"The President's Pen"

This is being written in "cool Colorado." Mrs. Palmer and I are attending an Intellectual Life conference sponsored by the Association of American Colleges. The presidents of 18 colleges and universities with their wives



are here, representatives from Mississippi to North Dakota and California to Washington, D. C., giving a week's time to the serious discussion of basic philosophical problems involved in the administration of the

affairs of institutions of higher education.

As we traveled I have been increasingly conscious of the growing stature of the small, private, liberal arts, church-related college in the thinking of America's leaders.

This type of college is more and more coming to be recognized by academicians, professional graduate schools, and business leaders as the place in the field of American higher education where the student seems to receive the best combination of benefits.

Last year a staff member of one of our nation's best medical schools urged me to use every influence in getting our pre-med graduates to consider their graduate training program — "We like the grads of the small, liberal arts, church-related colleges; in fact, our students are largely from such institutions. We know they have had more attention all the way through college."

Such a statement reflects in almost exact terms what I have heard again and again from personnel directors of large industries, school superintendents, and other employers of college graduates. The oft quoted fact gleaned from a study of Who's Who in America indicates that there are three times as many graduates of the small, liberal arts colleges (most of which are church related) listed on its pages as graduates of any other institution of higher education.

As I have visited other campuses and shared joys and sorrows with other college administrators, the thought has often occurred: how like scores of these fine, small, church-related colleges we are. It is from our combined efforts that the best possible type of

higher education is being offered to nearly half of those entering college today. From among these colleges similar to our own will come graduates who have been given, in addition to the finest type of formal education, a great concern for human values, unusual opportunities for leadership training, and other benefits which accrue from the opportunities offered for Christian fellowship, courses in religion and regular experiences.

While we do not claim to stand alone, we can honestly claim that we stand among the best of them. "Among the Best"—our faculty, curriculum and program exemplifies this I firmly believe. And, we are doing everything in our power to make it increasingly true for the present and future.

In real determination to keep Morningside the best, our trustees at their last meeting adopted a most encouraging and breath-taking program of development.

First, in order to keep our faculty and staff salaries on a competitive level, we will be moving during the next twelve years to increase our endowment 2.9 million dollars, or a total of \$4,000,000.

Second, a program of 2½ million dollars was adopted for additional buildings and renovation. A new fine arts chapel-auditorium will be first, a student center and two more dormitories will follow.

More about the plans for these ambitious steps in the near future.

BILL WOLLE VIEWS LEBANESE CRISIS

Bill Wolle, '49, F.S.O. attached to the United States embassy in Beirut, Lebanon, has written to his parents of the tense situation in Lebanon, especially immediately following the coup in Iraq.

When the United States Ambassador urged dependents of all embassy personnel to leave Beirut, Bill's wife and daughter were evacuated to Rome. From there they went to Norway to be with Mrs. Wolle's mother.

In one of his letters, Bill wrote that from the balcony of their apartment, which overlooks the Mediterranean, they watched the U. S. fleet come in and with great interest and pride saw the Marines land. Their front line of march from the port to the airport passed directly in front of the apartment building.

During 1952 and 1953, Bill served in the embassy in Baghdad, Iraq.

J. Wood Gets Music Post; Hines Appointed to Staff in Languages

NAME NEW MUSIC HEAD

Professor James H. Wood of Louisville, Kentucky, has been named acting director of the conservatory of music, succeeding Dr. Robert Larson, who has accepted a similar position at Coe college, Cedar Rapids, Ia.

Dr. Wood has been voice and vocal literature instructor at Southern Baptist Theological seminary, Louisville. He took his undergraduate work at Macalester college in St. Paul, Minn., and received his master's degree from the University of Iowa. Union Theological seminary awarded him a Doctor of Sacred Music degree in 1956.

Dr. Wood sang with the Robert Shaw chorale in 1951 and 1952, and appeared as soloist with the R. C. A. Victor chorale and the N. B. C. orchestra. He studied with Mack Harrell of the Metropolitan Opera company, the Julliard School of Music, and with Robert Shaw.

DR. HINES JOINS FACULTY

Dr. Herbert W. Hines, formerly president of Rocky Mountain college in Billings, Montana, will join the Morningside faculty this fall to teach in the area of Spanish and ancient languages. In connection with his teaching duties at Morningside, Dr. Hines traveled in Spain this summer.

Dr. Hines received his B.A. and M.A. degrees at Harvard university, and his B.D. and Ph.D. degrees at the University of Chicago. He also has studied at the German universities of Berlin and Marburg. Dr. Hines has served as a minister in the Baptist church for twenty years. He has been active in interdenominational affairs, and is author of several books.

Dr. and Mrs. Hines have ten children, nine of whom saw service in world war 2. Mrs. Hines was national Mother of the Year in 1948.

LIVING ENDOWMENT HITS TOTAL RECORD

In the year ended July 31, a record 555 participants contributed a record total \$7,508.35. Morningside would need \$150,167,000 of additional permanent endowment invested at 5% to realize this amount.

More important than the dollar total is the increase in participants. Five hundred fifty-five is nearly double last year's total and nearly 200 more than ever before have contributed. These 555 individuals are 555 reasons why Morningside will receive greater support from corporations, foundations, and other sources.

Much of the increase is attributed to the growing interest in the Alumni fund and to a wider understanding on the part of former students that \$1, \$5, or \$10 can mean as much as a larger amount. The final statistics will show that \$10 was the amount contributed by the greatest number of people.

There was a tendency of recent graduates to contribute \$1 for each year they have been out of college. A large number of \$100 gifts were included.

A highlight of this year was the 100% participation by the class of 1958. Members already are planning on a repeat performance this year and challenge any other class to match them.

been listed in Who's Who in America, Who's Who in Engineering, Who's Who in the Midwest, and the Order of Distinguished Americans.
