Basketball Dropped for Duration

One of Morningside's topranking sports, basketball, will be eliminated from the college activities this season due to the lack of manpower.

Morningside is not the only college faced with this situation. The North Central Conference has been disbanded for the duration with the result that there will be no inter-collegiate basketball. The call to service in the armed forces has depleted the manpower. There are not enough men left in any of these schools who have the time, interest, and ability to play basketball in competition with other colleges.

The few boys in school who do have an interest in the sport may enter the recreational league but will not enjoy the full privileges of a regular college team because the number of home games will be limited.

The men permanently stationed at the 81st C. T. D. may organize into a recreational league team. The aviation students have very little time for basketball, but they may organize to play a few games.

The Alumni Gym, however, is in constant use with girls taking it over four hours a day for intra-mural sports. The cadets use the gym five hours a day, which includes their physical training periods. The regular boys' physical education class meets at 7:30 every morning.

With anticipation and eagerness, Miss Fischer began to teach, when a mere girl. She must always have had a great desire to teach, for only a passion for her profession could have made successful those first eight years when she carried an almost unbelievably heavy load of Latin, Greek, and German at St. Paul's College, and also supervised the girl's dormitory or rather "Ladices Hall" as it was then called. Her love of learning and her desire to be of service to young people were then and are now predominant characteristics. Her church and her school—these have been her life.

The Trustees of Charles City College saw all of this and gave her the opportunity to come to Charles City College where she continued to study and to teach young women, not only Latin, Greek, or German, but much about the business of living.

Finally, Charles City College and Morningside College merged. Many of the Charles City teachers came to Morningside, among them Laura Fischer, and it is here that the alumni and the faculty of this college have come to know her, and to appreciate and love her, as a teacher and as a co-worker.

Miss Fischer is a woman of a very sensitive nature, sensitive to all that is beautiful about her, to the birds that she spies in the spring in "North Ravine", and to the personalities in the classroom, each one of whom she studies and knows, and in whom she sees possibilities. She comments in her office as she grades papers, "Well, now, he does very well. I think he can make it." And she sees to it that he does, and that he reaches the high standard which she always holds.

College Barn Being Rebuilt

Rehabilitation work to convert the old World War I barracks building on the campus, popularly known as "the barn", into a combined girls' dining hall and student union "will begin as soon as possible", announced David Stewart, president of the college board of trustees, after their semi-annual meeting on November 3.

Since the army took over the women's residence hall, the coeds have had the use of the dormitory dining room, but this arrangement has been concluded. Pending completion of the dining room in "the barn", the college has arranged with restaurants to provide for the ninety girls.

Plans embody equipping and furnishing a women's dining room on the first floor, with an immediate capacity for ninety, and a student center on the second floor. Much of the work will be done by college students, the women supervising the interior furnishing and decorating. Equipment and furnishings for the dining room and center will be largely from supplies at the college.

Edwin B. Haakinson, '26, recently promoted to Major, is serving as an assistant signal officer with Major General James H. Doolittle's air force in the European area.

Edwin began his career as a newspaper man during his student days at Morningside when he worked nights as a reporter and sports writer for the Sioux City Tribune, until he was promoted to city editor and acting managing editor. Later he joined the Washington bureau of the Associated Press and continued his work as a reporter, until he entered active service in the army following Pearl Harbor.

As an Associated Press reporter he worked under Edgar Hoover for a year, and experiences he had in covering his activities proved most interesting. Likewise as special reporter for Henry Wallace, Ed received valuable training and became an ardent admirer of the Iowa agriculturist.

However, his most enjoyable work was the three years he spent as the Associated Press reporter in the senate, where there was never a dull moment.

During all this time Edwin travelled extensively on diplomatic missions and investigations, some of these ventures taking him to foreign shores.

After entering active service in the Air Corps as a 2nd Lt. and taking training at Miami Beach, Fla., and Ft. Monmouth, N. J., he received the commission of Captain and returned to service in Washington. Upon applying for overseas duty he was ordered to report to Major General Doolittle in April, 1943, and although his former commander in Washington has urgently requested his return, Major Haakinson has remained at his post overseas.


