Daniel Starch, Charles City, '03, Scarsdale, N. Y.; Dr. William Gauger, '34, Early, Ia.; Dr. J. Richard Palmer, president of Morningside; and Dr. Wesley Belling, honorary degree from Morningside, '31, Charles City, Ia.

Charles City College was founded as the Northwestern German-English Normal School in Galena, Ill., in 1868, by the North west German Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. It was moved to Charles City in 1891. It made the transition to a liberal arts college and drew its students particularly from among the German Methodists in the area, who were very strong at that time. At the time of the merger with Morningside, there were about fourteen faculty members and 250 students.

SPONSOR WRITERS CONFERENCE

A Siouxlant Writers Conference, co-sponsored by Morningside College and the Sioux Writers Club, will be held on Sunday, February 16, at the Sheraton-Martin Hotel in Sioux City. The one-day conference will feature workshops in the fields of short story, adventure books for boys and men, writing a first novel, the sports story, poetry, and newsroom copy.

MAROON RECORD 5 - 5 IN BASKETBALL, '57-'58

Morningside's basketball team, after winning its first two games against Yankton and Westmar, was defeated by Midland College 71-65 in a close game December 9. The outcome of this contest was decided mainly on shooting percentage and some clutch scoring by a Midland junior. Dick Yates was Morningside's high scorer with 19 points.

December 14 saw Nebraska Wesleyan invading Morningside in a very thrilling game, the Maroons won 75-71. Augustana scored a 75-54 win over Morningside in Sioux Falls December 19.

During the Christmas vacation, December 26-28, Morningside's basketball squad took part in an invitational tournament at Terre Haute, Ind. They defeated Franklin University in the first round of the tournament, 66-64, and were eliminated in the semi-finals by Indiana State, 70-64. In this game with the eventual winners of the tournament, the Maroons put forth their best effort to date. Jerry Block, 6'6" center from Davenport, Ia., was high scorer for the Maroons at the tourney where he was first used in the starting lineup, giving the added height that Morningside has needed.

On January 4, the Maroons defeated Buena Vista at Storm Lake, 68-66. It was during this game that Ron Juffer, over-all high scorer for Morningside, sustained a knee injury which kept him out of the next two games.

Without Juffer, a high school all-stater from Sioux Center, the Maroons fared badly in their

second and third conference games. The North Central co-champions for 1956-1957, an exceptionally talented South Dakota U. team scored an easy win on January 7, 78-47, and North Dakota U. squeaked past Morningside January 10, 62-61. Senior Dick Yates was high scorer for the "Men of the M" in both games.

Two Morningsiders On Methodist All-American

Truman O'Doherty, 205-pound center for Morningside, has been named to the first team of the All-American college football squad selected by TOGETHER magazine, a family publication of the Methodist Church. Players eligible for this team must attend one of the 74 four-year colleges supported by the Methodist Church. A separate all-star team is chosen from among students at the six Methodist-related universities.

Larry Johnson of Morningside is on the third college eleven.

These teams are picked for TOGETHER by Fred Russell, sports editor of the NASHVILLE BANNER. He says in his article in the December issue of TOGETHER that the college squad could hold its own against that of the Methodist universities (Syracuse, Southern Methodist, Northwestern, Denver, Boston, and Duke) and might even play the university team to a standstill, if they ever met.
